LOCAL MAN KILLED IN EXCAVATION

CAVE IN

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle River man was killed last Monday morning, when a water line ditch in which he was working caved in burying him.

The victim, LeRoy Elmo Buck, age 58, of Coronado Rd. was laying water line in the 10 foot deep ditch which had been excavated by a backhoe.

The earth, which had been removed from the excavation apparently had been piled close to the edge of the ditch and caved in on Buck, completely burying him.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, a co-worker tried for twenty minutes using the backhoe to uncover the man.

He was pronounced dead upon arrival of the Eagle River ambulance, apparently of injuries sustained from the crushing weight of the dirt, as well as of suffocation.

BIKE & BRIDLE PATHS ASKED ALONG STATE ROADS

CHUGIAK: Petitions asking the Department of Highways to construct combination bicycle and bridle paths paralleling State Highways in this area are being placed in most local business establishments.

These petitions, which were drawn up by a group of interested local citizens ask that these paths be incorporated in the design of all new highway construction, with particular emphasis on the proposed new Eagle River Road.

Suggested design of the paths would be for eight feet of paved surface for bicycles and

HIGHWAY FENCES TO COME DOWN



CHUGIAK: Most of the fencing along the new Glenn Highway between Eagle River and Peters Creek will be coming down, according to Jack Spake Head of the Anchorage District of the Department of Highways.

Mr. Spake stated that with the exception of at intersections and in highly populated areas, the Federal Government no longer requires that fences be erected along Alaskan highways.

Spake said that no regular schedule for removal of the fences is planned, but that the chain link variety would be taken down whenever the Department was in need of this type of fencing at another location, and would be utilized there.

The woven wire type of fence which was put up in the unpopulated stretches of highway will be taken down in the future to permit the free movement of moose and other wildlife, Spake stated.

PUBLIC HEARING POSSIBLE ON MIRROR LAKE RESTRICTION

PETERS CREEK: Public hearings may be scheduled to discuss the closure of Mirror Lake to boats in excess of 6 horsepower if sufficient interest is displayed.

This statement was made by T. G. Smith, Director of the Alaska Division of Parks.

The restrictions which will go into effect July 1, 1971 were made as a result of a number of protests by local citizens who felt that the high powered boats were posing a danger to smaller craft and swimmers.

Smith said that under the statutes of the State Park regulations, the Director may set restrictions on the use of recreation areas if it is deemed in the best interests of the public.

All power boats must display the manufacturer's plate showing the horsepower rating or model number.

Any violation of this closure will be treated as a violation

would be for eight feet of paved surface for bicycles and eight feet of gravel surface for horses. In the winter these paths would be available for snow machine travel.

The paths would be located no less than 25 feet from the traffic lanes of the highways, and would serve dual purpose for maintenance vehicles as well as for recreational purposes.

Local residents are urged to sign these petitions in order to encourage these forms of transportation which are becoming popular with the area youth.

DRIVER SERIOUSLY HURT WHEN CAR HITS BERM

PETERS CREEK: An Anchorage man was seriously injured when his car struck an earthen barricade just south of the chain-link fence which marks the ending of the Old Glenn Highway, to the north of the Old Peters Creek Bridge.

The 1964 Rambler Station Wagon struck the berm at high speed and catapulted for approximately 130 feet before crashing to the ground.

The driver, Earl Thomas Bangle, age 22 of Anchorage was trapped in the wreckage.

The accident took place at approximately 6:35am on Friday, June 18th. A passing motorist summoned Trooper Farber from the Mirror Lake Post, and they were able to free the injured man from the car. The Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance responded and the victim was transported to the 5040th Air Force Hospital and then later transported to Providence Hospital where he is still in critical condition.

There have been at least a half a dozen accidents resulting in serious injury to the drivers at this location ever since the Department of Highways erected the chain link

fence closing off the road in the fall of 1969.

Drivers unfamiliar with the road or missing the North Birchwood Loop turn off are lured by the appearance of an intersection ahead and continue down the hill and across the bridge without slackening their speed to crash into the berm wrecking their car and suffering injury.

