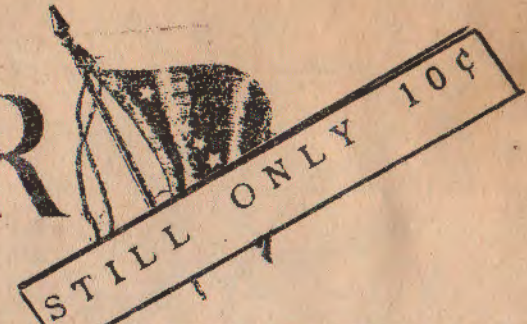

PUBLIC HEARING ON EAGLE RIVER ROAD NEXT TUESDAY

CHS BAND & CHOIR TO BE IN MUSIC FESTIVAL

ANCHORAGE: The Chugiak High School Band and Choir will participate in the Western Division Alaska High School Music Festival which takes place from April 21 thru April 24th at West Anchorage High School.

On Wednesday, April 21st, the Chugiak High School band will be adjudicated on prepared selections by Bernard Stiner from the University of Wisconsin and Butler Eitel from the University of Montana. This will take place in the auditorium at West High.

On Thursday, April 22nd, these same gentlemen will judge the band on sight reading during the school day at Chugiak High School.

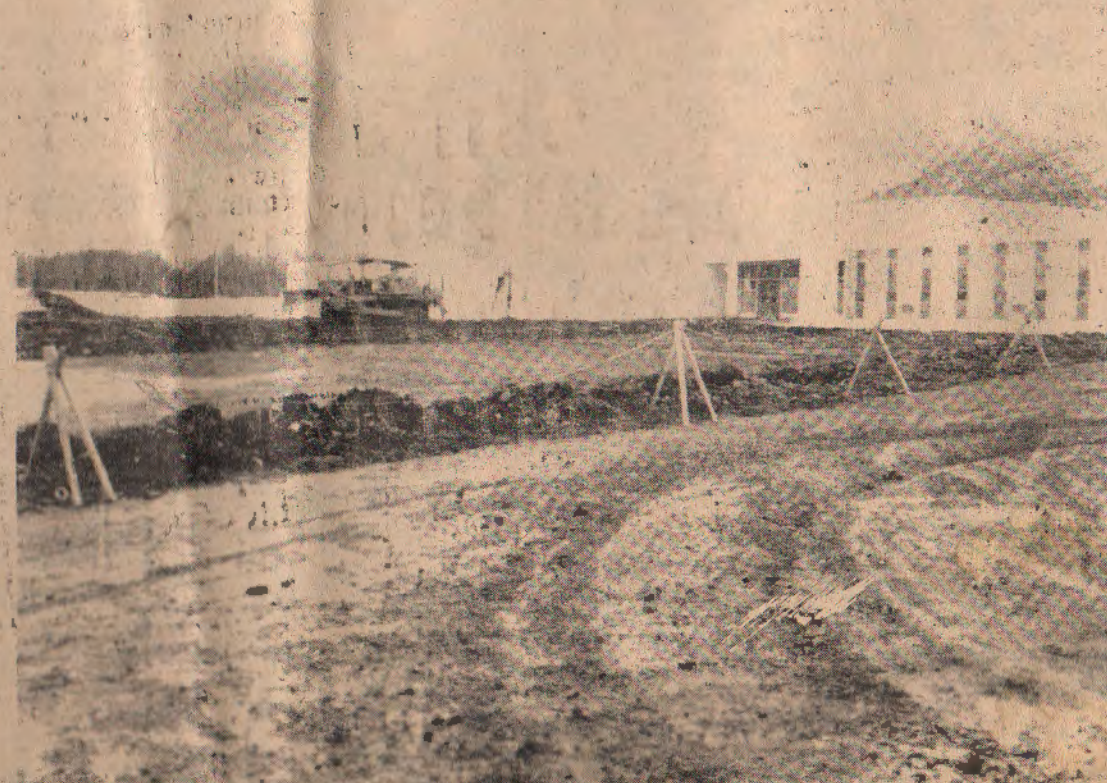
Friday and Saturday, April 23rd and 24th, will be spent by the students in rehearsal with other students from all over North and Central Alaska.

