

CHS ADDITION PROMISED TO BE READY JAN. 1

**RUMOR OF ACCIDENT
 VICTIM'S DEATH
 UNTRUE**

EAGLE RIVER: The rumor that the victim of a snowmobile-car collision had died of his injuries is untrue, it was learned today.

Gary Lee Gullard, of Schroeder Subdivision sustained multiple fractures of both his arms, legs and pelvis, but is otherwise in satisfactory condition it was reported.

Gullard received these injuries when the 1971 Scorpion he was riding collided with a 1953 Dodge pick-up truck.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the truck was apparently disabled, and parked on the shoulder of the road at approximately 1/2 mile south of the Eagle River bridge.

The truck was owned by Robert Green of Mile 18 1/2 Old Glenn Highway.

BIRCHWOOD: A promise to complete the addition to Chugiak High School by January 1st, was given to the members of the Chugiak High PTSA at their Monday night meeting.

This promise was given by Mr. Jerry Waite, Vice President of the Locher Co., contractors for the school addition.

Mr. Waite appeared at the meeting as the result of a letter from the PTSA which had been sent home with the students. The letter cited the delay in the completion of the school addition, and accused the contractor of pulling men off the school job and sending them to other projects.

Waite emphatically denied that any men had been pulled off the school construction and sent to other jobs. He admitted that the project was not completed at the scheduled date, but blamed this on the recent dock strike, and the present back-up of materials which still exists at the Seattle docks. He also said that a shortage of qualified labor was responsible for the reduced crews which they have been working with.

FEW VOICE OBJECTIONS TO PRISON

BIRCHWOOD: There were relatively few persons who voiced any objections to the construction of a correctional institution which is presently underway adjacent to the Eagle River campground.

The Southcentral Correctional Institute, as it will be known, was the subject of a talk presented by Mr. Stanley J. Zaborac, Superintendent of the State Jail in Anchorage.

Mr. Zaborac had been invited to speak at the Monday meeting of the Chugiak High Parent Teacher Student Association meeting held in the school multi-purpose room.

Mr. Zaborac described the institution, which he said is referred to as a "Correctional Institution", not a prison.

He brought with him a set of the blueprints of the facility, as well as a copy of the study which had been made for the State by a Professional firm which specializes in designing correctional institutions.

This study was funded by Federal Grant, and according to Zaborac, the facility which is being built along the Moesa

recommended in the study will have a threefold purpose. One to raise the education level of all prisoners to the level of a high school graduate, two to teach the prisoners a trade, and three to put the men back into the community on a work release basis. This enables the many to continue to support his family, as well as help pay his keep while a prisoner.

Zaborac pointed out that the land at Eagle River had been selected for several reasons.

This parcel of land (207 acres) was State Land, which had been allocated to the Department of Mental Health. A correctional institute comes into this category. It is close to the city of Anchorage and the medical and other facilities that would be used.

The design would be along the lines of a college dormitory living arrangements. Although this is classified as a medium security facility, a total of 20 maximum security cells are included in the design.

The entire facility would be enclosed by a fourteen foot chain link fence. Zaborac said that many staff members at the institute would come from the local community, while others would probably chose to take up residence

there.

The few who voiced their objections were mainly fearful of escapees. Zaborac pointed out that the chances of an escapee doing any damage was remote. He said that the foremost thing in the mind of a man who has gone over the wall is to hide.

He also stated that while the institute did not include any unnecessary frills, it would still be an improvement over the traditional penitentiary. A full size gymnasium, a library and classrooms are to be constructed. This brought forth a few objections to the spending of public funds for the purpose of coddling the prisoners. The entire cost of the facility would be \$3.9 million, with an annual operating budget of 1.8 to 2 million dollars. Completion date for the prison is June 15, 1972.

Some of the objectors felt that public hearings should have been held in the local area prior to choosing the site. It was pointed out that since the land on which the Institute was being built was already State Land, and that a Public Hearing was not required by law. It was also pointed out that a public meeting

He was thrown from the car onto the pavement, and narrowly escaped being run over by another car.

An ambulance was summoned and he was transported to Providence Hospital where he was treated for a cut to the head and a shoulder injury.

He has been released from the Hospital, and is recovering at his home.

The damage to the Volkswagon has been estimated as total.

