FREE RABIES CLINIC SAT.

EAGLE RIVER: There will be a Free Rabies Immunization Clinic this coming Saturday, according to W. Trent, local Animal Control Officer for the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

The clinic will be held at the Eagle River Elementary School between the hours of 4pm and 8pm.

Trent stated that an Anchorage veterinarian will be present to administer the immunizations, and all area residents are encouraged to bring their dogs and cats down.

The clinic is sponsored by the Anchorage SPCA, and although no fee will be charged, donations will be accepted.

BOROUGH CLEAN UP DRIVE SATURDAY

CHUGIAK: Chugiak Area elementary and high school students will be participating in the Boroughwide clean-up program this coming Saturday May 8th.

Prizes will be waiting for the student from each school who takes part in this program.

A bicycle will be offered to a student from each elementary school, while students at junior and senior highs will be competing for cassette players.

For each sack of trash that a student turns in at pick-up points, they will be given a ticket. These tickets will all be placed in containers at each school, and the winner will be drawn from that.

LOCAL HOPE WALKERS MAKE EXCEPTIONAL SHOWING

ANCHORAGE: Many of those participating in the Walk for Hope in Anchorage last Saturday, were resident of the Greater Chugiak Area.

Most notable among the local walkers were Henry Theodore, of Birchwood, who ran most of the way and was the eighth walker (or in this case runner) to finish. Henry, who completed the 31 miles in five and a half hours is a member of the Chugiak High Varsity Track team.

This year the record for the oldest person to complete the 31 miles was again set by Paul Mitchell, of Old Chugiak. Mr. Mitchell, who had the distinction of being the oldest to complete the 31 mile Walk for Birchwood and last years Walk for Hope is still going strong at 72 year of age. He this year had the added handicap of suffering from a broken rib, sustained in an auto accident

three weeks ago. In past years Mr. Mitchell had been sponsored only by himself, not having solicited sponsors as had most of the younger walkers. This year a number of local businesses and clubs had spontaneously come forward and offered to sponsor him, so his walk this year netted a considerable sum for the Council for Alaskan Children.

State of Alaska trucks will pick up the litter gathered by the students in the Greater Chugiak Area.

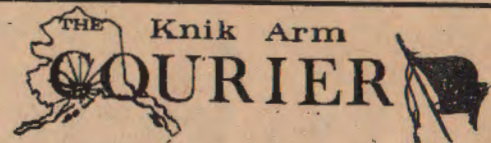
Coco Cola and Pepsi Cola soft drink distributors will be providing free beverages for trash gatherers all day.

The helicopter's main mission is transporting infantry assault and support units. It is capable of carrying a two-man crew and 11 passengers or six litter patients.

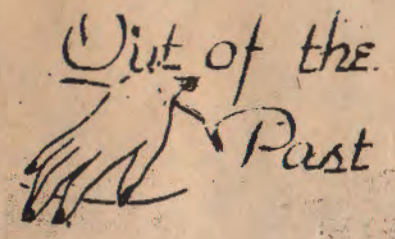
Personnel from the 19th Aviation Battalion, Fort Richardson were on hand to answer questions concerning the capabilities and performance of the aircraft.

The Fire Company is attempting to collect enough coupons to earn a new fire truck.

