MANUFACTURING PLANT TO BEGIN PRODUCTION HERE SOON

LOCAL MAN IS APPARENT SUICIDE

OLD CHUGIAK: Private funeral services are pending at Evergreen Memorial Chapel for Clayton Wolford, of Chugiak, who was found dead last Sunday, the victim of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Wolford's body was discovered in an abandoned vehicle at the Chugiak Carnival grounds by the caretaker. He had apparently shot himself in the head with a shotgun. The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance received the call at approximately 8:00am Sunday morning. Wolford appeared to have been dead for several hours at that time.

WELL INFO NOT CORRECT

OLD CHUGIAK: Information given to the Knik Arm Courier last week concerning the well being drilled at the Chugiak Elementary School was not correct, it has been learned.

Mr. Ken Hatch, owner of Hatch Drilling Co., contractors for the well, stated that the 500 foot well was not a dry hole, as had been originally stated, but was a producing well. He explained that the well was capped off to protect it until such time as it was tied in to the school water system.

HEARING OFFICER RECOMMENDS DENIAL OF PERMIT

ANCHORAGE: The Hearing Examiner, in the matter of the Application of a Common Carrier permit by Rosebud Refuse, of Eagle River has requested that the Transportation Commission deny the application.

Hearing Officer William K. Jernain listed among the reasons for this recommendation that the applicant could only show minimal assets, that the applicant's equipment is inadequate and that in his opinion the applicants' experience falls short of that necessary for granting a permit.

Jake Johnson, Transportation Commissioner pointed out that this recommendation does not represent a final determination of the matter by the Commission.

This decision will be issued subsequent to review of the proposed decision and any written exceptions, briefs or support which may be filed by any party of record.

Interested parties may within twenty days after the issuance of this proposed decision, file with the Commission written exceptions and briefs and support thereof.

If no such timely filing is made the proceedings without more will stand submitted for the final decision of the Commission. If a timely filing is made, the parties of record shall have 10 days after the service of the exceptions and briefs for reply. At the expiration of this latter date, the proceeding without more will stand submitted for the final decision.

Copies of all exceptions and briefs must be furnished to the parties hereto, including the Alaska Transportation Commission.

ART SHOW STARTS THIS FRIDAY

BIRCHWOOD: The fifth Annual Spring Art Show starts this Friday, April 30th at 10am in the Team Teaching Room at Chugiak High School.

Sponsored by the Chugiak Ladies Club, this show features the works of Adult and Junior Artists from Anchorage and the Matanuska Valley as well as from the Greater Chugiak Area.

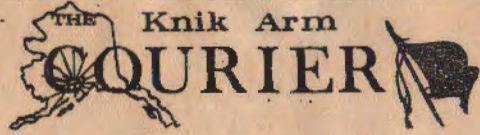
The Styrene Steak House will be open for breakfast, lunch and dinners, specializing in steak dinners. They extend a special welcome to catered banquets.

BIDS FOR EAGLE RIVER SEWER TO BE OPENED

ANCHORAGE: Bids for construction of the Eagle River Sanitary Sewerage Project will be opened at 2:00pm on May 11th at the Borough Office Building, 3500 Tudor Road, according to Robert Morriss, director of the Borough's Department of Public Works.

The project consists of construction of approximately 12,954 feet of lateral sewage line, 2,568 feet of trunk line, a 2.6 million gallon areated lagoon chlorine contact chamber and outfall. The work is scheduled to be completed by October 15th of this year.

Since the Farmers Home Administration is financing the project, FHA approval of the construction contract will be required.

Dear Sir:

