EAGLE RIVER SIX YEAR OLD KILLED IN ACCIDENT

MAN KILLED IN FALL AT THUNDERBIRD

ROSEBUD REFUSE HEARING TODAY

EKLUTNA: A 20 year old Anchorage man fell to his death last Sunday, while he and three companies were attempting to scale the South wall of Thunderbird Falls canyon.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, the victim, Richard Ray Nordmark, of Boniface Road was climbing approximately 15 feet lower than the other two. A rock which apparently was dislodged by one of the other climbers fell and struck Nordmark on the head.

He fell 80 to 90 feet, landing on his back.

EAGLE RIVER: Another hearing concerning the application for a permit to haul garbage and household refuse by William E. Pettit, of Eagle River, has been scheduled by the Alaska Transportation Commission.

EAGLE RIVER: A tragic accident, which took the life of a six year old Eagle River girl took place at Mile 141/2 on the Old Glenn Highway at approximately 2:00pm on Saturday May 30th.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, a 1966 Dodge Van, which was Northbound, drifted across the center line and struck a southbound Standard Oil tanker.

The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company reported responding to the call and transporting the driver of the van, 16 year old David Smith of Eagle River and his passenger, six year old Gara Lee Phelps to the 5040th Air Force Hospital at Elmendorf.

Smith was treated for injuries to his head, arm and hip and released. The Phelps girl died shortly after arriving at the hospital.

The name of the driver of the tank truck and the extent of damages to that vehicle were not available. The van sustained total damage.

The accident is still under investigation by the Alaska

City patrolman tried to revive him using mouth to mouth resuscitation and external heart massage, but to no avail. He was pronounced dead upon arrival of the State Troopers.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company responded with the ambulance, and spent four hours attempting to get the body of the victim out.

A spokesman for the Fire Company stated that a Land Rover, belonging to one of the Firemen was used to get as close to the accident scene as possible, and then a foot-party with a hand stretcher went ahead to bring the body back to the vehicle. This was made more difficult by the rough terrain and the fact that Nordmark weighed in excess of 300 pounds.

The Fire Company spokesman stated that the three were apparently not experienced climbers, as they did not have any special climbing equipment.

matter was held on March 22, 1971, and written and final arguments were filed subsequent to the hearing, the Hearing Officer's Proposed Decision was issued and exceptions were taken thereto.

The Commission has the matter before it at the present time, and has determined that before a final decision can be reached, further hearing will be necessary.

The commission will make inquire into the type of equipment that is necessary to provide this type of service and whether the applicants equipment meets the standards for such equipment as established by city or borough governments in which the vehicles may be operated.

Inquiry into the applicant's financial ability will include, but not be limited to the current market value of the equipment, cost of replacement or additional equipment of a type suitable for the proposed service, actual and projected revenues for the year 1971, actual and projected operating expenses for the same period of time.

CHARTER HOLD COMMISSION TO HEARING HERE

NO OBJECTIONS VOICED AT ROAD HEARING

BIRCHWOOD: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area will get an opportunity to air their views on the revised Charter for unification of city and borough, at a public hearing to be held at the Birchwood Elementary School in Wednesday, June 9th, at 8:00pm. Copies of the revised charter are available from the Commission, and the Charter was reprinted in full in the June 1st edition of the Anchorage Times.

EAGLE RIVER: No objections were voiced to the proposed improvement to the Glenn Highway, which was aired at a public hearing held at the Eagle River School last Thursday night.

The section of road to be improved extends from the Arctic Valley Ski Bowl Road on Fort Richardson to Artillery Road in Eagle River.

The highway will be widened to four divided lanes for this distance, with overhead interchanges at Gates 1 and 2 on Fort Richardson, at Hilland Road and at the Artillery Road connector in Eagle River.

Gate 3 on Ft. Richardson will be closed to public traffic, and the scale house will be moved to the Hilland Road interchange.

The present bridge across Eagle River will be widened,

and will carry northbound traffic. A second bridge will be constructed to carry the southbound traffic at a point downstream from the present bridge.

Two places of business, two one family houses and one house trailer will be displaced by the construction.

Schedule for construction calls for acquisition of land in 1972, with the job going to contract in 1973, and completion date the fall of 1974. It was indicated that this schedule might be moved up one year earlier.

The accident is still under investigation by the Alaska State Troopers.

