PUBLIC HEARING CALLED ON MIRROR LAKE CLOSURE

OLD CHUGIAK: The starting time for the First Annual 4th of July Parade has been moved ahead to 12:30pm according to a spokesman for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, sponsors of the parade.

There are a total of 15 entries in the parade, including floats, decorated cars, mounted units and clowns. The parade will start at the Chugiak Fire Hall at Mile 18 3/4 and continue down the Old Glenn Highway to the Rodeo grounds at mile 21.

DELAY IN LOCAL SCHOOL COMPLETION SEEN

CHUGIAK: The estimated completion dates for the construction of additions to local schools was announced this week.

The addition to Chugiak High School and Eagle River Elementary School originally scheduled for completion by August 25th have been revised.

EAGLE RIVER: The Division of Parks will hold a public hearing on the closure order of Mirror Lake, according to T.G. Smith, Director.

The meeting is scheduled for tonight, Wednesday, June 30th at 8:00pm in the Sportsman's Game Preservation Association Building at Mile 15 on the Old Glenn Highway.

The hearing was called upon protests from water skiing enthusiasts who claimed that limiting the horsepower of boats to 6 h.p. would put an end to skiing on Mirror Lake.

They claim that boats of that horse power can not be used to tow skiers.

Smith said that in view of the fact that the closure would go into effect on Thursday July 1st, the Division of Parks would have to come with a decision immediately upon the close of the hearing.

If the closure does go into effect, the boat launching area at the lake will be posted.

BROADWATER INDUSTRIES STARTS PRODUCTION NEXT WEEK

EAGLE RIVER: Broadwater Industries in Eagle River will be going into production next week, according to Bob Broadwater, owner of the new plant.

Broadwater stated that most of the equipment has been installed and is now undergoing testing.

He said that the first products they will be turning out will be the building forms.

He asked that local residents be reassured that there will be no odor or other harmful emissions from the plant.

Broadwater Industries, which is located in the former Eagle River Bowl building will manufacture a variety of plastic foam products in addition to the building forms when they are in full production.

The new completion date for Eagle River Elementary School has been set for October 15th, while Chuglak High will not be ready for use until November 1st.

Soil conditions resulting from the recent winter was given as the reason for the delay.

PARADISE HAVEN LIQUOR LICENSE APPROVED

JUNEAU: The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, at their June 23rd meeting in Juneau, approved the issuance of a beverage dispensing license to John Barclay, of Eagle River.

Barclay has applied for the license to be used at Paradise Haven, a resort which he is developing at his homestead in the Eagle River valley.

A license for retail sales of alcoholic beverages at Paradise Haven, was denied by the ABC Board.

The Board will now forward

their decision to the Greater Anchorage Area Borough who have thirty days in which to endorse or protest the decision. If there is no protest within thirty days, the license will become effective.

CHAMBER FOR HELP FOR COMMUNITY

EAGLE RIVER: The local Chamber of Commerce has appealed directly to Governor William Egan for both more State Troopers for the Greater Chuglak Area and for better maintenance of the Old Glenn Highway.

In a letter to the Governor, the Chamber pointed out the number of serious accidents resulting in numerous injuries and the death which have occurred on the old highway during recent months and pointed out how in most cases it was the poorly maintained condition of the road which lead to them.

It was also pointed out that the State Troopers which had been assigned here last year have since been pulled out, and that now this area must depend on the one trooper who has to cover the area from Portage to the Knik River.

It was requested that at least one resident trooper be assigned to this area, and that a local phone number be obtained where the State Troopers may be summoned. It was pointed out that difficulties in getting through to Anchorage often delayed getting a Trooper to the scene of a crime or an accident.

The name of the shop is Tetpon's own name in the language of his ancestors. It follows the tradition of giving the name of a deceased person to the next child to be born in the family.

Tetpon stated that he plans to sell handmade Alaskan Art and crafts almost exclusively.

