CHUGIAK: The intersection lights on the New Glenn Highway are now in operation, with only a few exceptions.

Mr. Jim Overbey, Manager of the Alaska Division of Gustav Hirsch, contractors for the lighting system told the Knik Arm Courier that five of the forty lights are now operative.

He explained that it would be spring before these five lights could be brought into operation, as they required underground crossing of the highway. He said the Department of Highways would not permit them to cut and patch the asphalt during the winter.

Overbey said that the original contract had called for them to bore under the highway, but several attempts indicated that because of underground rock formations they would have to resort to an alternate method.

There are two lights out at the North Birchwood Loop, two at the Birchwood School intersection and one at South Birchwood Loop.

Overbey said that some of the lights are receiving their power by means of overhead wires. He pointed out that this is only a temporary measure, and when the underground crossing are completed they will be removed and overhead wires will be visible.

The lights are controlled by an electric eye with a timer over-ride, and come on automatically when it becomes dark.





Trichinosis can be contracted from bear meat, even after it has been smoked, says the state Department of Health and Welfare.

The State of California recently reported four men who developed clinical trichinosis after eating minute quantities of smoked bear meat, said a news release from the department.

It said each man consumed a small slice of meat described as about as large as the tip of the little finger and so thin they claimed "You could read a newspaper through it."

All bear meat should be thoroughly cooked before eating. In Alaska, bear meat is been the only important source of trichinosis in recent years, said the release.

Recipes for the Lazy Cook

CASSEROLE IN A HURRY

1/4 cup dehydrated chopped onions 2 tbs. bacon drippings
1/4 cup dehydrated green pepper 1 can corned beef flakes
2 cups wide noodles (cooked) 1 can cream of mushroom soup
2 Tbs Butter or Margarine 1/2 cup bread crumbs

RECONSTITUTE onions and pepper flakes
SAUTE onion and pepper in bacon drippings
ADD Soup,
CRUMBLE small amount of corned beef in casserole
ADD a layer of noodles & half of soup mixture
SPREAD half of remaining corned beef over noodles.
ADD rest of corned beef, and then remainder of noodles, and soup mixture.
BROWN bread crumbs in melted butter
SPRINKLE on top of casserole
BAKE at 350 degrees for 45 minutes
SERVES 6

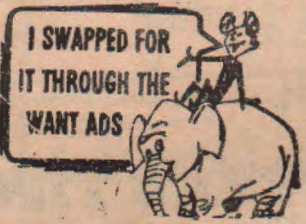
Begich has hired Russel L. Brown, 36, as his administrative assistant. Brown has been a chemist with the Ketchikan Pulp Company.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM TOLD

The Anchorage Building and Construction Trades Council has been awarded an \$85,359 contract by the U.S. Department of Labor to prepare minority youths to pass the building and construction trades apprenticeship entrance tests, according to Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska.

He said the contract, which is the second consecutive one for the council, will run through next January and has as a goal the placement of 50 minority youths.

The contract also includes the operation of a satellite office in Fairbanks for the Anchorage-based council, he said.

Stevens said that under its first contract the council placed 30 minority apprentices, exceeding its goal by 13 persons.

He said of 159 applicants accepted for training, 43 became apprentices as asbestos workers, bricklayers, carpenters, electricians, painters, plumber-pipefitters

and workers in other industries.

Stevens said about 60 per cent of the minority apprentices were Alaskan natives and about 40 per cent

were blacks, but one apprentice was of Oriental extraction and one of Filipino descent.

As with the previous contract, the new contract is supported by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, which will continue to provide transportation to Anchorage for young men interested in the program and which will also provide temporary quarters and meals until examinations are given.

Other agencies working in cooperation with the council's recruiter-counselor include the Alaska State Employment Service, community action agencies, local building trades unions, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the Alaska Federation of Natives and the Filipino Community Organization.

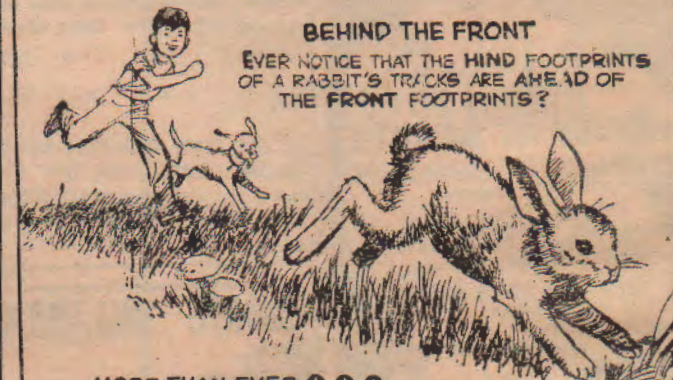

RED CROSS TO AID CALIF. QUAKE VICTIMS

The Southcentral Alaska Chapter of the American Red Cross today launched a fund-raising drive to aid victims of the Los Angeles earthquake.

McDonald said the money collected in Alaska will be used to finance an all-out rescue and recovery effort underway in the stricken region. He said donations should be sent to the Southcentral Chapter at 521 Third Ave., Anchorage, 99501, or to the Red Cross chapter offices at Fairbanks, Kodiak or Juneau.

After the disaster struck at dawn Tuesday the Red Cross mobilized volunteer workers and disaster vehicles throughout the shaken area. More than 6,000 persons evacuated from the path of a quake-weakened dam are being housed and fed in Red Cross shelters. Red Cross volunteers are assisting police, fireman and emergency workers, as well as compiling casualty lists and answering inquiries from anxious relatives across the nation. Red Cross volunteer nurses are working in the morgues and hospitals.