ACTION ON BUILDING CODE DELAYED

ANCHORAGE: Assembly action on Boroughwide building codes has been delayed two weeks, following the public hearing last Monday night.

Ed Willis, Assemblyman from the Greater Chugiak Area explained that action was delayed because of pending State legislation which would revise municipal building codes. This legislation, if passed would permit municipal areas to adopt a different building code than areas outside municipalities.

The Greater Anchorage Area Borough has been proceeding on the premise that Building Codes were a boroughwide power, under the Planning and



EAGLE RIVER: A public hearing which will concern the design of the design for improvement of Eagle River Road will be held next Tuesday, April 27th at the Eagle River Elementary School starting at 7:30am.

The proposed construction will begin at Eagle River Loop and consist of two 12 foot driving lanes with 8 foot paved shoulders.

From Eagle River Loop Rd. to the end of the project will be two 12 foot driving lanes with 6 foot paved shoulders.

Right of way acquisition is to be sufficient to allow adequate maintenance of side slopes.

A complete explanation of the proposed project will be presented at the public hearing, including the tentative schedules for right of way acquisition and for construction.

The Highway Department's right of way policies and details of the relocation assistance program will also be discussed at the hearing.

WORK BEGINS ON CHS ADDITION

BIRCHWOOD: Groundbreaking for the new addition to Chugiak High School began last week.

The existing building will be enlarged on three sides, according to Eldon King, Chugiak High Principal.

On the front of the building, extending into half of the existing parking lot, there will be a new library and six new classrooms. On the North end (toward the hockey rink) the addition will include a new music department and industrial arts complex.

On the East side of the building (adjacent to the gymnasium) there will be two exercise rooms for the physical education department.

When completed the main entry to the building will be through the new addition at the front, with hallways leading back to the original building. The location of the school office will be unchanged.

Completion date for construction is August 15th, and occupancy for the beginning of the fall semester is anticipated.

BLEAK WATER PROSPECTS AT CHUGIAK ELEM

OLD CHUGIAK: Prospects of getting a producing well appear bleak at the Chugiak Elementary School.

The Hatch Drilling Company who have the contract for the new well have already capped off a 500 foot dry hole and have moved over onto another site.

They are presently down to the 225 foot level in the new hole and have still not found a flow of water sufficient to supply the school.

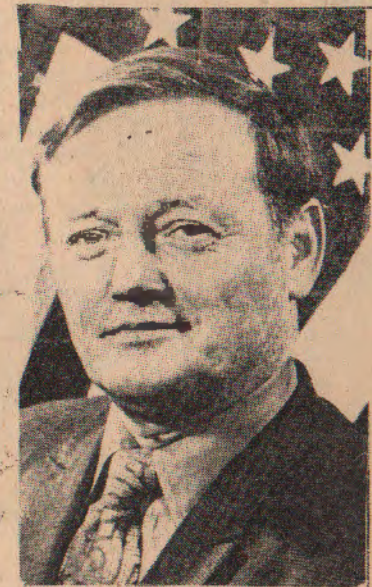


LIEUT. GOV. TO SPEAK

Chapter President, Mrs. Abner Clark, opened the meeting. Business included accepting an invitation to be present at Omicron Chapter's Jewel Ritual.