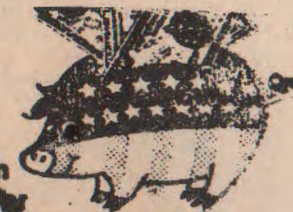
FUNERAL SERVICES FOR GARA PHELPS

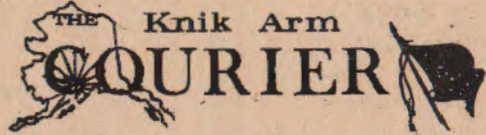
Gara Lee Phelps was born on July 18th, 1964 in Denver Colorado. She died as the result of a traffic accident on Saturday, May 30th, 1971.

**PHONE OUTAGE
HITS AREA**

CHUGIAK: A telephone outage which affected phones in both 688 and 694 exchanges was experienced on Tuesday. A spokesman for the Matanuska Telephone Association stated that the outage was the result of installation of new dialing equipment at both exchanges.

While some outages were expected, the extent of the problem was not anticipated.

Phones in different areas reacted differently. Some were completely dead, while others could not reach beyond the immediate exchange, nor could calls to Anchorage be completed.

Most phones were back in service by late Tuesday afternoon.

This is the fourteenth year the Courier has offered this service in an attempt to help local teen-agers in finding summer jobs.

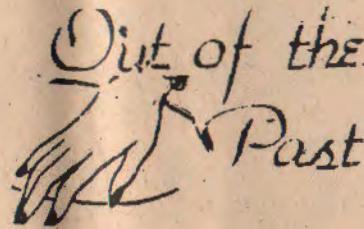
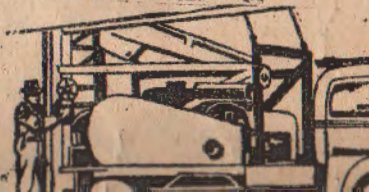

