## FREE SCHOOL LUNCHS TO BE OFFERED TO SOME

ANCHORAGE: A program in which free school lunches will be made available to students who qualify, was announced this week by the Greater Anchorage Area School District.

An information letter and application for free lunches has gone to all school district parents through attending students. The purpose of the distribution is to inform parents of the conditions under which a free school lunch can be served, and to provide a ready application for such.

Parents who feel that their children may be eligible for free lunches may apply if their income and other circumstances meet the established criteria.

Applications are reviewed by the Principal and/or School Nurse within five school days. Parents are then to be notified as to the decision. If an application is rejected the reason or reasons for rejection will be clearly stated on the rejection notice. This notice will also inform the parents how and to whom this decision may be appealed.

All applications will be handled privately and information will be kept strictly confidential. Children who receive free lunches will be treated in the same manner as those who pay the full price for the lunch. Every possible effort will be made to make sure that no one, other than the person or persons reviewing the applications knows which child pays or does not pay for their lunches.

Application forms in addition to those distributed through the student body are available at any Anchorage Borough School, or from the Food Service Office in the Central Administration Building.

### WILLIS OPPOSES ANCHORAGE WATER GRAB

ANCHORAGE: Ed Willis, the borough assemblyman from this area has written a letter to the Alaska Public Utilities Commission, voicing his opposition to the issuing the city of Anchorage the exclusive control of all the watersheds in the area from Rabbit Creek through Peters Creek, and also those in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough which they have applied for.

Willis based his objections on the basis that prevailing City of Anchorage utility rates and method of service are highly discriminatory against the outside customer.

"It has been the experience of the urban residents of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough", Willis pointed out in his letter, "that the City's management of its water utility had been unable to treat its ratepayer as a ratepayer, as contrasted with their tax-

### FHA TO BUY LOCAL SEWER BONDS

EAGLE RIVER: There were no bidders for the purchase of \$370,000 worth of bonds for the construction of a sewer system in the Eagle River following a public sale held January 11th, 1971.

Ed Willis, Assemblyman for this section of the Borough pointed out that this was an expected development, and the absence of any bidders now leaves the way clear for the Farm Home Administration of the Federal Government to purchase the bonds.

Willis stated that the preliminary engineering on the proposed sewer system has already been done, and pending final engineering, the project will be advertised for bid, with construction scheduled to start during the 1971 construction season.

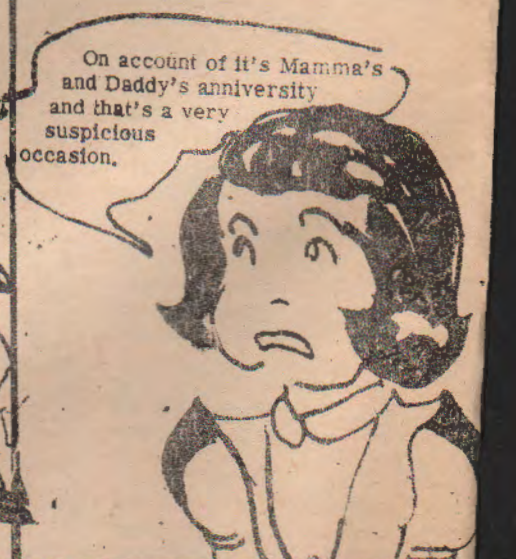

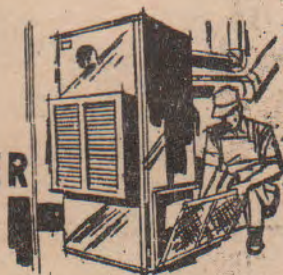

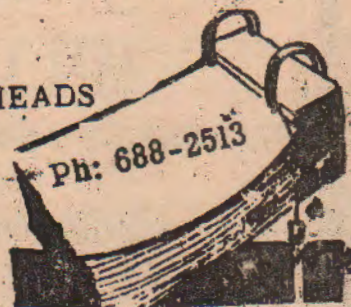

13 AAC 02.445: RIDING ON SNOW VEHICLE: (a) A person operating a snow vehicle on the roadway of a highway shall ride only on a permanent and regular seat attached to the snow vehicle. (b) A snow vehicle, when operated on the roadway of a highway may not be used to carry persons other than the operator unless it is designed and equipped with a seat for other riders.

13 AAC 02.0450 TOWING OTHER PERSON: A snow vehicle may not be operated on the roadway of a highway to tow a person riding upon a bicycle, coaster, sled, skis, or other device.

13 AAC 02.455: OPERATION ON HIGHWAY OR CITY OR BOROUGH STREET: (a) A snow vehicle may not be operated on the roadway of a city or borough street except as may specifically provided by an ordinance enacted under provisions of AS 05.30.070. (b) Local authorities may not allow the operation of a snow vehicle on the roadway of a city or borough street which is a part of the state highway system.

(c) A snow vehicle may be operated on a path or shoulder adjacent to the roadway of a state highway, provided the snow vehicle is driven three (3) feet or more from the extreme edge of the roadway. (d) Snow vehicles may not be operated two abreast on the roadway of a city or borough street but shall proceed in single file. (e) A person operating a snow vehicle on the roadway of a city or borough street shall drive as near to the extreme right side of the roadway as practicable and shall exercise due care when passing a standing vehicle or one proceeding in the same direction and shall give way to the right to a motor vehicle proceeding in the same direction when the driver of the motor vehicle gives audible signal. (f) A snow vehicle may cross a highway only after stopping and when traffic on the roadway allows crossing in safety.