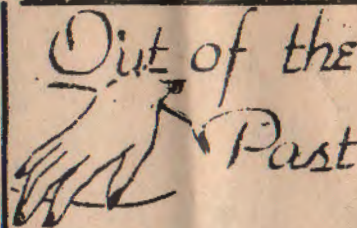

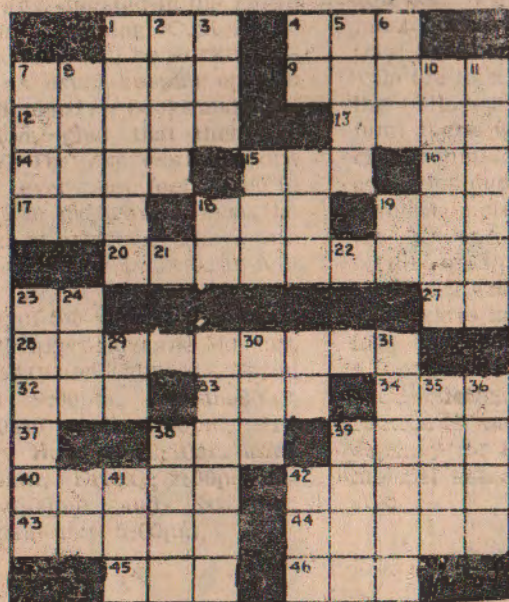

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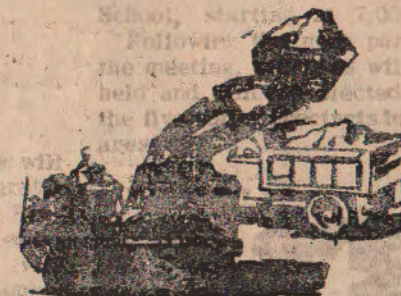
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S TUDDER TIRES SOON TO BE ILLEGAL

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Elementary School has been selected as the site for the public hearing on the Glenn Highway Improvement (Project F042-1 (38) which extends from the Ski Bowl Road to Eagle River at a point approximately the Artillery Road connector.

The project calls for a high type four lane divided highway consisting of two 12 foot driving lanes with 10 foot shoulders on the outside and 4 foot shoulders on the inside, these to be separated by a 36 foot grass median. Grade separations will be provided at major intersections and frontage roads will be constructed to serve adjacent property.

All intersections will be illuminated and all side slopes and the median will be topsoiled and seeded.

There will be a steel and concrete structure bridging Eagle River downstream from the existing bridge.

Plans and exhibits showing details of the project as well as written views received from public agencies are available for inspection and copying at the Design Section office located at the Highway Department's compound at 1306 East 4th Avenue, Anchorage (3rd Floor, 1st Building on the right).

A complete explanation of the proposed project will be presented at the public hearing, including the tentative schedules for right-of-way acquisition and for construction.

The Highway Department's right-of-way policies and details of the relocation assistance program will also be discussed at the hearing.

JUNEAU: Commissioner of Highways, B. A. Campbell, has announced that studded tires must be removed from all vehicles using paved State highway between May 1, 1971 and September 15, 1971.

The Department of Public Safety will begin enforcing this requirement after May 1, 1971. Warnings will be issued until May 31, after which citations will be issued.

Commissioner Campbell stated that, "Extensive and unnecessary damage is resulting from the continued use of studded tires on the pavements which are bare of ice or snow.

There are no safety benefits from the use of studded tires on bare pavements and in fact the excessive heavy wear causes damage to the pavement surface which creates

safety hazards and thereby increases the chance for accidents."

Commissioner Campbell stated further, "The Department of Highways has conducted an extensive study of the damage caused by the studded tires and we are now convinced that the repair of this damage will cost millions of dollars unless the use of the studded tire is eliminated during the months when the pavements are bare."

"This restriction on studded tires is the best measure to take for the safety of the driving public and the wise use of the taxpayers dollar."

Time To Spare

"I hear all this talk about time for doing things in the retirement years," writes a Mississippi lady who retired after 30 years in a department store. She adds: "It didn't work out that way for me. I have become an unpaid babysitter for several grand children and frequently have to cook for two families. I guess I don't really mind it, but I do wonder how my children and grand-children got along before I had all this time on my hands."

The truth of the matter, of course, is that they 'got along', probably very well.

The babysitting trap is a natural for dotting grandparents. Often, it starts out easily enough, during some special emergency . . . and the emergency is extended into a matter of routine. It's more convenient to take the kids to grandma; cheaper, too.

"But, what's a grandmother to do?" asks the lady.

Simple. A grandmother should help when help is needed but should not, in the retirement years, become a slave to her children and their families. Someone who has worked for 30 years deserves something better.

Exclusive of emergencies, a

grandmother should decide when children are to visit her and when everyone is invited over for dinner. Grandmother isn't being hard when she sets the terms, she is being realistic. In the final analysis, both children and grand-children will respect her more for her independence.

The retirement years should offer a certain amount of independence. Obligations remain, of course, but when one doesn't have to punch a time clock there becomes a certain amount of freedom in the choice of what one wishes to do, or wishes not to do.

"How does a grandmother say 'no?'" the lady asks.

She can say it outright. Or, she can find herself another obligation. A part-time job. Club or civic work. Church activities. There are many opportunities. Grandmother becomes an unpaid babysitter simply because she has nothing else to do and because she is willing to accept the assignment. If she is unwilling, or if she has something else of her own to do, other arrangements will be made.