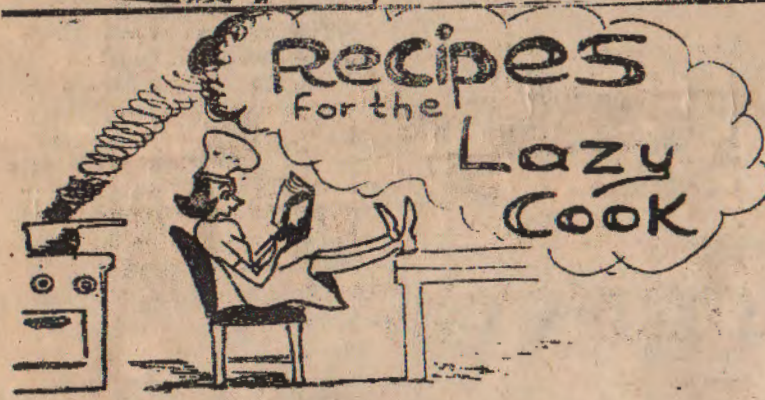

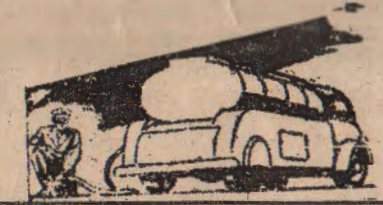

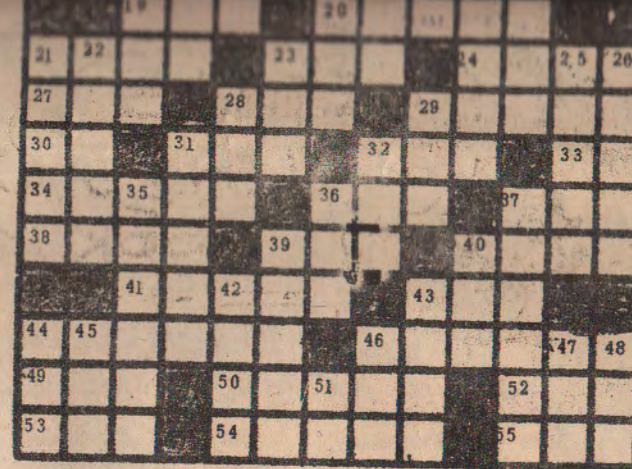

The drawing for the side of beef, cut and wrapped to the winner's specification, will be held at 2:00pm at the new 'Mark and Save' store in Mt. View.

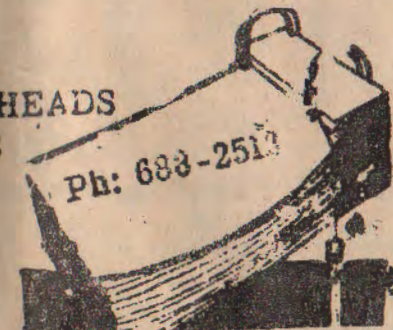

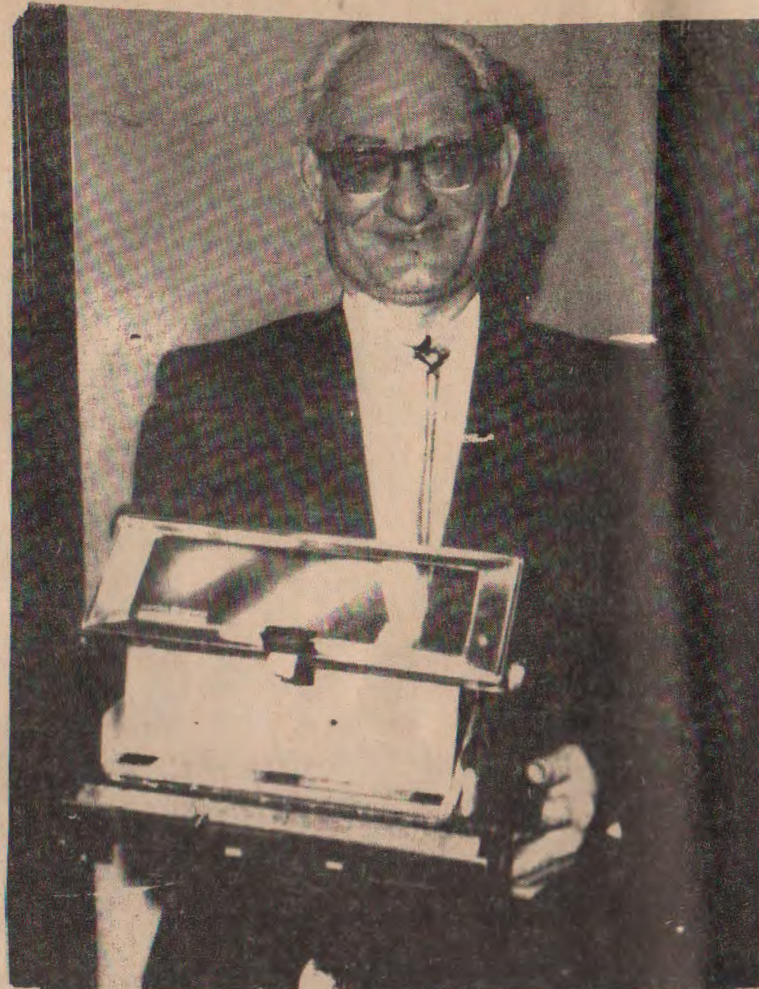

The Knik Arm Chapter No. 797 of the American Association of Retired Persons joins the 900 AARP Chapters and 3 million AARP members in expressing the hope that the 1971 White House Conference will take positive action toward providing retirement lives of dignity, independence and purpose for all older Americans.

The American Association of Retires Persons offers the following Declaration of Aging Rights as a contribution to the White House Conference:

1. The right to live with sufficient means for decency and self-respect.
2. The right to move about freely, reasonable and conveniently.

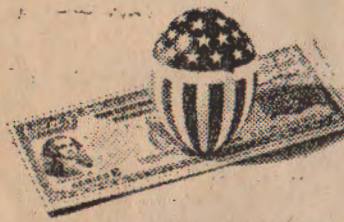

How To Wrap Round Package

To wrap a round package, place the package on the paper and cut so that there is an inch overlap on the side. Fix neatly with tape. Leave enough paper at both ends to fold over and meet in the center of the cylinder. Pleat these ends neatly toward the center making firm creases. Cut two circles of paper to fit the ends of the cylinder and paste them over the pleats.

A round package or object can also be wrapped in several layers of tissue paper with overlap fixed with tape, and two or three inches of paper at each end. Tie the end overlaps firmly with ribbon or yarn. Cut rosette like ends that result in thin strips to resemble a party "snapper". Decorate each end