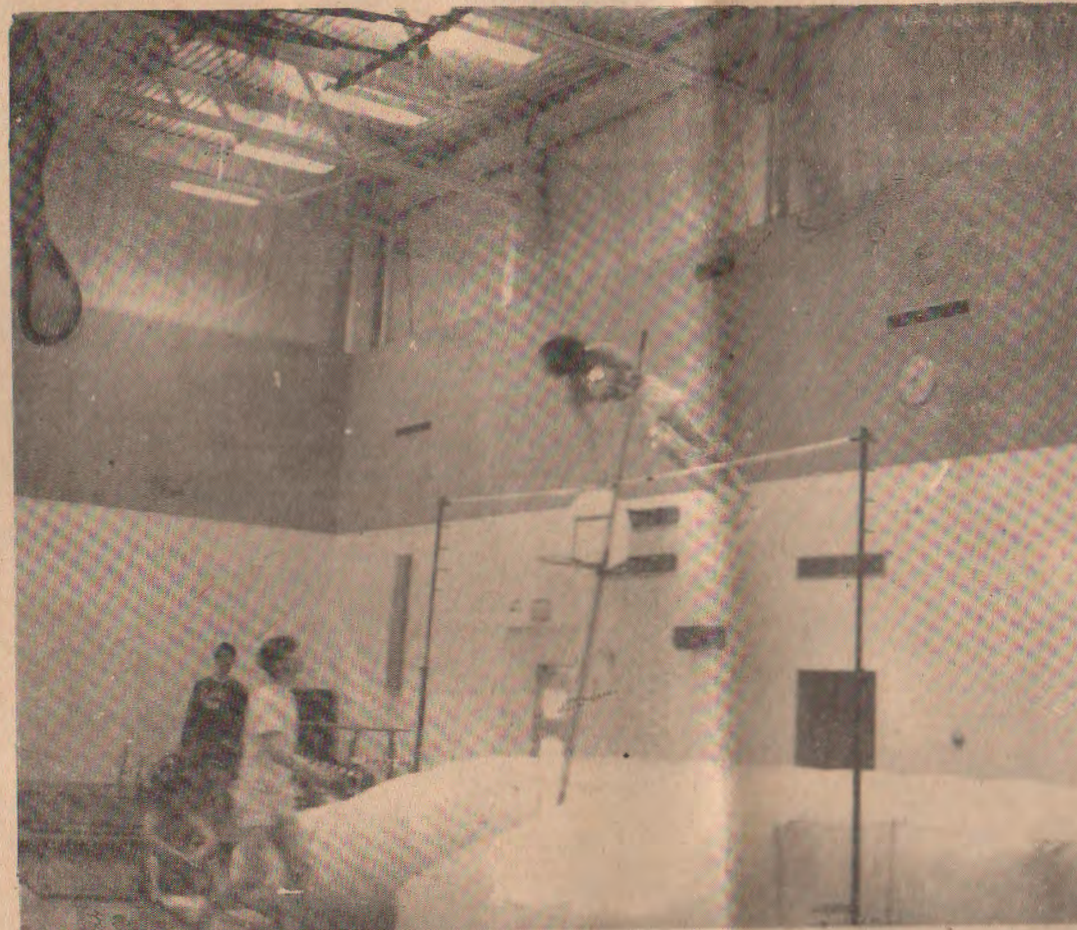

Guide Adds Rock Data

The new edition of The Milepost is off the press with a new addition — a section for the “rock hounds.”

The guidebook on traveling the Alaska Highway in its 23rd edition also features an updated mile by mile fishing guide, according to field editor Helen A. White.

The 1971 version contains 62 more pages than the 1970 book, with five of the additional pages presented as a “Rock Hound’s Guide.” Plans are for this new feature to be expanded in later editions.

As in the past year, the book contains a mile-by-mile guide on traveling the Alaska Highway plus suggests a number of side trips. Facts are also given on ferry and air travel.

Maps of 28 communities, all but four of them in Alaska, are also incorporated into the guidebook.

Timber Inventory Sought By Stevens To Cost \$975,000

A \$975,000 inventory of the timber resources on Alaska’s Bureau of Land Management land has been recommended by U. S. Sen. Ted Stevens.

Stevens, testifying before the Senate Interior Appropriations Subcommittee, said such an inventory will provide information necessary to insure the “prudent development of our timber resources.”

These resources, he observed, are renewable when harvested in accordance with sound conservation practices.

The timber resources on the BLM land can help meet the national and regional demand for wood products for housing and other important industries, he said.

Stevens added, “This appropriation will be returned many times over in better yields producing more federal revenues.”

Stevens made his request to the Senate Interior Appropriations subcommittee. He said the biological station would be used to gather information to develop a non-resident fishing industry on the reservation as well as provide state and federal agencies information for various programs.

The Tyonek Indians plan to develop a fishing industry similar to one begun on the White Mountain Apache Reservation in Arizona which Stevens said, brings the Apaches approximately \$1 million a year in tourist fishing money.

15 Jobless To Train

Fifteen jobless or underemployed persons in the state will be trained as clerk-typists in a newly-approved manpower project, the U.S. Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare report.

The project is sponsored by the state Employment Security Division and training, which will take place at Nome public schools, will extend over a period of 26 weeks, according to Jess C. Ramaker, the Labor Department's Northwest regional manpower administrator, and Bernard E. Kelly, regional director of HEW, both of Seattle.

There will be a federal investment of \$54,000 in Manpower Development and Training Act funds.

All training under the MDTA-Institutional program is designed to assist enrollees to achieve employability status in occupations for which reasonable prospects for employment are forecast. Projects are initiated locally by state employment service and vocational education agencies.

The employment service determines the occupational or other training needs leading to employment which may become available, tests, counsels and refers applicants for training; administers payment of training, transportation and subsistence