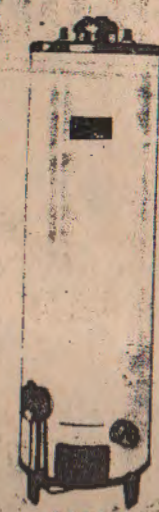

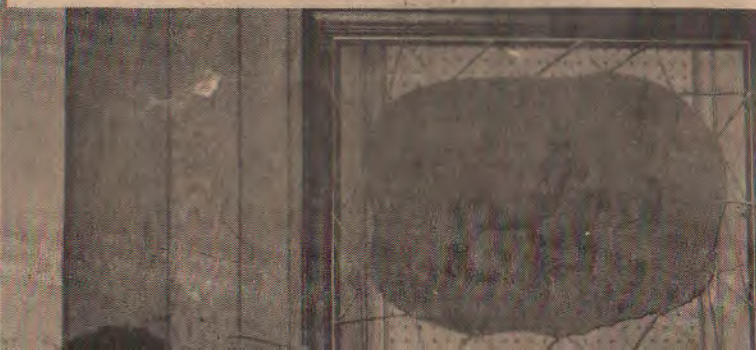

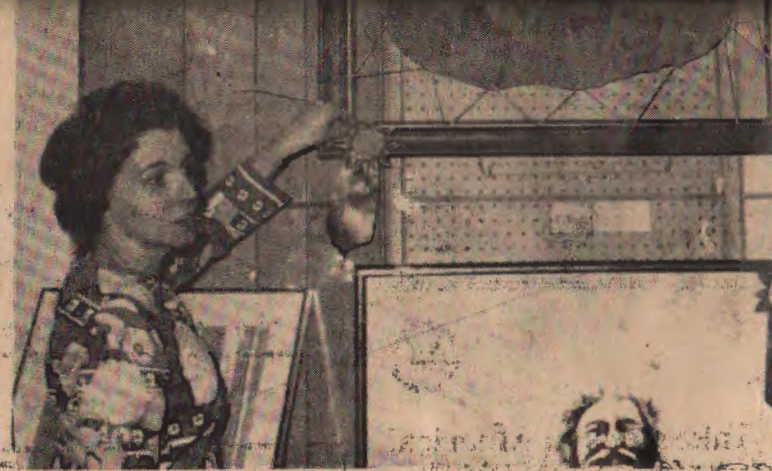
In the Junior division first, second and third place were all captured by Nanette Lathrop, a junior at Chugiak High.

Dear Martha,

My husband's mother has
come to live with us, and she
is doing things that scare me.

She wants to help around the
house, and is an excellent cook
but she has one problem, She
doesn't know how to read.

Several times she has made
mistakes because some prod-
ucts look alike to her and she
can't read the labels.

For example, she used my
hairspray for underarm de-
odorant. And another time she
used soy sauce instead of van-
illa when she made a pudding.

These were harmless, but I
worry that she will get some-
thing mixed up and really hurt
herself or poison all of us.

Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Worried,

It would make a difference in
my advice if I knew if your

mother in law was just illit-
erate, or if she just was unable
to read English.

If she could read another
language, I would suggest that
you re-label all similar ap-
pearing products in her nat-
ive language. If she is unable
to read at all, then make lab-
els with pictures which dep-
ict how the product is to be
used. For example on the hair
spray, show a simple sketch
of someone spraying her hair.

And by all means, on prod-
ucts that are not to be taken
internally, label with the old
standby for marking poisons
the skull and crossbones, and
warn her not to ever use any
of these in preparing food.

