## MTA Has More Lines

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area should find it easier to place a call to Anchorage now.

On April 6th, ten additional circuits were placed in operation between this area and Anchorage, according to Robert Fleming, MTA Director from the Greater Chugiak Area.

According to Fleming, five of these circuits are 694 exchange and five are 688 exchange.

These additional circuits will solve some of the difficulty in calling to and from Anchorage, Fleming stated.

## Local Ambulance Service Could Go

CHUGIAK: Free ambulance service for residents of the Greater Chugiak Area could be discontinued if the Borough Assembly should decide to cut it from the budget.

Ed Willis, Assemblyman from this area stated that this has not yet been definitely decided, contrary to a report in an Anchorage newspaper that it had.

Willis said that the Assembly had asked the Borough Administration to look into the possibility of charging for ambulance service in order to take advantage of a savings to the taxpayer by having insurance companies pick up the tab for this service. It was

The first phase will be data collection and analysis. This is already underway.

## WRECKAGE OF AIRCRAFT WHICH CRASHED LAST SUNDAY IN PETERS CREEK AREA.

# 3 HURT IN PETERS CREEK PLANE CRASH

PETERS CREEK: A Piper PA-12 Super Cruiser, was completely demolished in a crash which took place on Foothill Drive at Mile 22 in Peters Creek last Sunday.

The plane which was owned and piloted by Leland Cook of Anchorage, had apparently been flying low and "buzzing" the houses in the area before the crash.

It crashed. One witness to the crash stated that the plane had made a steep turn less than 150 feet above his house when it appeared to lose flying speed and stall. The plane cut the tops out of several cottenwood trees and crashed within several hundred feet of the man's house.

Injured in the crash was the pilot and his nephew, Frankie Rosenberg, age 17 of Peters Creek. A second youth, Rick Green, who was also a passenger in the plane escaped with only minor injuries. All three were taken to Providence Hospital by the Chugiak Ambulance. Cook and the Rosenberg boy were both suffering from internal injuries, and the youth also suffered a fractured skull. The Green boy was treated and then released.

The crash, which took place

at 7:00pm on Sunday, ended what appeared to have been a day of aerial horse play. The FAA had received complaints of low flying and harassment to motorists by a plane of the same description.

Thomas Westall, Faa Inspector stated that at this time he could not positively say that the aircraft in the complaints was the Cook plane as the registration number of the plane had not been reported. One of persons complaining however has positively identified the plane as one which had been buzzing her car all the way from Talkeetna to Chugiak.

Mrs. Floyd Deaver, of Old Chugiak had been driving back from Talkeetna with her daughter, Mrs. Nancy George.

Mrs. Deaver said that the first time she saw the plane it was on the ground, it was parked partly on the highway and partly in the driveway of the Montana Creek Lodge.

She had proceeded down the road only a few miles when she saw the plane coming at her at low altitude. She said the plane then proceeded to follow her car down the road, making low passes. At one time, she said, the wheels of the plane were lower than the top of her Volkswagon.

she said that the plane appeared again and again as she drove home, and followed her right to the driveway to her home, only a mile or so from the crash site.

Earlier in the day, Ralph Doyle, who operates Chugiak Aviation at Birchwood Air-strip reported the same plane flying low around the field and narrowly missed hitting the Standard gas sign at the airport.

Mrs. Gilbert Rosenberg, the mother of the injured boy said the two youths had not been with Cook the entire time that he was flying. She said they had been at her home until a short time before the crash. She said Cook had buzzed the house, and the boys had gone down to the Airport to see if he wanted anything. Mrs. Rosenberg said she was unaware that the boys had gone flying with Cook until they were being helped from the wreckage just a few hundred yards from her home.

The FAA is still investigating the accident, and will not make any judgement as to the cause until the investigation is completed.

## Trooper Saves Life of Suicide

EAGLE RIVER: An Alaska State Trooper is credited with saving the life of a would-be suicide last Saturday night.

Both the State Trooper and the Eagle River ambulance responded to a call from Tips Bar, where a man had been found hanging from a tree limb by a rope around his neck.

The persons who had called in the report believed the man to be already dead as no sign of breathing was detectable.

The Trooper, however, cut the man down and applied artificial resuscitation, whereupon breathing was resumed.

The man, Robert Slaughter, age 47, of Anchorage was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the Eagle River Ambulance.

pointed out that most people carry hospitalization insurance which include the cost of an ambulance. It was felt that this could save the borough up to \$100,000.00 a year.

