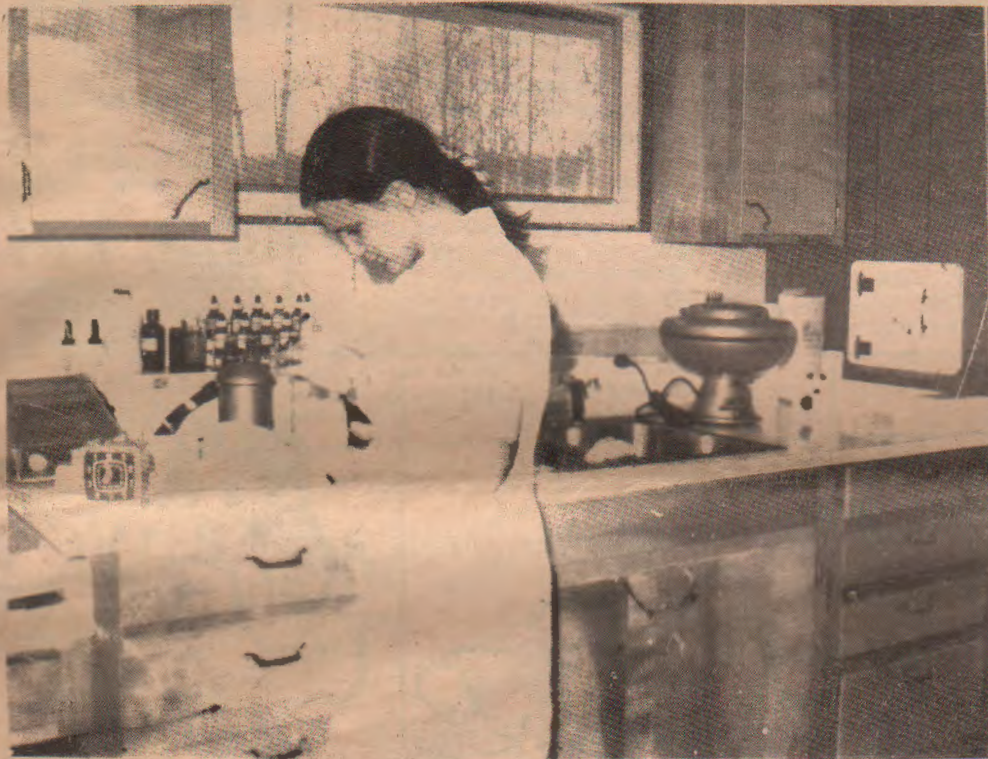

## CRASH VICTIMS PRESUMED DEAD

GULKANA: The three men who were on board the National Guard plane which crashed last month on Mt. Sanford have been officially presumed dead according to a spokesman for the Public Information Office on Ft. Richardson.

One of the three was Herbert, Alex a resident of Birchwood.

Despite this pronouncement, the Army is still attempting to get a party of mountaineers to the 14,000 foot crash site to investigate the cause of the crash and to make plans for recovery of the bodies and other property.

On Monday, at 6:30pm two mountain climbers, Ray Genet and Rex Post, both civilians were airlifted by Army helicopter to a point above the crash site. Post, who is a airline Captain with Pan American Airlines is an experienced mountaineer and has climbed Mt. McKinley with Genet.

The pair encountered high winds and sub-zero temperatures, and have holed up in an ice cave to wait.

The spokesman for the Public Information Office explained the purpose of the official presumption of death is to make the survivors eligible for insurance and other benefits in the absence of physical evidence of death.

# NEW REPORT CARD SYSTEM FOR CHUGIAK

**OLD CHUGIAK:** Approval has been given for an experimental pilot program for reporting students' grades at the Chugiak Elementary School.

According to Peter B. Zankie, Chugiak Principal, the local school is one of several in the Borough who have been approved to come up with a system of grading other than the conventional A, B, C, system.

Zankie explained that each Principal is to devise a system of his own choice, patterned after methods which have been employed in schools elsewhere in the nation.

Zankie said that some schools have substituted parent-teacher conferences for the report card. Others are using the conference plus a narrative report of the students' progress.

The system to be used at Chugiak, he said, will be a re-

port card which will grade the student as Good, Satisfactory or Needs Improvement.

The student would be graded on many other factors other than scholastic work, and the individual subject would be broken down into several concepts, with the student graded on each individual concept.