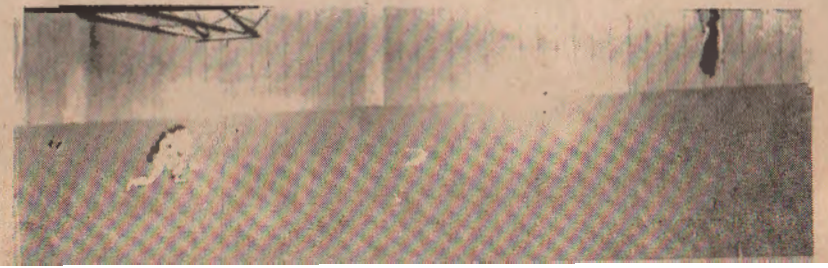


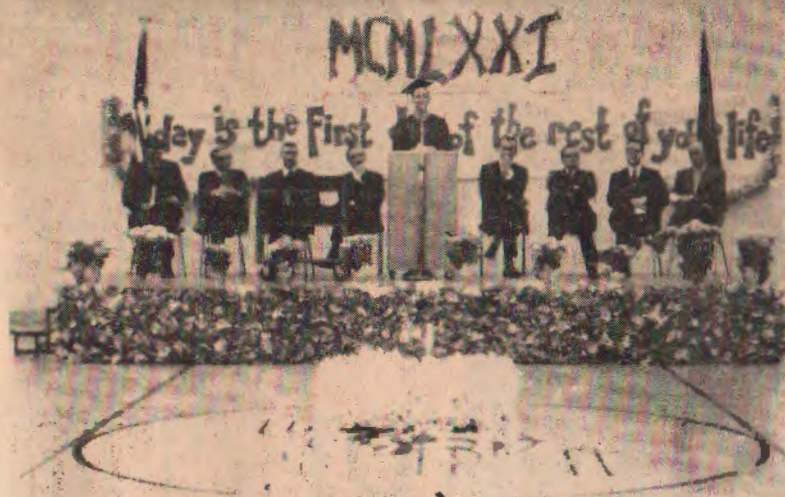
THE CLASS OF 1971

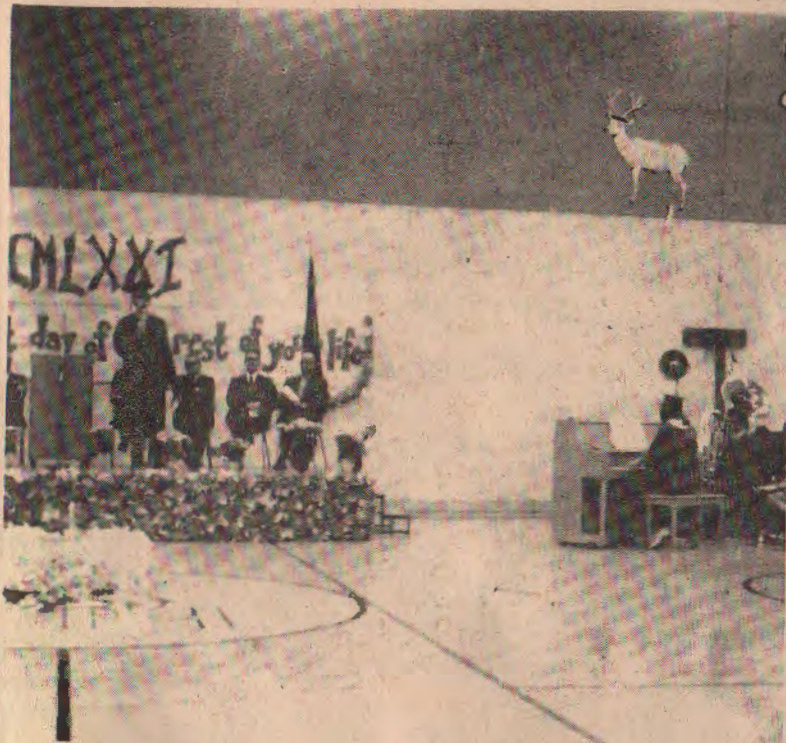
A portable stage, borrowed for the occasion, was decorated with flowers, and a small fountain played in the center of the gym floor.

Roll call was by Mr. Carl Miller, assistant Principal of Chugiak High, while Mr. Robert Arnold of the Board of Education presented the diplomas.