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CHANGES MADE AT DEAD END

CHUGIAK: The Department of Highways has begun the changes which they hope will reduce the hazardous situation which exists at the north end of the Old Glenn Highway at Peters Creek.

The blacktop has been removed from the road between the entrance of the Peters Creek Wayside and the fence and the mound of dirt just to the south of the fence has been piled higher.

A series of accidents have taken place at this location, when motorists who were unaware that the road deadended at this point, crashed into the pile of dirt and catapulted over it, usually totaling out their cars, and resulting in serious injuries to the drivers.

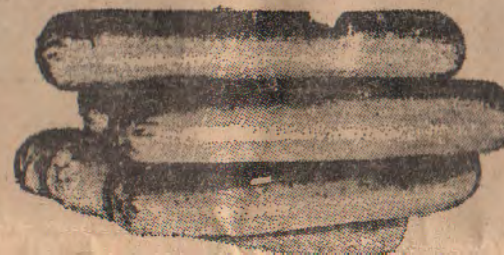

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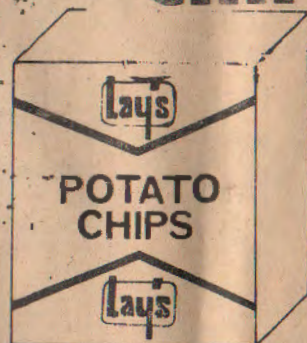

ANDY KIRK TO ATTEND NSF WORKSHOP

BIRCHWOOD: Andy Kirk, of Chugiak High School will be one of 15 Social Studies teachers from the Anchorage School District who will attend a three and one half week National Science Foundation Workshop in Boulder Colorado during July.

The workshop will give in-depth training in four new social studies projects - in geography, anthropology, economics and sociology.

NSF will pay air travel, a subsistence allowance and a honorium to the twelve teachers on the team, also providing instructors for the training.

The grant is estimated to be worth about \$10,000 to the school district.

Superintendent Joe D. Montgomery, stated that Anchorage is one of seven cities in the United States selected by the Social Science Consortium to participate in the workshop.

Alman contacted Marshall and gave him 72 hours in which to remove the vehicle from State property.

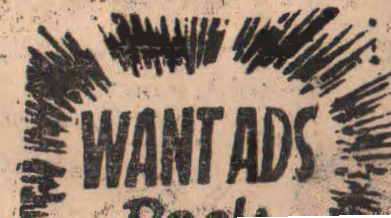
PETERS CREEK: A lost two year old child was found safe by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company this past week.

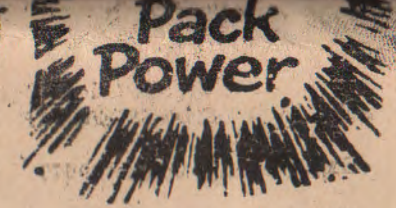

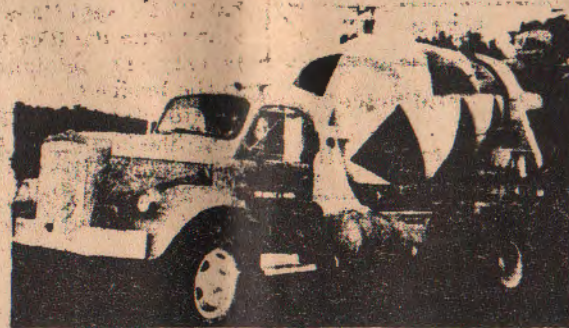

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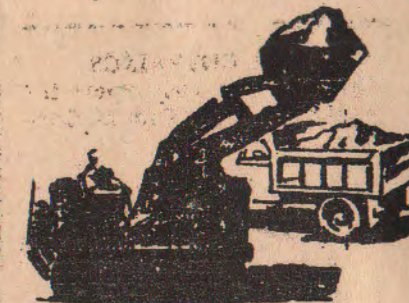