After all, everyone got along when grandma was working nine to five.

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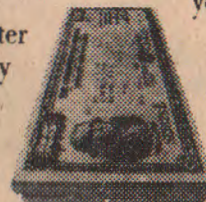

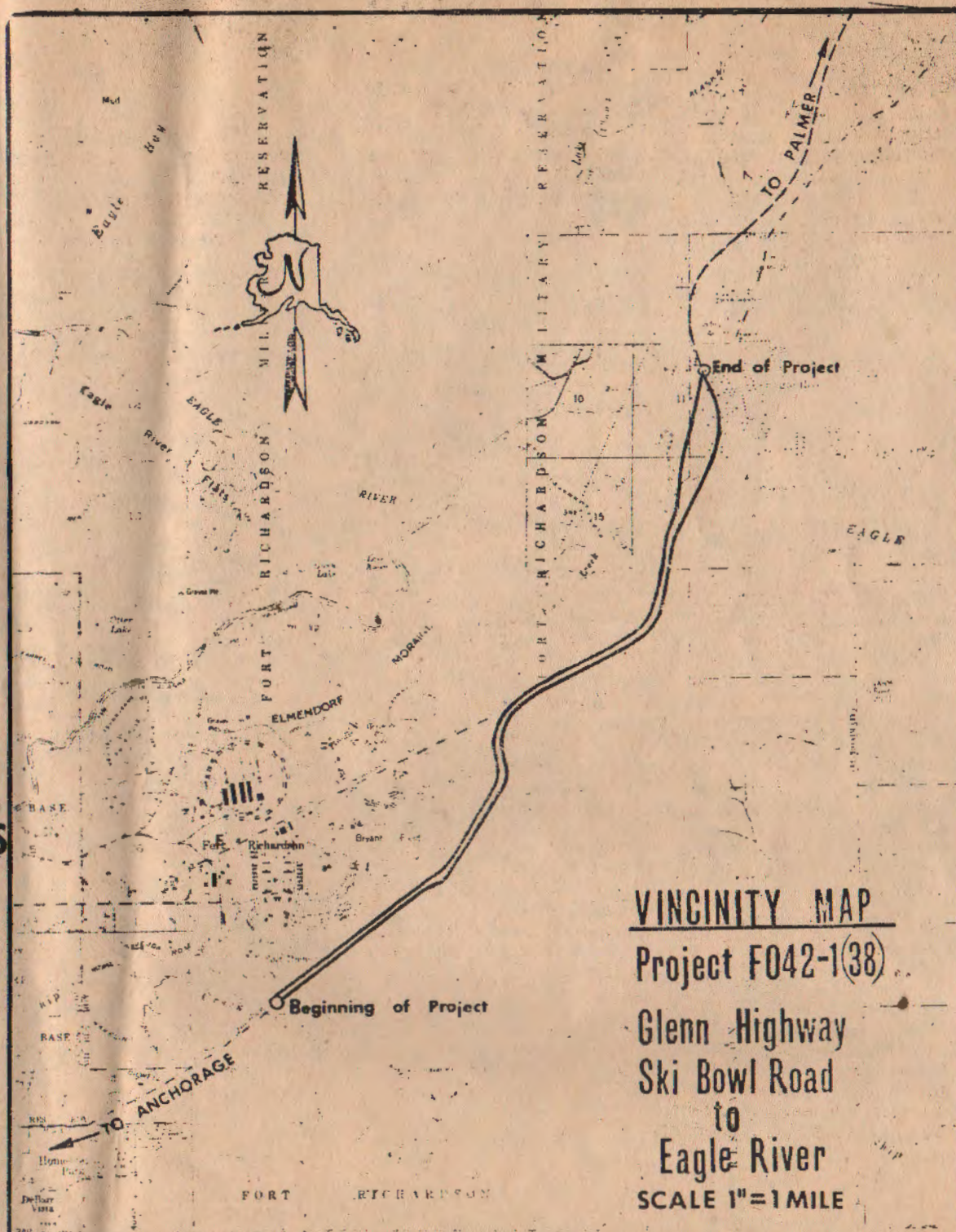