\*\*\*\*\*

13 AAC 02.435. APPLICATION OF SNOW VEHICLE PROVISIONS: (a) The regulations in this chapter apply only when a snow vehicle is operated upon or along a state highway, or as allowed by ordinance, on a city or borough street, subject to the exceptions in these regulations. (b) The provisions of this chapter and other traffic regulations, statutes and ordinances do not apply to a snow vehicle operated on a highway which is at the time closed to other vehicular traffic.

13 AAC 02.440: TRAFFIC LAWS AND REGULATIONS APPLY TO OPERATION OF SNOW VEHICLE: A person operating a snow vehicle upon or along a highway shall be granted the same rights and is subject to the same duties applicable to the driver of other motor vehicles by the traffic regulations, statutes and ordinances, except as to special regulations in 430-456 of this chapter, and except as to provisions of the traffic regulations, statutes and ordinances

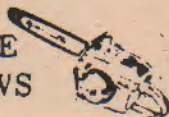

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## CYO CONSIDERS YOUTH PROBLEMS

EAGLE RIVER: On Thursday January 14th, the Catholic Youth Organization of Saint Andrew's Church, met and discussed the problems and needs of the teen-agers in the local area.

Recent statistics have shown that the communities of the Greater Chnglak Area are the fastest growing in the State.

It was brought out that this growth has brought with it greater problems, many involving teen-agers. While it was agreed that teen-age problems are not new to this area, nor to any community, it was obvious that local teen-agers are more than well represented at the McLaughlin Youth Center.

Methods to alleviate this situation were the main theme of the meeting.

The CYO group was aided in their discussion with a film which was presented by Mr. James "Jim" Carrington, the project director for "Partners Project", a community Volunteer and Probationer organization coordinated through the Division of corrections.

The partners project program seeks to help the youth before they are faced with court appearances and jail sentences. The program involves learning from the teen-agers themselves what the problems are, and what the needs are that would help them.

The CYO group brought out many points reflecting their attitudes and those of their school friends. One area of concern among the teen-agers is that the destructive nature of some individuals is causing a disconsolate attitude among the adults.

Other points were; not enough places of recreation in the Community, not enough activities going on, and the fact that many of the problems come from teen-agers who drive around in cars looking for something to do.

One solution brought up was that the teen-agers should do something for themselves. It was suggested that the youths who are looking to better the future environment for their age group meet, and intelligently discuss their needs and problems, and present them to the interested adult organizations.

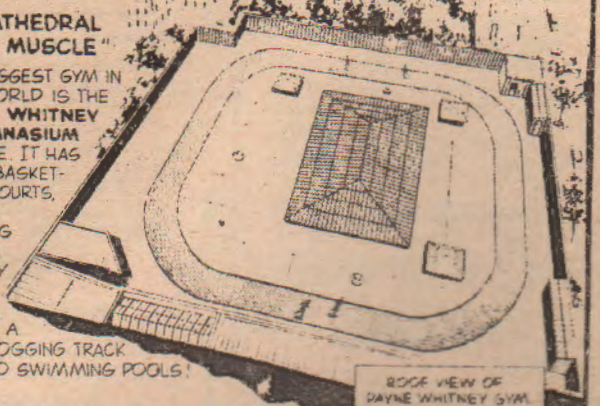

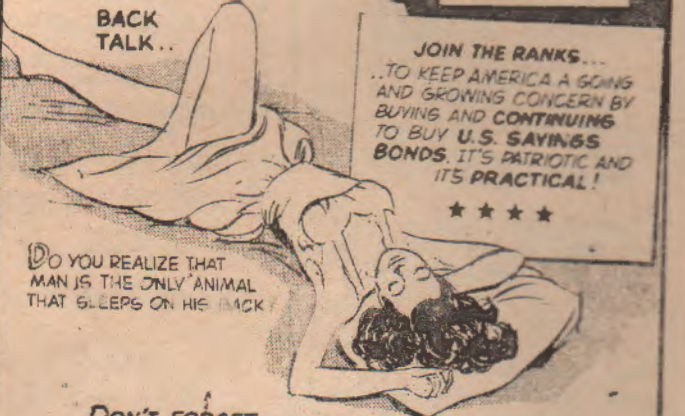

The proposed plant, which will recycle scrap metal into an end product taking form of shaped steel bars and reinforcing steel rods is to be built by Alaska Steel Rolling Mills Inc. and will be located on land adjacent to the Huskey plant, south of Palmer.

When in operation the plant will employ approximately 50 people.

When the plant is operating, there will be a number of scrap accumulation and preparing sites around the state.

The scrap will be processed at these sites and then shipped by rail to Palmer. These sites will employ approximately an additional 100 persons, it is estimated.

The plant is planned as a non-pollutant industry, and will be built with an air quality control system according to the most rigid state, federal and borough anti air pollution measures now in use.

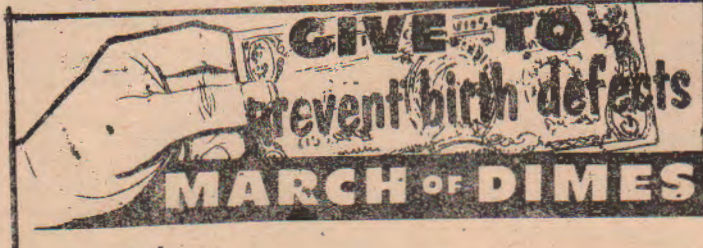
