TWO YOUTHS ARRESTED FOR BURGLARY


The lodge, which is located at Elmwood and Chugiak in Palmer, has been in operation a little less than two years according to Mrs. Holmberg.

Pioneer Home Set

JUNEAU Gov. William A. Egan will preside over the ribbon-cutting ceremonies Thursday marking completion of the 63-room Southcentral Alaska Pioneers' Home in Palmer.


The afternoon ceremony will follow a final construction inspection by the Department of Public Works.

The Palmer facility is the third state pioneers' home built in Alaska. Others are in Sitka and Fairbanks.

The Palmer home was constructed at a cost of \$2 million, with funds provided by the sale of bonds approved by voters in 1968. Construction began last May.

Staff will be hired and the first guests accepted in July.

The 37,350-square-foot single-story home has a complete kitchen, a dining and lounge area, reception area, two stone fireplaces and a solarium.
