STAR ROUTE MAIL SERVICE TO BE EXPANDED HERE

JOB OPENING FOR LIFEGUARD AT MIRROR LAKE

CHUGIAK: Recruiting is underway again this year for a qualified person to serve as a lifeguard at the Mirror Lake swimming area.

This project is an annual one sponsored locally by the Chuglak Ladies Club in cooperation with the State Department of Parks and Recreation.

Since funds to pay the salary of a lifeguard are not appropriated, the Ladies Club seeks subscriptions from other local service organizations to cover the salary of the lifeguard, and the Department of Parks and Recreation furnishes his equipment and does the interviewing and hiring. BIG BOATS SOON TO BE TABOO ON MIRROR LAKE

PETERS CREEK: Big boats with high powered motors will soon be taboo on Mirror Lake, according to a spokesman for the State Parks and Recreation.

Power to regulate the surface of the lake has been turned over to the Parks Department by the Division of Lands, and the announcement of closure to all but boats of probably six h.p. and under is expected to go into effect as of July 1st.

This restriction was brought about as a result of complaints that fast high powered boats were posing a threat to swimmers and smaller craft.

CHUGIAK: Residents of some parts of the Greater Chuglak Area who at present have not been receiving home mail delivery can look forward to this service in the near future.

According to J.L. Jensen, Officer in Charge at the Eagle River Post Office, approval has been received to greatly expand mail delivery service along the Star Routes effective July 1, 1971.

Many streets and areas will now have carrier delivery which previously were not served.

Delivery will be made to approved, rural type boxes placed at curb-side. These must be provided and erected by the mail recipient.

For information as to which specific areas are to be included, or for other pertinent information call either the Eagle River Post Office, at 694-2732, or the Chuglak Post Office, at 688-2747.

The applicant may be either male or female, but must have a current Red Cross life saving certificate.

Because of the limited amount of funds which is available, the lifeguard will work only on weekends and holidays.

CHANCES FOR JULY 4th PARADE ARE GOOD

CHUGIAK: The possibility of a parade in connection with the July 4th Fireman's Field Day is good, according to a spokesman for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

To date there have been five units entered. These include two floats, two decorated cars plus the Fire Company equipment.

If the parade goes off as it is scheduled, it will depart the Chugiak Fire Hall at 10:00am and proceed to the Rodeo Grounds, along the old Glenn Highway, a distance of 3 miles.

At the Rodeo grounds, the field day activities will take place, in the form of games and races for the youngsters and a water battle staged by the firemen.

There will be prizes offered for the winners of the field day events as well as a trophy or prize for the best entry in the parade.

More entries for the parade are being sought, and local clubs and organizations are being encouraged to participate. Deadline for entering the parade is June 20th. No entry fee is being asked.

NO CLEAR SUGGESTIONS ON HOW TO TACKLE LOCAL DRUG PROBLEM

EAGLE RIVER: Narcotic officer, Loren Thomas, of the Alaska State Troopers, was unable to offer any clear-cut suggestion as to how the local Chamber of Commerce might be able to combat the growing problem of drug usage among Chugiak area youth.

Speaking before the Chamber at a general membership meeting last Monday night, Officer Thomas told of the increase in the use of narcotics in the Anchorage Area in the past four years.

He presented a display of the various types of narcotics and pills which are used and the types of apparatus used to administer them.

He also explained the effect the different types of drugs have on the human system, and what symptoms to look for when a person is suspected to be taking drugs.

The most popular drug to be used in the local area appears to be marijuana, he stated. He said that marijuana can be

grown in Alaska, and that seeds brought in from Mexico if planted here will produce a leaf as powerful as that grown in Mexico. He said that the State Troopers have evidence of marijuana being grown on a large scale in greenhouses in the bush area and transported by bush plane.

He pointed out that drugs arrive here by almost every means of transportation, and that first class mail is a popular means, as it is not subject to postal inspection.

He said that most narcotics dealers in this area appear to be small time operators, and that there does not at this time seem to be evidence of organized narcotics traffic.

He warned that when trying to determine who are the narcotics dealers, it is no longer helpful to look for the long hair or peculiar dress. These people tend to assume a more conventional appearance to avoid suspicion.

