## Home Brewed Drugs Are Worst Threat

EAGLE RIVER: A "home brewed" variety of narcotics poses the greatest danger to local youth. This information was presented to the Board of Directors of the GOAL Community Council by a representative of the Alaska State Troopers.

Mrs. Elva Connell, president of GOAL, told the Knik Arm Courier that the special narcotics investigator who addressed the board explained that the youngsters are concocting this "home brew" from medicine cabinet variety of drugs, particularly cold remedies, and then shooting the product into their veins.

Mrs. Connell said it was explained that the dangers of this variety of narcotic are unpredictable, since the ingredients often vary.

She said they were told by the Trooper that up to 90% of the junior and senior high students at Chugiak were using marijuana. They were also told that since marijuana is now in short supply, many of the youth are taking to manufacturing the "home brew" variety of drugs.

Mrs. Connell also said she learned that youngsters who have been using this "home brew" may be cured by any doctor, and parents should not hesitate to take their child to a doctor if they have reason to suspect he or she has been using it. Also, they learned that anyone with any information concerning the use of any type of narcotics by students or adults should contact David W. McNair, at 610 C St. (Room 210) in Anchorage, or call him at the office of Drug, Abuse, Prevention and Education.

Mrs. Connell said they also learned that there is very little problem with the use of the so-called "hard" narcotics in this area. This was thought to be because of the close-knit nature of this community and the suspicion of strangers. They were told that most drug pushers at Chugiak turned out to be former students.

OLD CHUGIAK: Fire of an undetermined origin completely destroyed that trailer home of Mr. and Mrs. M.D. Patro, at McKinley Heights last Saturday.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Patro were at home when the fire was discovered.

A delay in reporting the fire was experienced due to the fact that Mrs. Patro dialed the operator and asked her to call the Fire Department.

The operator called the Anchorage City Fire Department who in turn called the Borough Fire Department.

They called the Eagle River Fire Company, who transmitted the information to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co.

This delay caused the call from getting in as soon as it could have, however, a number of the firemen who were standing by at the Winter Carnival at the Chugiak Elementary School spotted the smoke and dispatched the equipment before the call came through.

Fire Chief Fred Smith said the double wheel trailer was completely involved by the time they arrived. They used four tankers of water and the pumper stood by the entire time.

Mr. Patro estimated the loss of the trailer and the contents at \$24,000. The Patros had no fire insurance.

Chief Smith said they experienced considerable trouble with people trying to drive up and see the fire. Some became stuck on the steep road and the fire trucks had difficulty getting around them.

This was replaced by a new pump which should have solved the problem, but unbeknownst to the maintenance staff, the deep well pump had also burned out.

## Obedience Fun Match Winners Are Announced



The hometown boys trailed the whole game but tied it up 53-53 with 20 seconds remaining. Then Ellison's John Liptac was fouled with exactly 2 seconds remaining on the clock and went to the line with a chance to win it all. He missed, but do-everything Alton Cranford leaped over the straining Palmer defenders to tap in the rebound and relegate the Palmer Moose to the consolation match against Chugiak.

So the Mustangs hopes were fulfilled. Once again they would meet arch-rival Palmer, a team that had beaten them 3 times during the regular season.

For Chugiak seniors this would be their last game, and how they wanted revenge!

Things looked bad from the start as the Big Bad Moose leaped to a 10-2. But then the Mustangs settled into their control offense to bring the score to a 10-9 at the end of the first quarter.

In a tight see-saw battle the Mustangs came out on top and left the floor at intermission leading 27-24.

Returning to the game, the teams followed the familiar style: Butch Ehman and Dave Covich hitting inside and outside for Palmer, and Steve Jordan shooting and assisting team mates Ron tyson, Mike Harris, Rod Willis and James Kerr for Chugiak.

The Moose would run and gun while the Mustangs would sometimes hold the ball for two minutes before finding the open shot or lay-in. So the galloping Mustangs widened the lead to 5 points by the end of the third quarter.

But the Moose weren't finished. They whittled away at the Mustang lead until they trailed 47-45 with a minute remaining in the game. There were several missed baskets during those tense seconds until Jeff Lawton sank the basket that put the game into a 3 minute overtime period.

Butch Ehman fouled out of the game in the fourth quarter so Palmer was with ut the man who had come through many times in clutch situations. Then Chugiak's Steve Jordan fouled out in the overtime. So that overtime produced stars of it's own with Mike Harris sinking 1 of the 2 charity shots and Fred Herbert putting it out of reach with a four-footer.

Palmer's Lawton sank 2 free throws to bring the Moose within one, but time ran out at last - the score was 50-49.

In the Championship game, Kodiak was never in trouble.

The Bears could do nothing wrong and it seemed that the Ellison Ravens could do nothing right. After leading at halftime 36-34, Kodiak came on strong to win it all. 76-57. An so goes high-school basketball.

The All-Tournament team consisted of Kodiak's Robert Foster and Mike Slagle, Ellison's Alton Cranford, Shane McAfee and Scott Gilmore, Palmer's Butch Ehman, Dave Covich and Jeff Williams, Chugiak's Steve Jordan and Ron Tyson.

Kodiak received the sportsmanship award and the Chugiak Mustang's Varsity Cheerleaders took their second consecutive Championship, under the sponsorship of Sally Callaway.

These handbills will be available at most local business establishments, and will also be distributed by local newspaper carriers.

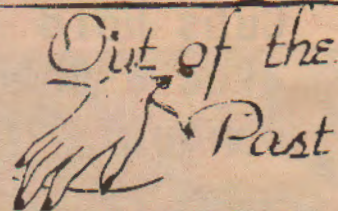
Each weekend the theater management will hold a drawing. The person who has a handbill which has a serial number which corresponds with the number drawn, will be given two free passes to the show the following weekend.