Willis stated that once before it was considered that a charge should be made for the use of the ambulance, but at that time the ambulances in service had been donated to the city by area Lions Clubs and it was felt that under those circumstances there should not be a charge to the citizens.

Willis went on to say that now borough owned ambulances are in service and the above objection is no longer valid.

The ambulances in the areas served by the Chugiak and Eagle River Fire Companies are not borough property, and were originally obtained by public subscription, however, the borough does pay the service districts an annual amount for ambulance services which could be discontinued if a service charge for ambulances should be made elsewhere in the borough.

Willis pointed out, however that the discontinuation of free ambulance service would have to be accomplished by ordinance and only after public hearings on the subject.

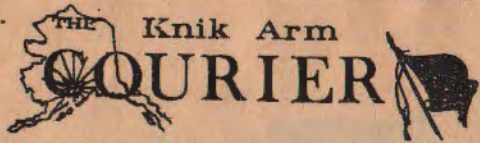
EAGLE RIVER: The next regular meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce will be on Monday, April 12th at 8pm.

## Local Youth Organized Mustangs Are Class A Calley March Champs

ANCHORAGE: An Eagle River youth, a graduate of Chugliak High School, organized the "Friends for Calley", and was instrumental in staging a march Sunday in protest to the sentencing of Lt. William Calley Jr.

Steve Czernski, organizer of the protest stated that he decided on the march after talking to some of his friends at Chugliak High. He said that his feelings on the subject had nothing to do with the rightness or wrongness of the war in Vietnam, but rather with the punishing of one man for acts which he felt those in higher command positions were equally responsible for.

He said he felt the Calley decision would have a very bad effect on the fighting men who were being sent into a war where the enemy could not be identified by age or even sex.

Czernski said that he was disappointed that most of those who had promised to participate in the parade failed to show up, but he disagreed with a statement in one of the Anchorage newspapers that only 26 persons participated. He said that when he was speaking to the group from the steps of Anchorage City Hall, that he counted over 50 people.

He said that all age groups were represented in the parade which started at the park strip and ended at City Hall.

Czernski asked that his thanks be expressed to Dave McGrew and Mark Blair, both of Chugliak for their help in organizing the march. He said that McGrew approached Mayor Sullivan of Anchorage and

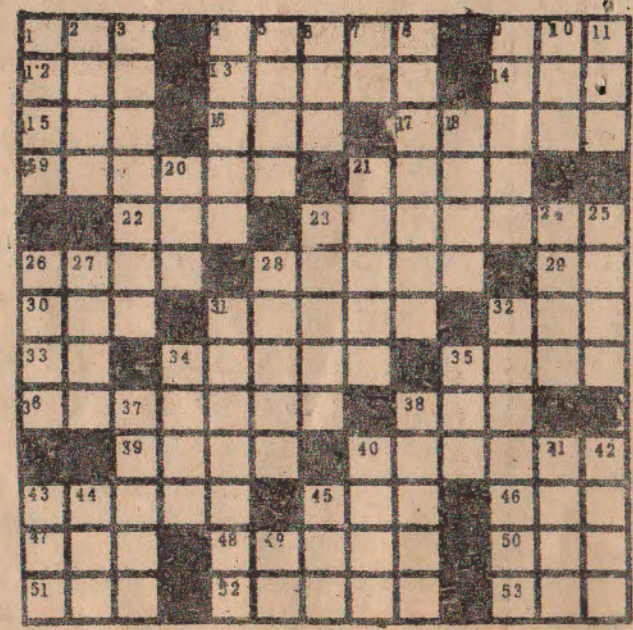

## Permits A Must

ANCHORAGE: Burn permits for land clearing are being issued by the borough's Department of Environmental Quality, located in the borough's new office building at 3500 on Tudor Road.

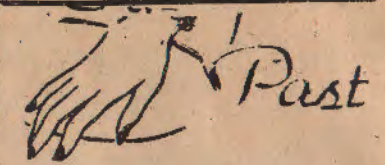
A spokesman for the department said today that a permit must be obtained before brush and trees removed from cleared land may be burned anywhere in the borough.

Permits are issued only for non-urban areas of the borough. Areas containing less than 1,000 persons per square mile are considered non-urban, the spokesman said.

By law, the only legal burning in the borough is that associated with clearing land.

Obtaining the necessary burning permits has been simplified since the borough Fire Department, also involved in issuing burning permits is located at the Tudor Road address. Previously persons seeking such permits had to visit two widely separated locations to obtain them.

The Department of Environmental Quality was created from what was formerly the environmental health section of the borough's Health Department by assembly action last February.