The Department of Highway Officials have admitted that this is a bad situation, but to date have done nothing to improve it.

The latest accident has brought forth a number of suggestions on how this can be remedied.

Jack Spake, Engineer for the local Highway District stated that several plans are being considered. More signs warning of the dead end, additional barricades, scarification of the pavement between the bridge and the fence were some of the suggestions. Mr. Spake vetoed the opening of the Old Glenn Highway to intersect with the new road for several reasons. He pointed out that the old highway was scheduled to be connected with the new road construction in a project to be

completed in approximately two years, and to attempt to construct an intersection now would be costly. Also he said such an intersection might prove to be an even greater traffic hazard.

Mr. Spake asked the Knik Arm Courier for any suggestions other than those mentioned above which might help reduce the danger. It was pointed out that if the view of traffic along the new highway could be blotted out, the driver would not be misled into thinking it was an intersection. To a car proceeding down Peters Creek hill on the south side of the old bridge, the fence is invisible, and the dirt berm looks like nothing more than gravel on the road. It was suggested that plywood warning signs attached to the fence would prevent the drivers from seeing the lights and vehicles along the new highway and assuming that the road ahead was unobstructed.

Mr. Spake stated that this was a suggestion of merit, and would be considered.

Following the accident last Friday, the Knik Arm Courier placed a long distance call

wildlife, Spake stated. The Alaska Wildlife and Sportsman's Council have been petitioning the Federal Highway Administration to exempt Alaska from the requirement that all Federal Aid Highways be fenced. They claimed that these fences interfered with the natural movement of the moose population from their summer to winter feeding grounds, and in many instances resulted in cows and calves being separated.

Spake stated that in the future, with the exception of at intersections and in highly populated areas, all new highway construction would be unfenced.

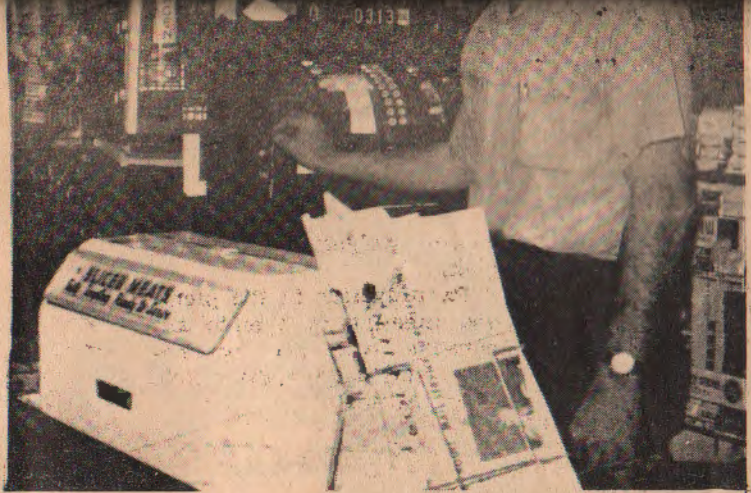

The accident took place at the intersection of Easy St. and the Old Glenn Highway.

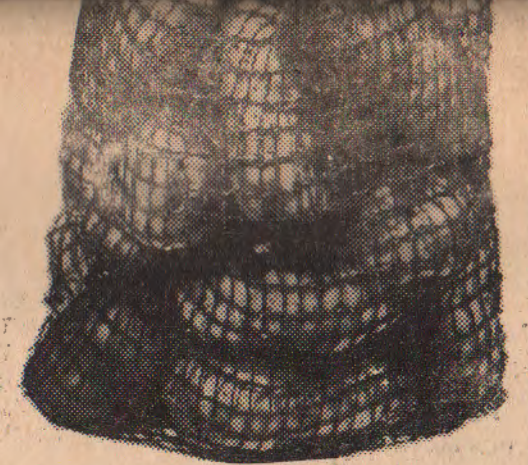

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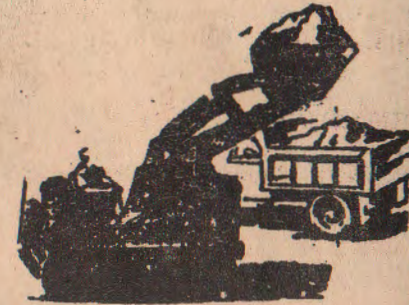
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CBA TO NAME NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The main item of business will be the selection of a nominating committee to pick a slate of candidates to fill the six openings which will occur to the Board of Directors this year.

