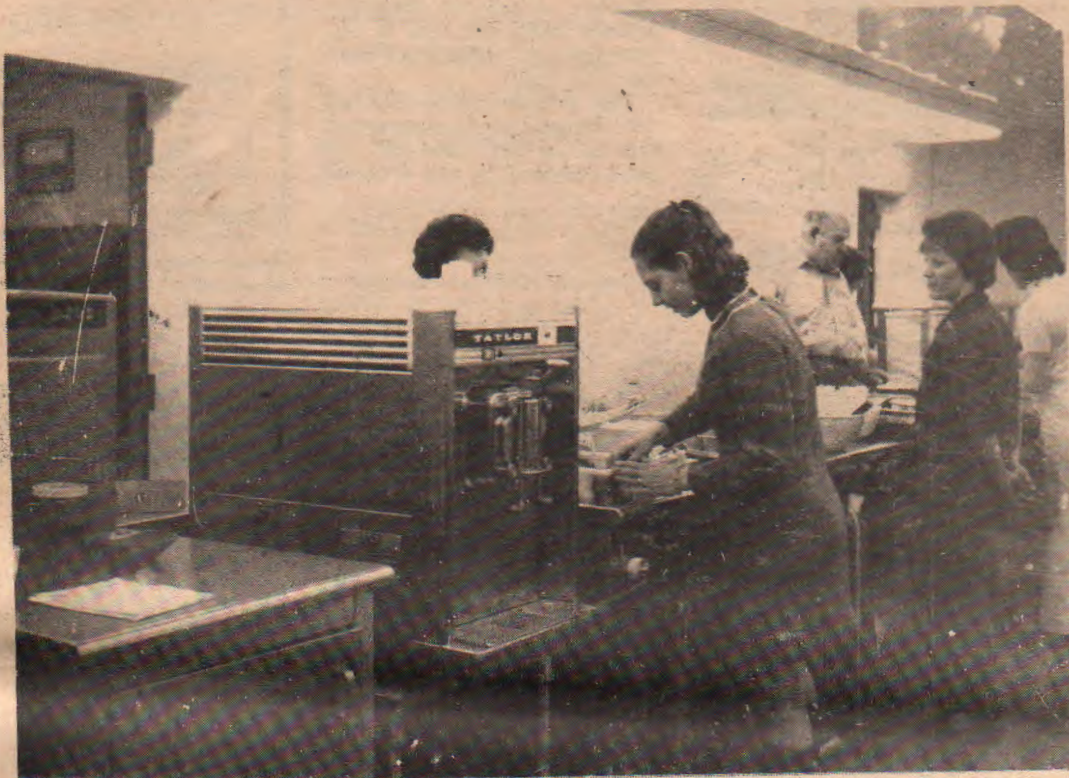

**BIRCHWOOD:** A single marijuana seedling, growing in a flower pot resulted in the arrest of four young adults and three juveniles in Birchwood last Wednesday afternoon.

State Troopers entered the residence of Calvin Abercrombie (18) in the McAllister Apartments, in search of two runaway female juveniles.

The runaways were not found, but when the Troopers recognized the plant as marijuana, they arrested Abercrombie, along with David G. Krall, Michael G. Bennet and Russell S. Fossett along with three juveniles who were in the apartment at the time.

The three juveniles were turned over to the family court. The four adults have pleaded "Not Guilty", and requested a jury trial.

Trial date has been set for March 30, 1971.

### FLOODING STREAM THREATENS EAGLE RIVER HOME

**EAGLE RIVER:** The recent spell of cold weather has caused some freezing problems for most area residents, but none as serious as those encountered by the Ralph Shipman family of Eagle River.

The Shipmans live at Mile 13 1/2 on the Old Glenn Highway. Their property lies between Meadow Creek and a small stream which flows into it.

The cold weather has caused a galaciating condition which has put all of the Shipman property under a sheet of ice. A truck and a car which were parked in their yard are buried in ice over their wheels, and on several occasions they have had to chip ditches in the ice to keep the water from flooding their basement.

Mrs. Shipman said that they had appealed to the Department of Highways for help, but were informed that beyond keeping their culverts open, they had no other responsibility. Meadow Creek at that point lies on highway right of way.

then called, and they sent a team of hydrologists to look over the situation. The only suggestion they were able to offer was to utilize a series of heat barrels to keep the streams open.

The Shipmans have finally de-

ecided that the only way to keep from flooded was to purchase a large, heavy duty gasoline operated water pump and to cut through the ice of the small stream and pump the water from there into the larger creek hoping the culverts will be able to handle the volume.

Further complications caused by the glaciering is their inability to drive into their yard.

They are forced to park their car some distance away and walk across the ice. This also means that the fuel oil delivery service is unable to drive up close enough to make a normal delivery unless the Shipmans provide additional hose to enable them to reach their tank from the road.