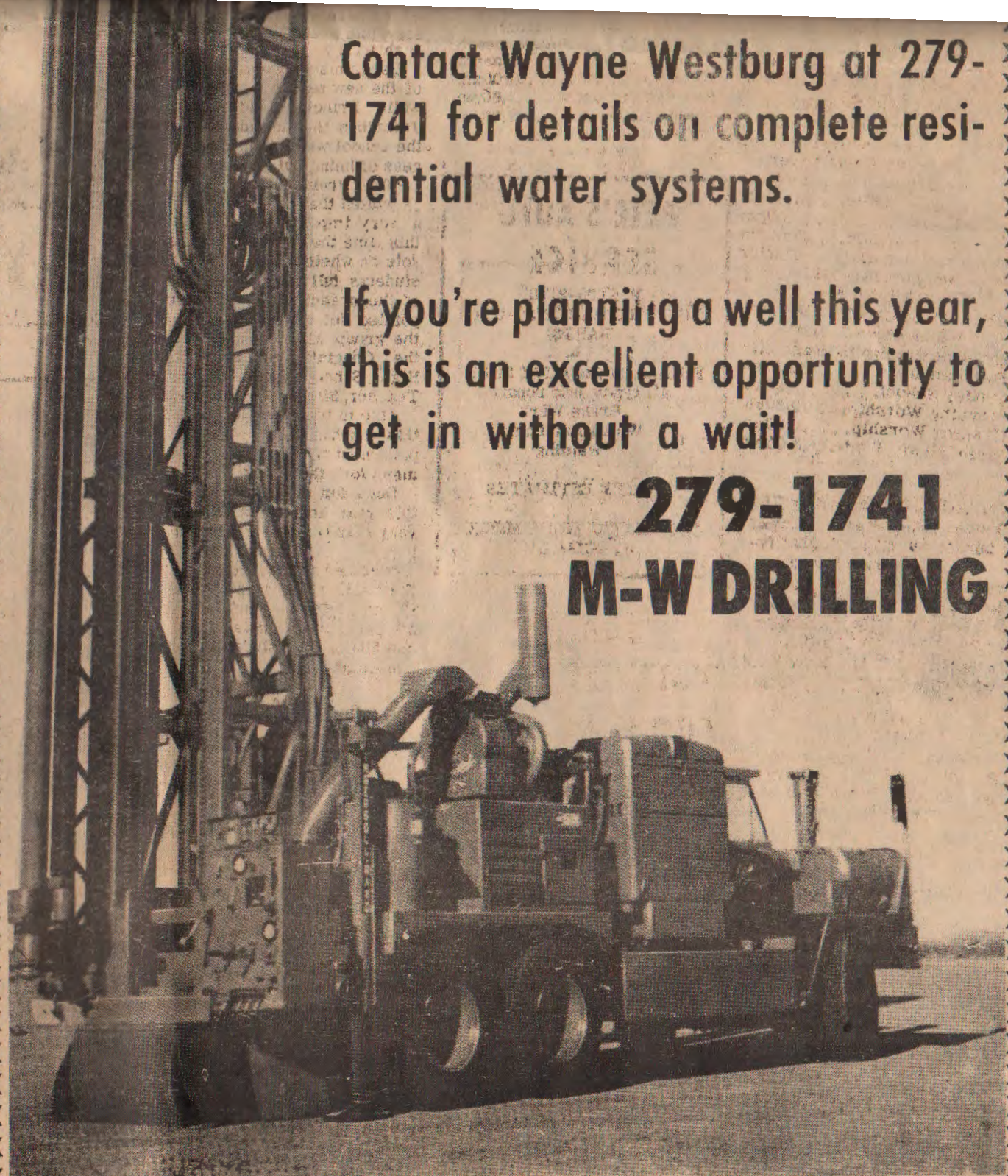

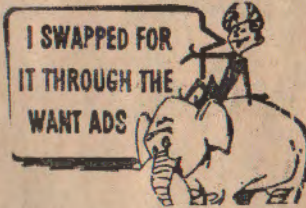

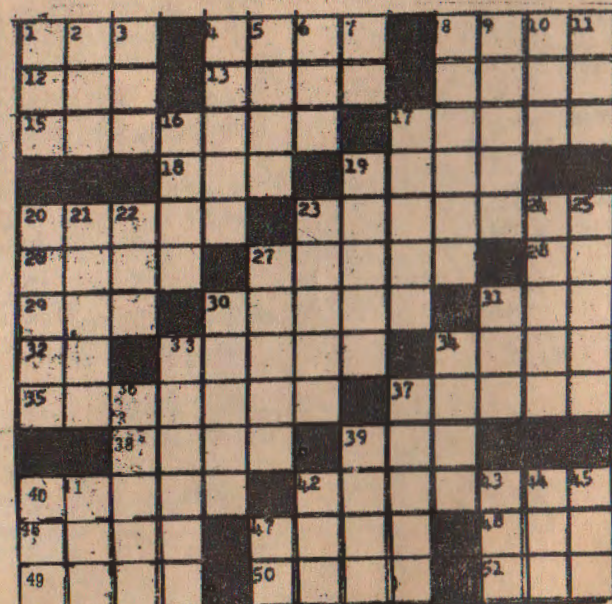

Apollo 11 Space Exhibition Goes On Display

"Columbia", the command ship which carried astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin Aldrin to the moon in July 1969 will be on display in Anchorage Friday through May 16.

The six-ton Apollo space module and a lunar rock sample will be displayed at Third Avenue and C Street between the hours of 10 a.m. and 8 p.m.

The space exhibit is enclosed in a 14-foot wide van which opens out as a showcase and also houses the space suits worn by the astronauts, a glossary of space terms and photos of the expedition.

The Anchorage display is part of a 50-state tour that the module will make accompanied by Donald Slayton, director of flight crew operations at the Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston, Tex.

Visitors will have an
opportunity to view close-up
the command ship which
hurtled astronauts Armstrong,
Aldrin and Michael Collins
into space for the first voyage
to the moon.

The conical-shaped
spacecraft is packed with
electronic "black boxes", an

inertial guidance system,
communications equipment
and life support systems.
Three couches, visible through
the spacecraft hatches, served
as living room, bedroom and
dining room for the astronauts
during their eight-day journey.

Manikins inside the Apollo 11
module will be wearing the
actual suits worn by the crew.
The suits are equipped with
oxygen systems, backpacks,
lunar overshoes and a

extravehicular lunar visor.

During the moon landing
Astronauts Armstrong and
Aldrin collected 47.6 pounds of
lunar materials. The slate
colored space rock on display
with the command module is
part of the collection.

Samples of the rock have
been studied by scientists
to determine the age of the
moon, how it was formed and
whether or not the moon was
originally part of the earth.

In connection with the
showing of this exhibit, the
Alaska Department of
Education has two 45-minute
films that are available for loan
to local schools. The films are
of the Apollo 11 and 12
missions.