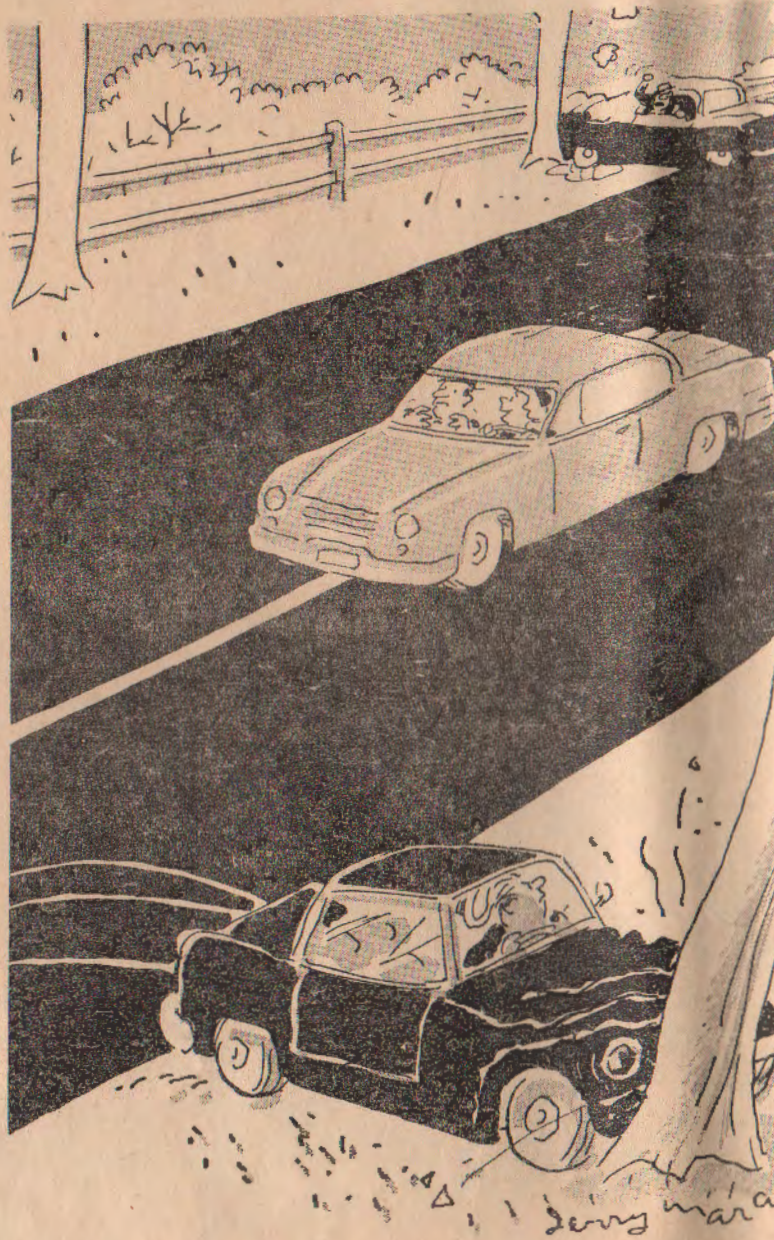
These positions will be filled at the CBA Annual meeting in July by popular vote of the members.

Forms for claiming the exemption Form W-4E, are available from Internal Revenue offices if employers do not have them, he said.