He also mentioned that the av-

erage teen-ager knows more about narcotics than most police officers.

He said there was little or nothing that the average person could do to help with the law enforcement in the drug problem. He made mention that in a recent case of the arrest of a narcotics dealer in the Eagle River Area, when the case came to trial, the man received a suspended sentence. In this particular case, the dealer had sold narcotics to a police undercover agent. Thomas said that since he had been assigned to the narcotics division last September, he knew of only one instance when a convicted dealer served any time, and that was thirty days.

He was unable to answer questions as to why the judges were so lenient with dealers. He admitted that many of the dealers who received these suspended sentences were showing up in court again on the same charges.

It was pointed out that the public is unaware of the fact that these sentences are so light, and that if the courts were required to publish the results of trials along with the nature of the crime being tried and the type of sentence, that public indignation might cause them to get tougher.

Thomas felt that the best way that any local organization could fight the drug problem was through continued education of not only teenagers, but their parents. He said that most parents tend to panic at the mention of drugs.

A representative of the Chugiak High PTA who was present at the meeting told of a proposed program to be introduced at Chugiak High next year. This program would be run for the most part by the students themselves. A similar program was started last year at Dimond High.

Also present at the meeting was Assistant State District

Attorney Peter Page, himself a resident of Eagle River.

Mr. Page also told of the difficulty in bringing the narcotic dealers to trial, and tried to explain the reasons for the seeming light sentences meted out.

Both Officer Thomas and Mr. Page agreed that tougher sentences might help to keep the dealers out of circulation for a longer time, but that as long as there was money to be made selling narcotics, and there were people wanting to buy it, there would always be dealers and a drug problem.

WE CALLED IT WRONG

Well, we sure called it wrong when we predicted a large and vocal crowd at the Charter Commission meeting last Wednesday.

Not only was the crowd small by comparison with previous meetings (only 28 people), but they were with few exception very low key in their criticism of the charter.

Upon delving into this, however, we learned that the Chugiak Area has not come around to buying the unification concept.

Some of our most outspoken opponents to unification were conspicuous by their absence at this meeting. Upon being questioned, they pointed out that arguments as to whether or not this charter was better than the first one was beside the point. Their intentions were to vote against the charter no matter how it had been improved, and they saw no need to spend their time at a meeting discussing it when they could be at a ball-game or fishing.

They said to watch for them on election day when their opinion would count for something.

From our own observations it is apparent that the charter commission had really listened to the people during the first round of hearings, and had tried to the best of their ability to come up with a charter that would satisfy the majority.

For this they are to be commended; and for those people in the Anchorage Area Borough who want to be unified under a 1st class home rule government, it will probably be an excellent charter, but for the people of this community who wish to be left to grow and develop into the kind of place that we ourselves want, than it is unacceptable and will probably be turned down as overwhelmingly as was the first one.

It was interesting to note that the strongest argument that a member of the charter commission was able to give the residents of this area for voting for the charter was the velled threat that if the charter was voted down, than this area would be forced to be annexed by the City of Anchorage by the Boundary Commis-

We sent our apologies to Ed Pelon for missing his birthday in June. We hope it was a happy birthday.