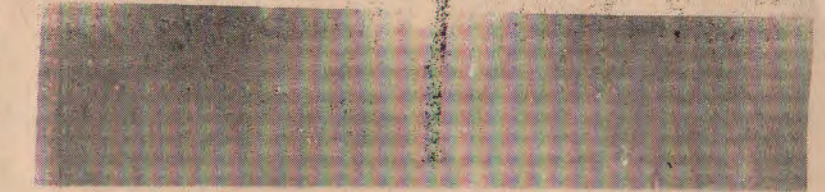

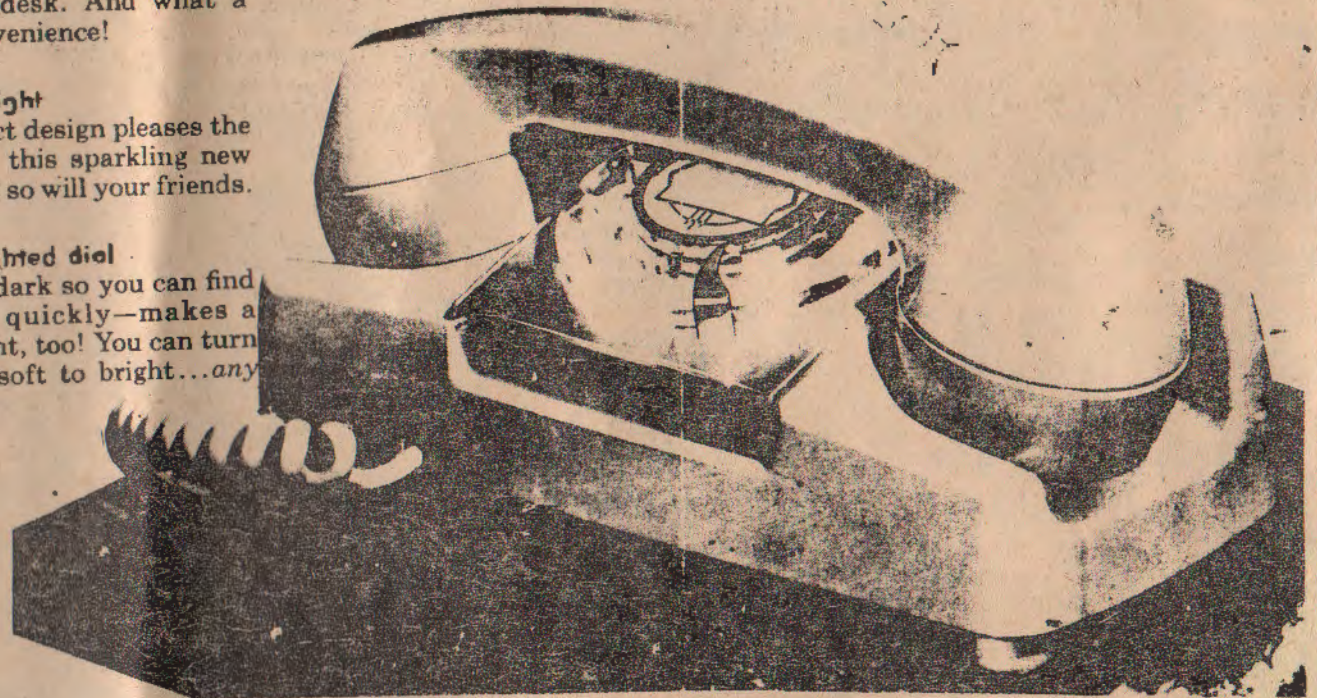

JUNEAU: Did you know that if you are fishing in Alaska with a rod and reel or hand-line for fish to take home, you must have a sport fishing license in possession?

Did you know that you must show this license to any authorized representative of the Department of Fish and Game upon his request?

Did you know that juveniles under 16 years of age do not need a license to sport fish?

Did you know that creeks are considered to be freshwater out to the mean low tide line?

Did you know it is illegal to possess, transport or release live fish or live fish eggs without a special scientific collection permit from the Department of Fish and Game?

QUESTION: Is it illegal to use a fishing plug with more than two treble hooks attached to it?

ANSWER: The plug may be used. The regulations say that one plug or one spoon or one set of spinners may be used regardless of the number of hooks it has attached. Only two flies or two hooks with bait may be used. Hooks may have either single, double or treble barbs. Therefore, one plug with four sets of treble hooks is legal. Baiting a herring with two treble hooks is legal, but it is illegal to bait a herring with three single hooks.

FIREMEN TO HOLD FIELD DAY

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company is planning a Fireman's Field Day for Sunday July 4th, at the Chuglak Rodeo Grounds.

The event will be held in conjunction with the "Little Britches" Rodeo which is also scheduled for July 4th.

Plans are still tentative, but include to date, demonstrations of equipment, games for the youngsters and a water battle staged by members of the Fire Company.

If the public is interested in participating, a small parade with floats, marching and mounted units will be held, originating possibly at the Chuglak Elementary School and ending at the Rodeo Grounds.

TELEPHONE BANK IS SET UP

A bill creating a bank lending capital solely to the rural telephone companies of the country was recently signed into law, according to information received here by Max Clements, manager of Matanuska Telephone Association.

Clements had earlier termed establishment of the bank vital to the local cooperative's plans, which include "continued upgrading of service and the eventual elimination of all party lines".

The bank program has long been sought as a source of badly needed expansion capital. The bank is permitted under the law to borrow up to eight times the amount of paid-in capital, totalling eventually a capacity of about \$2.4 billion.

All the companies eligible to borrow from the bank are presently borrowers from the Rural Electrification Administration. MTA has gotten approximately \$3 million from REA since 1955.

Under provisions of the bill, borrowers in the new program become sole owners of the bank.

Vicki Tolston, Associate Dean of Students.

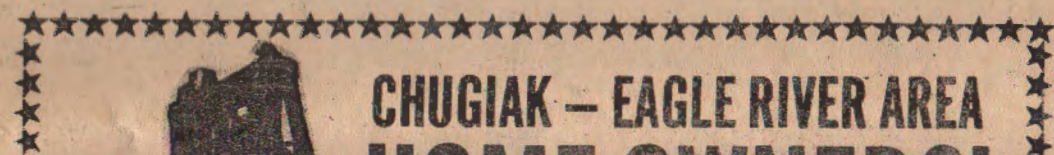
Miss Carawan is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Carawan of Birchwood. She is a graduate of Chugiak High School, class of 1970.

