CITY SEEKS CONTROL OF OUR WATER SUPPLY

BOWLING ALLEY PLANS.....DOWN THE DRAIN!

EAGLE RIVER: Plans to re-open the bowling alley in Eagle River are definitely cancelled, according to Pat Cartee, Alaskan representative for the Brunswick Corporation.

Cartee said that he had received a call from Lester Peterson, owner of the building in which the bowling alleys are located and learned that the Cher-Don Enterprises were turning the keys to the building back to Peterson as of the 15th of this month.

Jim King, spokesman for Cher-Don Enterprises stated that they were forced to abandon their plans to open the bowling alley when they were denied a license to operate a cocktail lounge in connection with the alleys. King said that Brunswick had declined to finance the bowling alley without the assurance of the added income of a bar.

Cartee, who had been out of the state during the period when Cher-Don had been attempting to obtain the bar license, expressed surprise that Brunswick would make such a stipulation.

Cartee said that in his conversation with Peterson, he determined that Peterson is still anxious to find someone who would like to operate a bowling alley in the building.

Cartee said that it is his personal opinion that a well managed bowling alley could pay its own way without the added income of a bar. He also said that he was sure that the Brunswick Corporation would make every effort to come up with a feasible financing program.

EAGLE RIVER: An application by the City of Anchorage Water Utility for control of all the water sheds and ground water for an area encompassing 200 square miles on the West side of Knik Arm as far as Rabbit Creek has been filed with the Alaska Public Utilities Commission.

This filing was brought to the attention of the local Chamber of Commerce by Dan C. Bell an Eagle River Land Developer. Bell received notification of this filing because he had established a water utility district in one of his subdivisions.

The area encompassed by the City's filing extends from Goose Bay and Point Mackenzie to the Susitna River, Fort Richardson and Elmendorf Air Force Base, Eagle River and vicinity, Anchorage and vicinity including Potter, and the Watershed areas lying northerly and easterly from Anchorage, including upper Peters Creek, Eagle River, Ship Creek, Campbell Creek and Rabbit Creek.

Bell pointed out that if this franchise is granted, than all water rights within the area named would belong to the city of Anchorage, and no other individual or community would be able to utilize so much as a drop. Commercial wells would even be illegal, since franchise also asks for control of all ground water, to effectively prevent this area from ever being able to develop any community water systems, and would be in the position of having to buy water from the City of Anchorage who might or might not be willing to sell it.

Bell stated that he has filed a protest with the Public Utilities Commission both as the developer of a water district on whose franchise the City has overfiled, and as a private citizen who objects to seeing this area robbed of the water which they will need for future development.

The Chamber voted to also submit a letter of protest for the same reasons.

All letters must be filed with the Commission not later than 4:30pm, January 18, 1961.

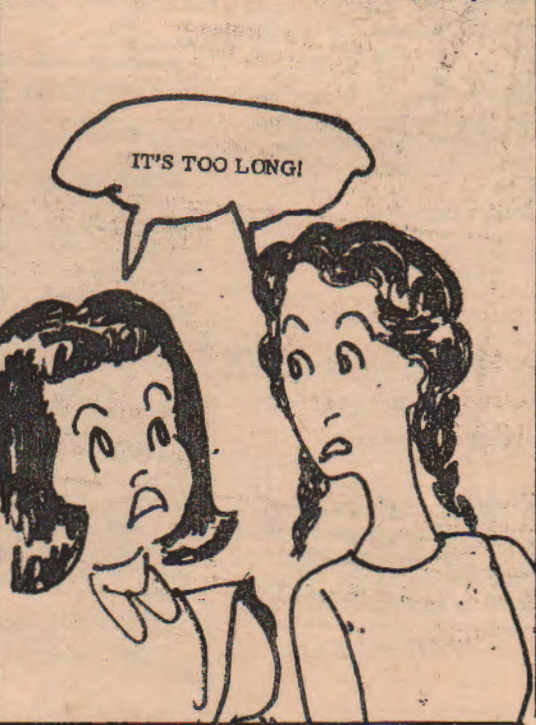
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GOAL CENTER WON'T CLOSE THIS YEAR

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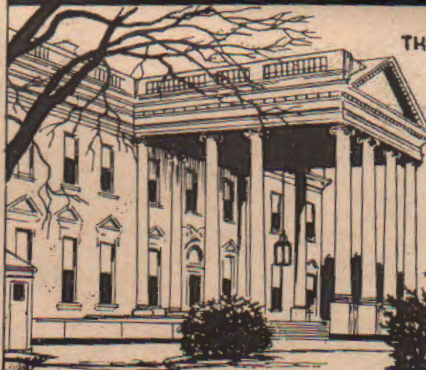

MUSTANGS SWEEP TWO!