For 1971, a single person who makes less than \$1,700 owes no tax. This is based on the \$1,950 low income allowance and a personal exemption of \$650. A single taxpayer over sixty-five can earn wages up to \$2,300

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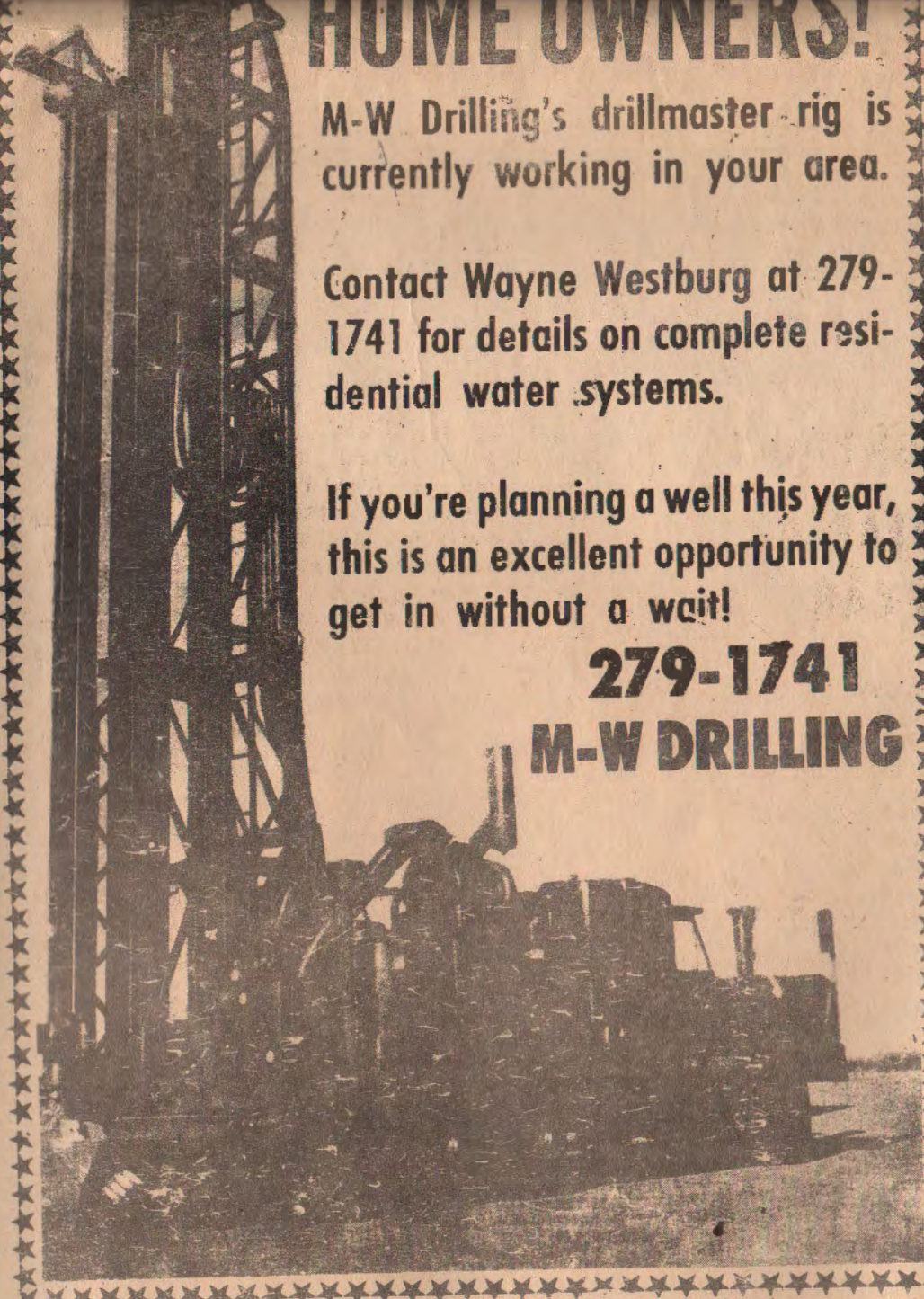
