NO NEW SCHOOL FOR CHUGIAK IF BONDS DON'T SELL

CHUGIAK: Only one Chugiak Area school project is likely to be delayed by the possibility of the GAAB School District to sell the school bonds, according to William Klingler of the GAAB School Administration. Klingler stated that the replacement building for Chugiak Elementary School would likely be delayed if the bonds are not sold.

The addition to Eagle River Elementary School and to Chugiak High School, however are all secure he reassured.

The bids have been let for those two projects, and the contractors will begin work in the spring.

Klingler stated that the replacement for the Chugiak Elementary had originally been scheduled for 1971-72, but had been set ahead for 1972-73 because of the inability to sell the bonds last year.

He stated that prospects for the bond sale this year look a little more favorable than than they did a month ago. He hoped for a favorable court ruling in June or July.

He also spoke of the proposed grade school for Eagle River Valley. He said that a site has been approved, and that it should be included in the bond issue which will appear on the ballot next fall.

He projected a completion date for that school of 1974-75

The pair spent two days in an ice cave last month hoping for weather to clear enough for them to climb down to the wreckage.

Spectacle Shoppe Had To Vacate

EAGLE RIVER: The Spectacle Shoppe, which recently opened for business in the Eagle River Shopping Center, has been forced to close that store.

Leroy Henderson, owner of the Spectacle Shoppe and the original one in the Valu Mart in Anchorage explained that he learned after opening the Eagle River Branch that the terms of his lease with Valu Mart prohibited him from operating another shop within that close proximity.

Henderson stated that he hoped that he would be able to reopen his Eagle River facility as soon as he could re-negotiate a lease with Valu Mart.

He said that Mr. Glenn Briggs of the Eagle River Shopping Center has agreed to keep the space open for him for at least one year. He hoped to be able to reopen within that time.

Henderson said that anyone who has had spectacles fitted at the Eagle River branch may bring them to the shop at Valu Mart for adjustments.

Bar License Approved

EAGLE RIVER: The Anchorage Borough Assembly reversed their vote of last month and unanimously voted to approve a liquor dispensing license for Paradise Haven, a lodge located at Mile 12 on the Eagle River Road.

Paradise Haven is being developed by John Barclay, an Eagle River Homesteader. He has long range plans which include a ski area as well as a snow machine area.

The Borough had originally denied the bar license because Barclay had failed to appear at the first public hearing. Barclay told the Assembly that he had been misinformed and was led to believe that his appearance was not necessary.

He requested a second hearing, and presented letters and testimony from eleven neighbors in that remote area supporting his request.

The Assembly as this second hearing voted to recommend to the Alcohol Beverage Control Board that the license be granted.

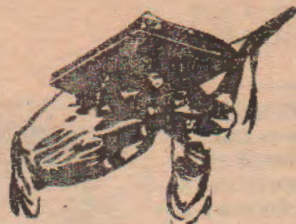

Because of the remote location of the Wallace home, the ambulance was unable to make it all the way up the road. Fire Chief Smith then proceeded for a distance in his personal car, a Volkswagon. When the VW backed down in the snow, they proceeded the rest of the way on foot and placed Mrs. Wallace who was still unconscious on a dog sled which they found at the Wallace home, and Mike Wallace and Smith pulled the sled to the Volkswagon and then transferred her to the VW which in turn was used to carry her to the ambulance.

Latest word from Providence Hospital was that she had regained some degree of consciousness, but still was unable to speak or otherwise communicate.

Mrs. Wallace had been suffering from a severe cold last week, but otherwise had not complained of being ill.

COC Views Pipeline Slides

BIRCHWOOD: A slide program, which explained details of the proposed pipeline from Prudue Bay to Valdez, was presented at the March 8th meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce, by representatives of the Alyeska Pipeline Service.

Representing Alyeska, was Mr. Frank A Therrell Jr, who is an employee of the Humble Oil, on loan to Alyeska.

Therrell, a mechanical engineer, explained the slides as they were shown, and later answered questions from the audience.

The slides showed the proposed route, as well as alternate route, and Therrell went into some detail giving the background of the pipeline project.

He described the area around Prudoe Bay as an Arctic desert, with less than 8 inches of precipitation per year.

He told of pipelines in the arctic which are located in Russia, these differing from the proposed Alaskan pipeline in that they carry natural gas rather than crude oil.

He went into detail on the the permafrost problem. He defined permafrost as terrain which remains frozen for two years or longer. This, he explained can be any material from sand to solid rock. He stated that throughout the Arctic, natural pockets of thaw exist in the permafrost.

He showed a series of slides which depicted an experiment being conducted at the university of Alaska. Here conditions of a buried pipeline have been simulated to determine the effect a heated line will have on the environment over a period of time. Sections of 40 inch culvert pipe have been buried, and air, heated to the temperature of the crude oil which the pipeline will eventually carry is blown through them at a constant rate.

Therrell stated that they estimate it will take three years to complete the pipeline once the permit is granted.

When completed and in operation, the pumping will be completely automated and run by computers.

This is the second in a series of work sessions on the Building Code, and the City Council will be sitting in with the Borough on this one.

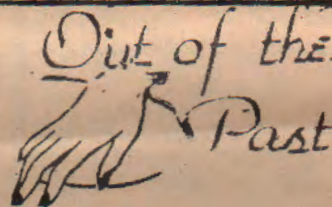
These meetings are open to the public, and any interested persons are welcome to attend.
