

BUILDING CODE ORDINANCES ARE DEFEATED

BIDS OPENED FOR EAGLE RIVER SEWER

ANCHORAGE: B. B. & S. Construction Inc. of Anchorage was the apparent low bidder for the construction of the Eagle River sewage collection system and lagoon.

A total of eight bids were received on the project, with B. B. & S. Construction Inc. being the lowest at \$569,903.00.

Other bidders were, Crown Construction Co. Inc. of Anchorage at \$572,907.00; W. C. James and Associates of Anchorage at \$643,389.00; Studnek Construction Co. Inc. of Anchorage, at \$705,333.00; Stock and Grove Inc. of Anchorage at \$727,420.00; Hermon Brothers Construction Co. of Palmer at \$767,826.00; May Contracting Inc. and Associates of Anchorage, \$705,170.00.

GARBAGE MAIN TOPIC OF CHAMBER

EAGLE RIVER: Garbage disposal, both pick-up and dumping were the main items of discussion at the Monday meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce.

Present at the meeting were Bernard Stewart, manager of the Eagle River Sanitary Fill and William Pettit, owner of Rosebue Refuse Co.

Stewart told the Chamber of the problems experienced in the operation of the local



ANCHORAGE: Two ordinances, either of which would have regulated building in rural areas of the borough were defeated at the Monday meeting of the GAAB Assembly.

Ordinance 31-71, which would have placed all building regulations on a boroughwide basis was defeated by a vote of 7 to 2.

Following this defeat, Ordinance 31-71A was introduced. This would have established building codes outside the city limits of Anchorage. This was also defeated 5 to 4.

In view of the defeat of both ordinances, the Assembly did not need to levy any tax to cover the cost of enforcing a building code.

The tax rate which was being considered was .014 mills.

The building code within the city of Anchorage will still be enforced as a city ordinance.

Areas outside the city are subject to the State building code as in the past.

The engineer's estimate was \$573,867.00.

Bids were opened Tuesday afternoon at the Borough Administration Building on Tudor Road in Anchorage.

POSTAL RATES TO GO UP MONDAY

CHUGIAK: Chugiak Postmaster Paul Swanson has asked that local patrons be reminded that any letters they mail next Monday will have to have additional postage.

May 16th is the date for the increased postal rates to go into effect.

While there will be increases in most classes of mail the ones which will effect most people will be first class letters, which will go up from 6¢ to 8¢; first class Airmail letters, which will go up from 10¢ to 11¢ and post cards, which increase from 5¢ to 6¢.



dump. The land on which the Sanitary Fill is located is owned by the State of Alaska, and is leased by the Chugiak Benefit Association. CBA in turn, has a contract with Stewart whereby he operates the dump and keeps the refuse covered in return for which he collects the dump fees.

Most of the problems stem from the fact that the dump operation is at best marginal, and that the fees do not cover the cost of policing the area and preventing illegal dumping. The road to the dump is state land, and Stewart stated that he has no jurisdiction to prevent persons from dumping garbage along the road as many have been doing.

It was brought to the attention of the Chamber that the local voters had several years ago had voted against having the dump operated by public funds as a free dump supported by local taxes on a service area basis. It was thought that perhaps if it were again placed on the ballot it might pass. One member mentioned that he had heard that the borough was considering closing the dump in Eagle River all together.

Also brought to the attention of the Board was the plight of William Pettit, who was trying to get a permit to operate a garbage collection business from the Alaska State Transportation Commission.

A hearing had been held recently in Anchorage concerning his application for a permit. The hearing officer had recommended to the Commission that the application be turned down. One of the main reasons listed for the rejection was that Pettit appeared to be underfinanced.

DIMOND HIGH STUDENTS TRIGGER

"RUMBLE"

BIRCHWOOD: An incident which has been described as a "rumble" took place at Chugiak last Wednesday when a group of students from Dimond High showed up at CHS. The students, who were reportedly Dimond High seniors observing "skip day". The students came onto the Chugiak High school grounds and entered the building. They reportedly wandered through the building making insulting remarks. Upon leaving the building one of the Dimond students was said to have thrown a beer bottle which struck and cracked the windshield of a teacher's car. A Chugiak High alumni who had just pulled into the parking lot observed the incident and jumped into his car and gave chase to the Dimond High vehicles who were hurriedly departing. In their haste to get away one of the Dimond cars was forced off the road into the ditch.

By that time other Chugiak High students had gotten into their cars and also gave chase involving an estimated total of 4 or 5 cars loaded with students from both schools.

When the State Troopers re-

sponded to break-up the rumble, they arrested four individuals all from Anchorage.

Three of the ones arrested were minors and one an adult. All three students were charged with being minors in possession of alcoholic beverages. One was charged with possession of a concealed weapon, a hunting knife and one was charged with possession of narcotics. The adult, William D. Johnston, age 19, of 2701 E. 46th Street in Anchorage, was charged with furnishing alcohol to minors.

There were no arrests of Chugiak High students, and no reported injuries or further damage.



TAX BILLS GO OUT TOMORROW

ANCHORAGE: Approximately 70,000 tax bills will go out to residents of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough starting Thursday, according to Ed. Pysher, Borough Finance Director.

Borough officials are hopeful that the bulk of the 40,000 real property and 30,000 personal property tax bills can be in the mail before Monday to take advantage of the present 6¢ postal rate.

Tax payments may be made in two installments, with June 17th, set as the deadline for payment of the first installment.

JUNEAU - The \$50 bounty on wolves will be paid only on those animals killed in game management Units 1, 2 and 3 by residents of those areas, according to C. A. Weberg, director of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game's Protection Division. Game management units 1, 2 and 3 include all of Southeastern Alaska except the Yakutat section (Unit 5); and the Baranof, Admiralty, Chichagof islands (Unit 4). "Hunters who have legally taken wolves in these designated units may submit pelts with the left foreleg attached for bounty at any Fish and Game Department office," Weberg explained.

LAKE SITE RATED HIGH

The White Alice Communications System station located at Neklason Lake near Palmer has been named one of two outstanding Defense Communications System stations in the western hemisphere. Primary Would Be Earliest

JUNEAU — Alaska will
succeed New Hampshire as the
state with the nation's first
Presidential primary each
election year under terms of a
bill passed by the House and
sent to the governor.

The bill passed the house 28-9
early today. It already had
won Senate approval.

The measure would set a
Presidential primary on the
last Tuesday of February — at
least a week before the New
Hampshire primary.

The bill is sponsored by Sen.
Joe Josephson, D-Anchorage.
It would give the lieutenant
governor authority to place
candidates of both parties on
the ballot when he determined
"in his sole discretion that the
candidate's candidacy is
generally advocated or
recognized in national news
media throughout the United
States."

In addition, the names of
other candidates could go on
the ballot if requested in a
petition bearing the names of
at least 250 registered voters,
and presented to the
lieutenant governor by the last
Tuesday in January.

The bill would require that
Alaskan delegates to national
party nominating conventions
"be selected on a
proportionate basis
substantially equal to that
percentage of the vote each
presidential candidate receives
in the preferential Presidential
primary election."