The Shipmans have lived at this address for two years, but this is the first time they have been troubled by this problem.

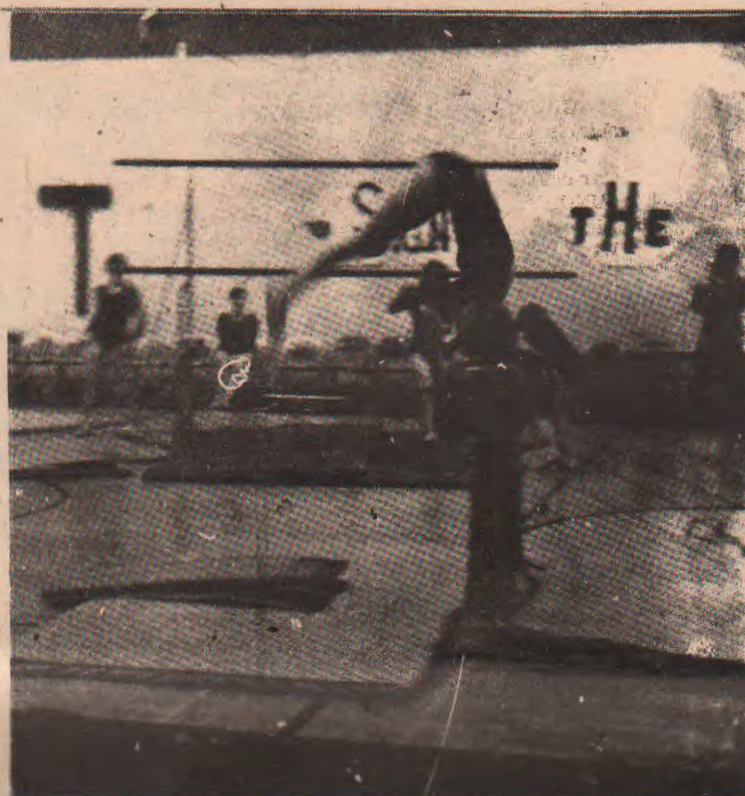
### CHS GYMNASTS TO COMPETE IN STATE MEET

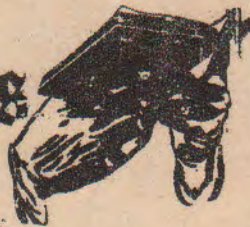

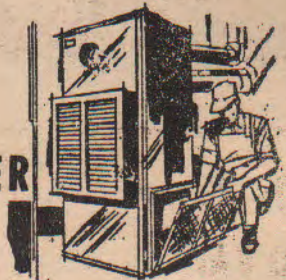

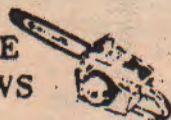

**ANSWER:** Max Clement, Manager of the Matanuska Telephone Association said that any equipment or device that is attached to one of their phones must first be approved by them.

You may bring the equipment you wish to purchase to the local MTA Office in Eagle River and they will check it out, and if it meets their approval you will be permitted to use. There is a small service charge for this inspection.

Clement warned that MTA will not offer any service to this equipment, and will charge a service call anytime it is determined that telephone malfunction may be caused by this equipment.

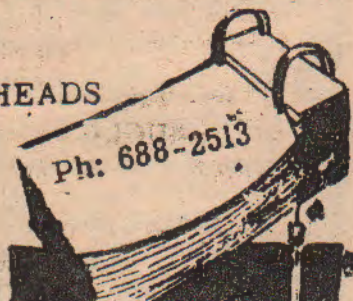

The Center owns a loom, which they don't know how to operate. If there is anyone in the community who knows how to operate on would you please come to the Center and demonstrate how to run it?

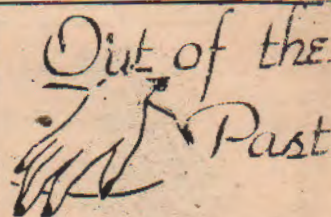
The Center also needs some qualified person to donate their time and experience to operate the well driller which is already at the Center. All materials will be furnished.

**VA SAYS VETS TO GET INSURANCE DIVIDENDS**

**JUNEAU** - The Veterans Administration has announced that Alaska veterans who served in World War I and World War II insurance policies will receive \$50,000 in dividends this year.

M. W. McDonough, director of the Juneau VA regional office, said the payments are from a record \$275 million in annual dividends. Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson has approved for distribution in 1971.

The higher dividends, McDonough noted, were made possible because of increased interest earnings of the World War I United States Government Life Insurance (USGLI) and the World War II National Service Live Insurance (NSLI) trust funds.

The 163,400 veterans with USGLI policies will receive \$20 million in dividends, averaging about \$12 apiece.

All dividends will be paid in 1971 on the anniversary dates of the policies, the Juneau VA Regional Director said.

