

Home Brewed FIRE DESTROYS TRAILER HON Drugs Are Worst Threat OLD CHUGIAK: Fire of an un-

EAGLE RIVER: A "Home brewed" variety of narcotics poses the greatest danger to local youth. This informat-ion was presented to the Board of Directors of the GOAL Community Council by an representative of the Alaska State Troopers.

Mrs. Elva Connell, presid-ent of GOAL, told the Knik Ar Courier that the special nar-cotis investigator who addressed the board explained that the youngsters are cont-octing this "home brew" from drugs, particularly cold rem-idies, and then shooting the idies, and then shootin product into their veins.

Mrs. Connell said it was ex-plained that the dangers of this variety of narcotic are unpredicitible, since the in-gredients ofter vary. She said they were told by

the Trooper that up to 90% o: the junior and senior high stu-dents at Chugiak were using marijauna. They were also marijauna. They were also told that since marijauna is now in short supply, many o the youth are taking to manufacturing the "home brew' variety of drugs.

Mrs. Connell also said the learned that youngsters wh have been using this "home have been using this hours brew" may be cured by any doctor, and parents should not hesitate to take their child to a doctor if they have reason to suspect he or she have been using it. Also, they learned that anyone with any inform-ation concerning the use of any type of narcotics by students or adults should contact ents of adults should conduct David W. McNair, at 610 C St. (Room 210) in Anchorage, or call him at the office of Drug, Abuse, Prevention and Education.

Mrs. Connell said they also learned that there is very little problem with the use of the so-called "hard" marcot-ics in this area. This was thought to be because of the close-knit nature of this com-munity and the suspicion of strangers. They were told strangers. They were told that most drug pushers at Chugiak turned out to be former students.



CHUGIAK THIRD IN CLASS "A" REDIONAL TOURNEY

The Kodiak Bears were the winners of the Western Alaska Class A Basketball tournament as the took their "first ever" championship with a decisive 76-57 victory over Eilson's Ravens last Saturday night at Palmer. To get into Saturday's fin-

ale, the Bears to to overcome a determined bunch of Mustangs from Chugiak on Friday night.

The Mustangs started slow, and trailed 7-0 before Steve Jordan sand a 20 footer.

Working for a sure basket, Chugiak pulled within three by the end of the first quarter and drew first blood in the second quarter to trall 15-14. But that was a close as they ever got. Late in the fourth quarter the Mustangs pulled within three points of the much taller Bears several times, but could never get the go-ahead basket.

Kodiak stretched the lead to six by the end of the game to the hard fought battle take

81-75. In the second game Friday, Eilson AFB of Fairbanks de feated the favored Palmer Mooose 55-53 at the busser. The hometown boys trailed the whole game but tiet it up 53-53 with 20 seconds rem-aining. Thea Eilson's John Liptac was fouled with exactly 2 seconds remaining on the clock and went to the line with a chance to win it all. He miss ed, but do-everything Alton Cranford leaped over the straining Palmer defenders to tap in the rebound and relegate the Palmer Moose to the consolation match against Chugiak,

So the Mustangs hopes were fulfilled. Once again they would meet arch-rival Palmer, a team that had beaten them 3 times during the reguar season.

For Chugiak seniors this would be their last game, and how they wanted revenge!

Things looked bad from the start as the Big Bad Moose leaped to a 10-2. But then the Mustangs settled into their control offense to bring the score to a 10-9 at the end of the first quarter.

In a tight see-saw battle the Mustangs came out on top and left the floor at intermission leading 27-24.

Returning to the game, the teams followed the familiar style: Butch Ehman and Dave Covich hitting inside and outside for Palmer, and Steve Jordan shooting and assisting team mates Ron tyson, Mike Harris, Rod Willis and James Kerr for Chugiak.






