Mustang fans, however, saw just this happen at the game with Monroe last night, as Steve Jordan sank the winning basket just as the final buzzer sounded.

Chugiak, out to revenge the 48-38 defeat at the hands of the Rams on Monday, took the lead by scoring three baskets before Monroe could make one.

Chugiak kept control of the ball and stretched the lead to 28-22 at half time; and remained out in front until two minutes 55 seconds remained in the last quarter, when Monroe was able to tie the score at 40-40.

The two teams then traded basket for basket until the score was again tied 48-48 with only 45 seconds left in the game, and the ball in the hands of Chugiak.

Steve Jordan, kept the ball in his control for the full 45 seconds, and drove in to score the final two points just as the buzzer sounded.

DECISION ON ROSEBUD REFUSE DUE THIS WEEK

ANCHORAGE: The Alaska Transportation Commission will rule later this week as to whether or not William E. Pettitt, of Eagle River, owner of Rosebud Refuse Co., was in violation of Alaska State law regarding refuse collection, and whether or not he should be granted a permit to operate a refuse collection service.

According to George Benesch of the Alaska Transportation Commission, Pettitt admitted to having been in violation at a hearing held on February 3rd, but pointed out that there were extenuating circumstances.

Benesch explained the circumstances were due to a ruling that garbage could not be considered as property under the way the state law read, and as of April of 1970, the com-

Last week, the Shipmans, who live on the bank of Meadow Creek, found their home endangered by the ice which was glaciering on their property, caused by the cold weather, and the overflow from a small stream which flows into Meadow Creek near their home.

Appeals to the Department of Highways and to the State Disaster Office brought them advice, but no assistance.

Mr. Shipman finally placed a personal call to Governor William A. Egan. He said that

mission had determined that a permit to haul garbage was not required. As of August of 1970, the law had been reworded by the legislature so that garbage would be included as property and a permit was again necessary.

Pettitt stated, according to Benesch, that when he called the office of the Transportation Commission, he had been informed that a permit was not necessary. Benesch said that this was entirely possible if Pettitt had made his inquiry during the period between April and August, or shortly thereafter.

The Alaska Transportation Commission has the authority to grant or deny permits to carriers for refuse collection. He said, however, that they are not required to grant any one company exclusive right to pick up refuse in a specific area, but rather are called upon to exercise their own judgement as to whether one or more carriers could serve any one particular area most efficiently.

Benesch stated that it requires the judgement of a quorum of members of the Commission to determine the results of any hearing. He said that the commissioners should arrive at their decision no later than the end of the week.

Anchorage Refuse, who has held the only permit to pick-up refuse in the Greater Chugiak Area, expressed their views on duplication of service in this field.

A company spokesman for Anchorage Refuse took issue with a statement which Pettitt allegedly made to the Commission to the effect that they (Anch. Refuse) made an extra charge for picking up refuse and litter on the ground around the containers. "This is not the case", the spokesman said.

"Instead, our policy is one of picking up more than they spill which they do several times in an effort to cooperate with the customers so that a clean and neat condition can always be maintained. If, however, repeated spillage and littering

continues, they do not continually perform this "clean-up"

The company spokesman continued that, in purchasing the present modern and specialized equipment which Anchorage Refuse now uses, it is necessary that the exclusive right to perform service in the area be continued, because, otherwise, the equipment cannot be reasonably amortized and its use could not be justified in connection with the reduced amount of business available to Anchorage Refuse.

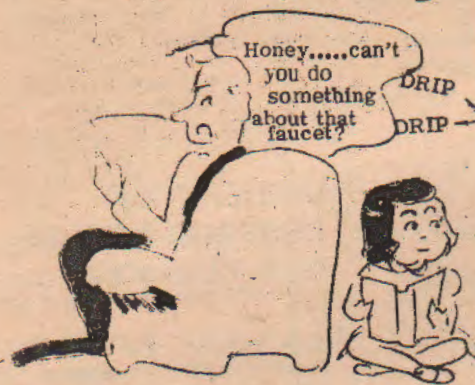
When duplicating service is provided, the spokesman continued, in an area in connection with a public utility type of service such as furnishing electrical service, telephone service, garbage service, etc it simply means that those performing one or more of these services must apportion all costs for doing so onto a lower number of customers, and the inevitable result is a higher charge to each recipient of these services.

MANAGEMENT OF DUCK FLATS TOLD

A joint agreement to manage the Susitna Flats on the west side of the Cook Inlet under a multiple resource management concept has been signed by officials of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough, the Alaska Department of Natural Resources, and the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

Commonly referred to as "the duck flats," the 218,000 acre area includes all of the Susitna River delta. It extends from the mouth of the Beluga River north to Mount Susitna east across the Little Susitna River and south to Cook Inlet.

Mat-Su borough chairman Robert Vroman compared the land use agreement to a BLM resource study currently underway in the Copper River Basin in an area extending through the Talkeetna mountains. He said there were no other such agreements planned in the borough's boundaries.

It is the borough's understanding, Vroman added, that the operating agency in the Susitna Flats area will be the Department of Fish and Game.

Joe Blum, chief of habitat development for the Department of Fish and Game, said the significance of the agreement is that wildlife is to be recognized as the primary resource in the Susitna Flats and other land uses would be coordinated to minimize damage to critical wildlife habitat. The agreement, Vroman said, is preparatory to planning the direction future expansion will take.

The Susitna Flats is a favorite waterfowl hunting area for Anchorage hunters and is used by thousands of ducks, geese and swans as a breeding and resting ground. The area also supports a commercial and sport fishery and is a prime moose calving area.

"This agreement is a landmark in land-use planning between the three agencies," Blum said, "one which we have been working on since 1961." "Next, the three agencies will work together to develop a land-use plan to insure that other uses will not despoil the wildlife habitat of this valuable area."

AMU TO TRAIN NURSES

Alaska Methodist University College of Nursing has received temporary approval from the Office of the Surgeon General to participate in the Army Student Nurse Program, according to Dean Beulah E. Miller, who heads the AMU nursing program.

The program is a two-year collegiate financial assistance plan offered by the Army Nurse Corps to qualified junior and senior nursing students who enlist as members of the U. S. Army Reserve while remaining full-time students.

It would subsidize eligible student nurses for up to 24 months of their education and could mean a total grant of \$10,000 to a 24-month enrollee.

The program includes monthly pay of more than \$300 the first 18 months and more than \$550 the last six months of school, plus full tuition miscellaneous allowances, 30 day paid vacation a year and all other military benefits including free medical and dental care.

Upon graduation the students are commissioned to first lieutenants and serve as officers in the Army Nurse Corps. Length of service depends upon the years of financial assistance received.

Currently, close to 2,000 nursing students in the United States are participating in the Army Student Nurse Program.

"VOICES" IS CONCERN OF CHS PTA