The VA official stressed that since payment of dividends will be automatic, veterans need not write to the VA to receive payment. Veterans who have instructed VA to retain their dividends will receive appropriate statements, he advised.

Saturday saw the Bears rebounding well and shooting a fantastic percentage to overwhelm a flat-footed Chugiak five 95-72.

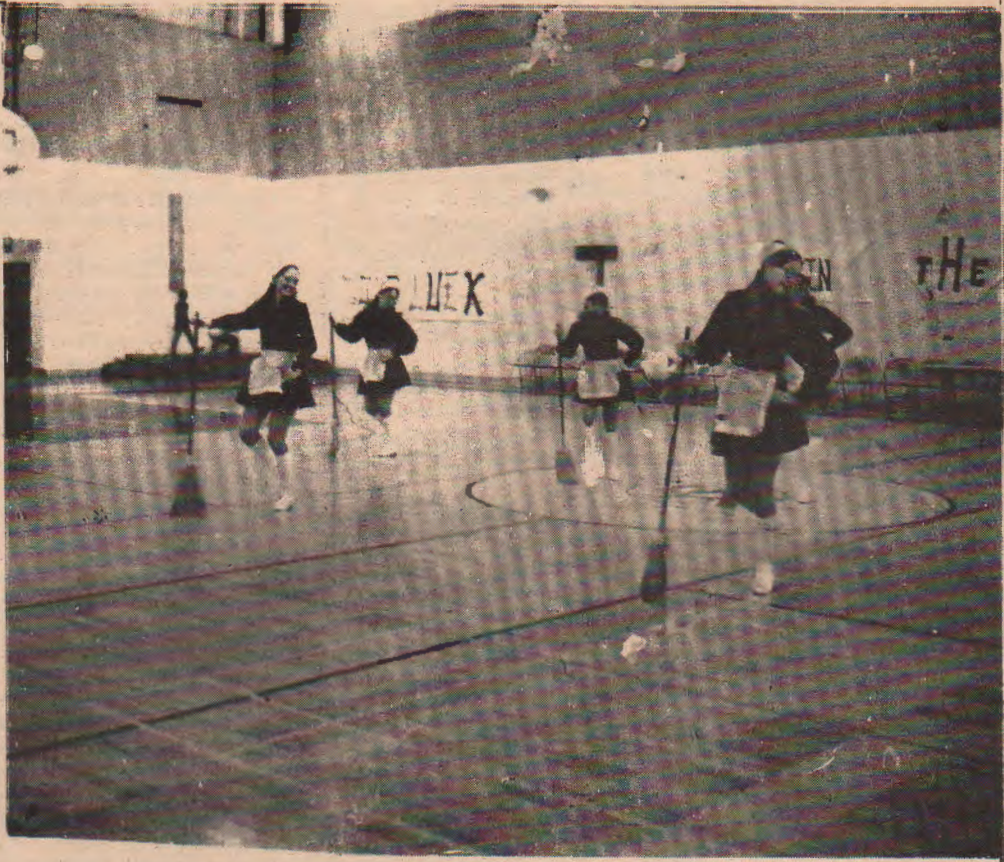
Ron Tyson was high for Chugiak Friday, and Steve Jordan led the Mustangs Saturday, with James Kerr contributing 12.

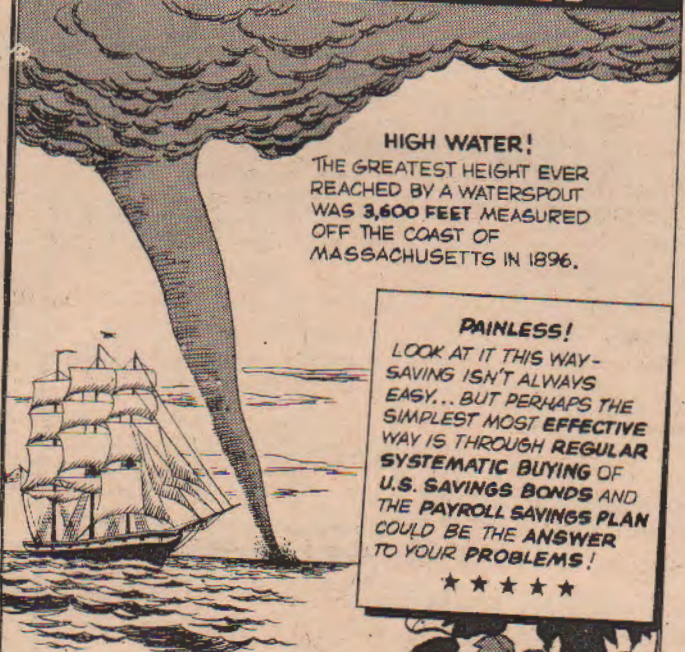