He cited as an example in the subject of reading, a student might be good in phonics, but need improvement in comprehension.

He felt the new system would give the parent a better picture of the student's progress, while at the same time remove the stigma of failure which is associated with the letter system of grading.

He sees an Honors program to reward the outstanding students, and for the student who needs improvement in most subjects, a place on the report card where it could be noted areas in which the student showed special interest. This is to present a positive picture of even the poorest student.

Zankie stated that the new report card would be presented to Chugiak students at the end of the semester. The standard report card would also be presented at that time. Next year the new type of card will also be issued, along with the

standard card.

He said that this, along with the methods of grading in the other pilot programs within the school system will be evaluated by the administration and hopefully, the one which seems to work the best adopted for all Anchorage Borough Schools.

# Vehicle Impounded At CHS

**BIRCHWOOD:** A spokesman for the Chugiak Security Patrol reported the impounding of a vehicle which had been left overnight at the parking lot of Chugiak High School.

The car was in the way of a snow removal contractor.

According to the Security Patrol, any unauthorized vehicles left at any of the school grounds is subject to impoundment. This entails a \$30 impoundment fee, plus a charge of \$1.50 per day for storage before the owner may reclaim the vehicle.

If the car is there because of a mechanical breakdown, or for any other valid reason, the owner should contact the Security Patrol at 694-2187, and they will keep a check on the car and see that it is not bothered.

In the case of the vehicle above, a parent had left the car with the keys in it to be available to the their son when he returned from an away athletic event.

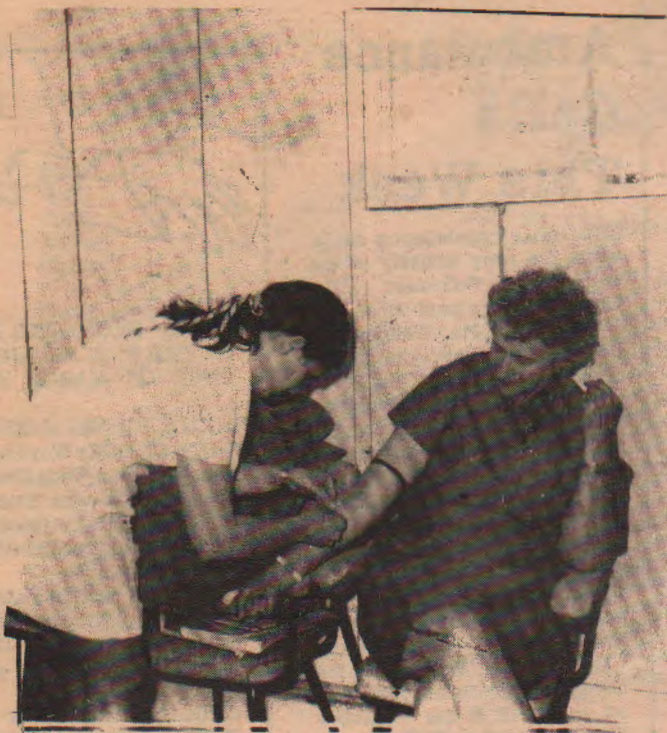

member of Dr. Green's staff, will assist the Doctor in making more rapid diagnosis than in the past when all lab work had to be farmed out.

With a lab on the premises Mrs. Ferrell can conduct blood and urine tests, test for pregnancy, VD, parasites and lab work.

Mrs. Ferrell, who came to Alaska a month and a half ago lives on Cherry Hill at Elmendorf with her husband who is a Captain in the Air Force and a navigator on F4 Phantom aircraft. He recently returned from service in Thailand. Mrs. Ferrell's home state is South Dakota, and she finds Alaskan winters not different.

The addition of the lab, along with the X-Ray facilities and operating room for minor surgery, rounds out the medical services offered by Dr. Green. Still to be completed is a pediatric examining room, next to the lab.

Dr. Green stated that the next major addition he hoped to see was another Doctor in the area, one who would preferably share his clinic fac-

ilities.

This would relieve the load he now carries, and offer around the clock medical care for the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area.

**Ambulance Calls This Week**

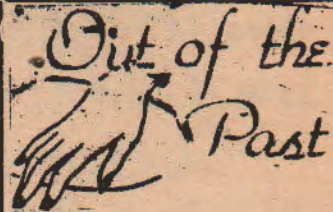
CHUGIAK: Ambulance calls were the only activity of the two local Volunteer Fire Companies this past week.
