# LOCAL BUILDERS FACED WITH PERMITS, FEES, INSPECTIONS IF ORDINANCE PASSES

## BAND TO GIVE CONCERT

**BIRCHWOOD:** The Chugiak High School Music Department will present the annual Spring Concert on Friday, April 16th in the CHS Gym.

The program begins at 8pm, and there will be an admission charge to defray expenses for items not available through normal budgetary procedures, such as awards and extra music needed throughout the year.

The admission charge will be, adults, \$1.00, students in grades 7 through 12, \$1.50, and children under 12, .75¢.

It is hoped to have a baby-sitting service available at a nominal fee for those who do not wish to bring very young children to the concert.

## MEA ANNUAL MEETING SAT.

April 17 the Matanuska Electric Association's membership will fill three two-year vacancies on its board of directors, picking from a currently announced field of eight candidates. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor.

The election is to take place at the association's annual meeting, planned Saturday, April 17, at the Central school gymnasium in Palmer at 8 p.m. Guest speaker at the meeting will be Robert W. Ward, administrator of the Alaska Power Administration, an agency under federal Interior Department jurisdiction.

**ANCHORAGE:** Building permits, inspections and inspections fees will be required throughout the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, upon the adoption of Ordinance 31-71, which cover building codes.

This ordinance is up for public hearing at 8:00pm on April 19th at the School Administration Building, 670 Fireweed Lane in Anchorage.

This Ordinance, if passed, would require a building permit for all structures, and one plumbing inspection, 1 electrical inspection. It would also set the fees for such inspections, which would range from \$3.00 to \$65.00 depending on the evaluation of the structure.

Ed Willis, Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak Area stated that an alternate Ordinance is being proposed by Assemblymen from

**DALE BRIGGS, LOCAL CANDIDATE TO THE MEA BOARD**

Under Federal Interior Department jurisdiction.

Biographical information on the eight candidates follow.

**DALE BRIGGS**

Dale Briggs, an incumbent, has been an Eagle River resident since 1944.

Briggs is running for the board, he says, because "I am interested in development of the community through MEA." He adds that "someone has to do the job, and if I can help I am willing to do so.

Briggs is a mechanic and is president of the Chugiak Benefit Association and a member of the American Federation of Government Employees. He served three years in the U.S. Army.

Ordinance is being proposed by Assemblymen from inside the City. This Ordinance would attempt to retain authority for establishing the building codes for structures within the city limits in the city, and not relegate it to the borough.

Willis stated that it is likely that neither version of the ordinance will get enough votes to pass.

Following the hearing on the Building Code Ordinance a hearing on the Borough Budget will be held.

**MOUNTAIN CLIMBERS FEARED LOST IN SLIDE**

**EKLUTNA LAKE:** Rescue efforts are underway for a pair of mountain climbers believed to have been caught in an avalanche on Eklutna Glacier.

The pair, Dr. Grace Hoeman and Hans Vanderliann, both of Anchorage, were climbing near the glacier when the avalanche occurred. A third climber, John Samuelson, also of Anchorage, escaped the slide and tried to find the other two. Failing to locate them, he managed to walk to Mirror Lake where he sought help of the Alaska State Troopers.

The accident took place some time on Monday. Samuelson arrived at the Mirror Lake Post on Tuesday morning.

The State Troopers contacted the Alaska Air Command Rescue Coordination Center, who dispatched a H3 helicopter from the 5040th Helicopter Squadron from Elmendorf.

The copter picked up Samuelson at Mirror Lake and proceeded to Eklutna Lake.

Low ceiling conditions at the scene of the accident prevented them from conducting a search from the copter, so a

base camp was set up at the base of the glacier. Fifteen soldiers from Ft. Richardson, a State Trooper and Samuelson then were planning to set out on foot and try to locate Dr. Hoeman and Vanderliann.

Dr. Hoeman's husband, also a mountain climber, was killed while attempting to climb Mt. Everest several years ago.

**CHUGIAK MAN HURT IN COLLISION**

**FT. RICHARDSON:** A Birchwood man was seriously injured in a head-on collision which took the life of an Anchorage woman early last Saturday morning.

The accident took place at mile 10 on the Glenn Highway at approximately 3:05am.

The victim was Mrs. Mary Lou Johnson, age 21, who had been a passenger in a 1957 Chevrolet driven by her hus-

band, Forrest D. Johnson. The driver of the second vehicle, a 1964 Chevrolet, was Charles W. Watson, of Birchwood Loop Road.

Both Johnson and Watson suffered major injuries and were transported to hospitals; Watson to Providence, and Johnson to the 5040 Air Force Hospital.

Complete details of the accident have not been released pending completion of investigation.

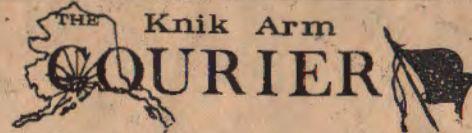

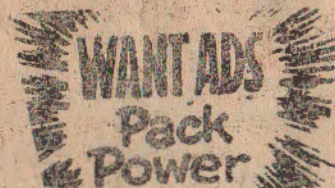