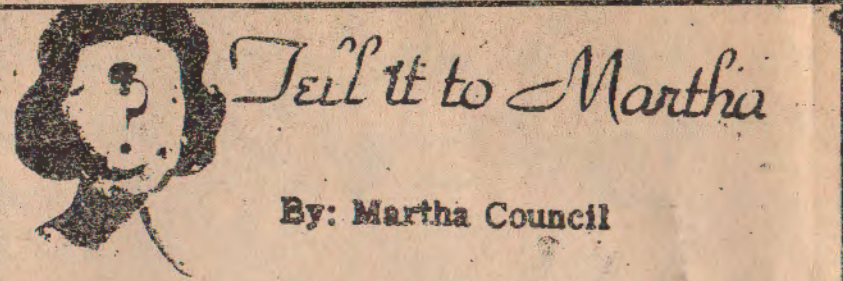

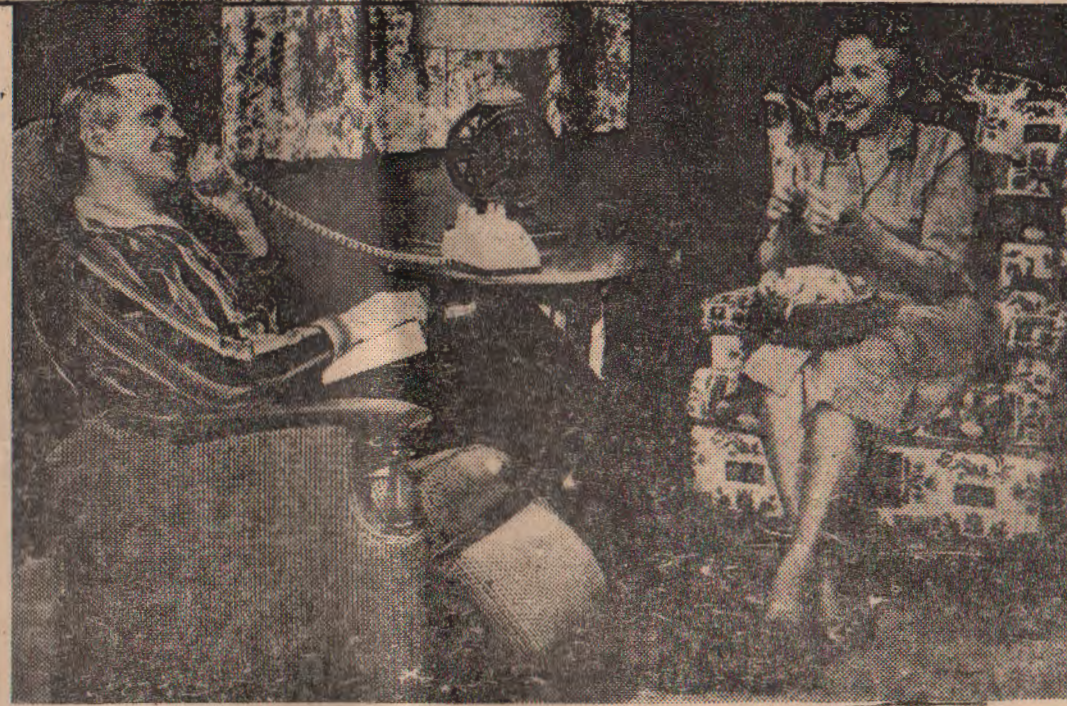

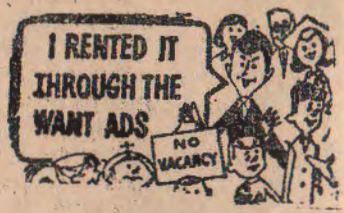

HEARING TODAY ON PARADISE HAVEN LICENSE

ANCHORAGE: A public hearing was scheduled this morning, at 9:00am in the Conference Room of the Alaska Transportation Commission in Anchorage.

Subject of this hearing was the application to the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for a dispensing and retail license by John Barclay, of Eagle River Valley.

Barclay, whose homestead is surrounded by the Chugach State Park, had applied for the licenses to be used at Paradise Haven Lodge, which he has developed on his homestead.

Paradise Haven is designed as a wilderness resort, which eventually will include areas for skiing and snow mobiling.

When Barclay originally applied for a license through the Borough Assembly last winter, a public hearing was held.

Barclay himself, through a misunderstanding did not appear at the hearing, and the license was disapproved upon objections presented by a John Wolf, who reportedly is also a homesteader in that area.

At a subsequent meeting of the Assembly, the decision was reversed upon hearing testimony from Barclay, and a number of his neighbors, and the assembly voted to recommend to the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board that the license be granted.

Since that date, other objections to the issuance of the license have come to the attention of the ABC Board, and as a result, the hearing today was scheduled.

James Duggan, of the ABC Board stated that some of the objections come from environmentalists whose concern is Barclay's plans to encroach

his resort and opening it to snow machines even if he did not have a license to sell liquor. Also, Duggan said, there is nothing in the state law which would prohibit the issuance of a license to a business which is surrounded by State Park, but is on private property.

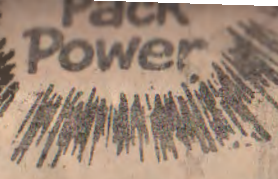