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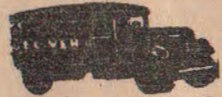
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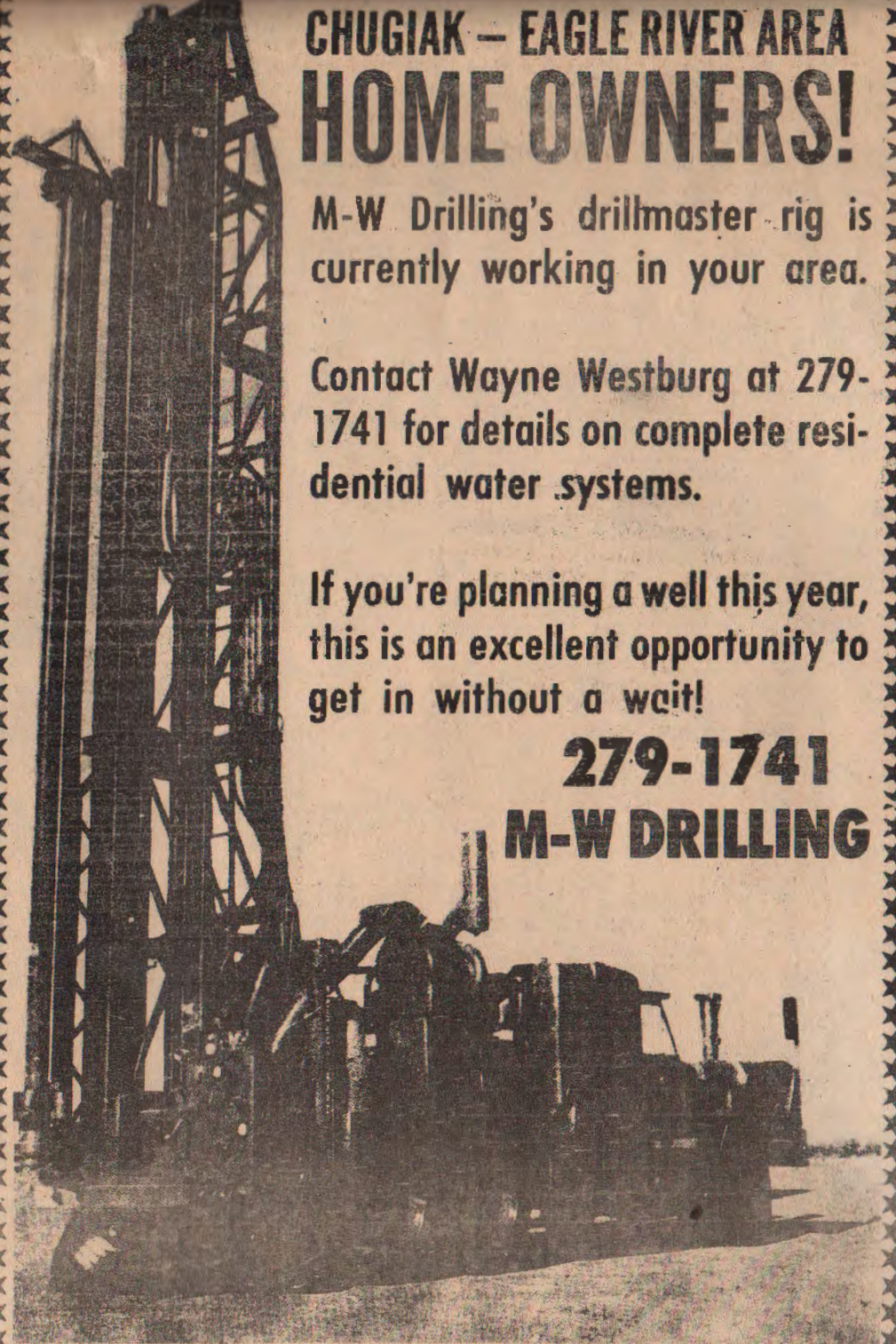

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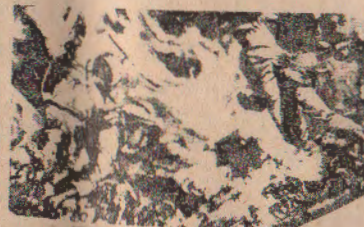

Alaska Airlines Wins Renewal Of Air Lift Contract

A contract totaling \$892,000 has been awarded to Alaska Airlines by the Military Air Command, it was announced today by the airlines' chairman of the board and chief executive officer, Charles F. Willis Jr.