The Mustangs swept their first two games of 1971 with two wins over Wasilla's Warriors last Friday and Saturday.

The Friday win, 73-68, at Chugiak broke a 4 game losing streak which started with a loss to West Anchorage Dec. 11th.

The Mustangs met a team that defeated them twice last season. Both were determined, but those losses last year

to the smaller school seemed to be the added spark that carried the Mustangs to victory.

Friday saw Chugiak over Wasilla 29-26 in a slow first half, but both teams exploded in the 2nd half, with Chugiak pulling away to a 5 point victory.

Saturday at Wasilla, the Mustangs met the Warriors on their home warpath, and defeated them again 65-61.

The Wasilla court was smaller and fouls were prevalent, but Chugiak showed a cool that refused to be shaken as Wasilla threw everything in the book at them.

weeks, according to Jim Overbey, manager for the Alaska division of Gustav Hirsch, contractors for the project.

Overbey stated that all of the poles at the five intersections should be in place shortly and that the controls and meters for each intersection will be arriving at four to five day intervals over the next two week period.

He explained that each set of controls had to be custom made for this project. In the absence of municipal power, it was necessary to have each set of lights operated by it's own set of controls.

He said that the controls will be installed and put into operation as soon as each set arrives.

The Matanuska Electric Association has agreed to provide power to each intersection as the hook-up is completed, so the intersections should be lighted at four to five day intervals as each set of controls arrive.

The contract, which was originally scheduled to be completed by November 1, 1970, was delayed when the State of Alaska changed their specifications for the anchor bolts for the poles.

This change was ordered after a pole of similar design somewhere in the Anchorage area was sheared off when it was struck by a car.

Additional delay was encountered when freezing conditions made pouring of concrete difficult.

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COMMUNITY CENTER IS PLAN OF GOAL

EAGLE RIVER: A plan for the construction of a Community Center for the Greater Chugiak Area has been proposed by the G.C.A.L. Center, according to Mrs. Elva Connell, President of GOAL.

This center would be constructed through a grant from HUD (Housing and Urban Development), with 25% of the cost to be provided by the local borough.

The proposal calls for the center to be incorporated with a proposed new fire hall which will be constructed for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company.

Mrs. Connell said that the borough would have to either purchase or otherwise acquire land. This land would have to be in a location suit-

able for a fire hall, with quick access to the main highway. Mrs. Connell said she was informed by a spokesman for HUD that it usually takes at least one year for such a project to get approval.

When completed, the building would be the property of the borough, but would be available to all non-profit and service groups in the Greater Chugiak Area for meetings or other events.

LOCAL FOLKS PLAN TO ATTEND GOVERNORS BALL

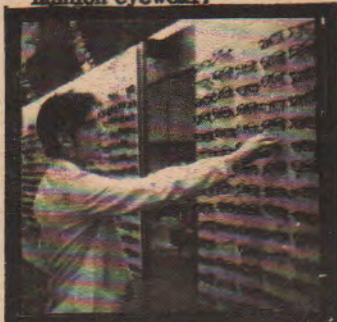

GOAL OUTLINES ANNUAL PROGRAM

EAGLE RIVER: The GOAL Community Center has proposed a yearly program of services which they hope to make available to the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area.

Beginning in October of 1971 through the following March, they see the need of full time State and Federal Employment Agency representatives to help in job placement and to make it possible for those collecting their unemployment checks to sign in locally.

During March and April, they hope to have representatives of the Bureau of Internal Revenue and the State Department of Revenue to help persons in the low income class to prepare their Federal and State income tax returns.

In April and May, representatives of the State Motor Vehicle Department to allow local residents to purchase their new license plates.

During June and July they hope to hire personnel to take charge of State and Federal Youth programs, counseling service for Senior High students, both prospective college and non prospective college bound, Community College classes and remedial classes.

From September through June, the GOAL Center plans to conduct Community College classes in Basic Education.

In connection with the latter, it has been found that many prospective Basic Ed students are held back by the lack of baby-sitters.

GOAL is planning to set up a "Foster Grandparent Plan" with OPAG, whereby the Chugiak Senior Center would be

open two nights a week, and staffed by members of OPAG along with two Neighborhood Youth Corps girls, act as a baby sitting service for Basic Ed students.
