

EXTENT OF LOCAL DRUG PROBLEM TO BE TOLD AT MEETING

CHS GRAD HURT IN ACCIDENT DELAY IN ROSEBUD

DECISION SEEN

FIRE LAKE: The Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance last Saturday, responded to a traffic accident at Fish Hatchery Road in Fire Lake, and transported a Chuglak Area teen-ager to Providence Hospital.

The youth, Steven Neves, a recent graduate of Chuglak High was suffering from lacerations of the head.

Also transported with minor injuries were Rod Bartlett and Bob Lawrence, who gave their addresses as Anchorage.

The report was received at 2:00am on Saturday morning. No further details are available.

ANCHORAGE: The decision as to whether or not to grant the permit to Rosebud Refuse Co. may be delayed a week or more, according to Commissioner Jake Johnson of the Alaska Transportation Commission.

The Commission which recently conducted a public hearing of the application in Eagle River, must now review the evidence presented at this hearing. Johnson stated that one member of the Commission had been unexpectedly called out of state, and the

SIREN BLASTS SUNDAY SLEEPERS

PETERS CREEK: Residents in the vicinity of mile 23 were blasted from their beds at 5am last Sunday morning convinced that either the whole country was on fire or that World War III had started.

A continuous siren screaming for at least ten minutes without let-up brought all but the soundest sleepers from their beds.

The culprit was the ambulance from Tok, which had delivered a patient to the hospital in Glennallen and was enroute to Anchorage for parts when a gas line broke spraying gasoline on the hot engine and caused a fire which shorted out the siren.

A call was put to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, who responded and were able to put out the fire with a dry-chemical fire extinguisher, a type which each member of the Fire Company carries in his personal car.

The siren was silenced only when someone disconnected the battery cable.

called out of state, and the remaining members would await his return before attempting to come to any conclusion.

William E. Pettit, of Eagle River, who operates Rosebud Refuse had applied to the Transportation Commission for a permit to haul garbage and household refuse.

Johnson stated that approximately 40 persons attended the hearing, which was held at the Eagle River Theater.

He said that the consensus of the opinion of the local residents who testified was in favor of having competition in this type of service in the community, rather than the monopoly which now exists.

Johnson stated that he feels the hearing accomplished the purpose for which it was called, namely to gather additional information for the Commission.

He said that the Commission would now act upon the recommendation of the hearing officer. He said they could either adopt the recommendation, amend it, or not adopt it. The hearing officer, on the basis of evidence presented at the original hearing last March, and recommended that the permit not be granted.

CHARTER COMMISSION TO HOLD HEARING TONIGHT

BIRCHWOOD: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area will get their chance to tie into the new Charter at a public hearing tonight, Wednesday, June 9th, at 8:00pm at the Birchwood Elementary School.

While reports of attendance at public hearings elsewhere in the Borough indicate a lack of interest and poor attendance, this is not expected at the local meeting.

Residents of this area have been very vocal in their opposition to unification from the outset, and turned up en masse at the hearing last year to pick the original charter to pieces.

Nothing has happened to indicate that the concept of unification has become anymore palatable, and it is doubtful that the revised Charter will be anymore to their liking. If the Charter Commission

have complained of apathy at the hearings to date, they may welcome the lively exchange of opinions they are sure to encounter at tonight's meeting.

KNIK RIVER ROAD TO BE BUILT

JUNEAU: Plans for the improvement of a road along the south bank of the Knik River were announced this week by the Alaska Department of Highways.

This project would consist of grading and draining of a road which will extend 9.66 miles along the Knik River from a junction with the Old Glenn Highway.

Included in this project is a 70 foot long composite steel and concrete bridge across Hunter Creek.

Advertising for bids will begin June 14th, with bids to be opened in the Commissioners Office in Douglas on July 8th.

All work is scheduled for completion in 190 Calendar Days.

NO BURNING IN BOROUGH

ANCHORAGE: Word has been received of the death of a former resident of the Chugiak Area.

Mrs. George (Evelyn) Sehm died on Tuesday morning at Providence Hospital of an apparent heart attack.

Mrs. Sehm came to Alaska 21 years ago, and resided in the Chugiak Area for a number of years. She was active in numerous business ventures and for a time operated the Sougdog Drive In, one of the first drive in type food stands in the area. This was located at Mile 20 1/2, at the present location of Wade's garage.

While living in the area she assisted in the formation of the First Girl Scout Troop in Chugiak.

Mrs. Sehm was born on September 12th, 1913 in Rochester New York. At the time of her death she resided at 3307 Dorbrandt Street in Anchorage.

She is survived by her husband George and son Douglas of Anchorage and a brother Norman MacMillan, of Rochester New York.

Memorial services will be held at the Spenard Heights Mortuary on Friday, June 11th at 2:00pm.

Rev. Wilber Craig, a former pastor of the Chugiak Chapel will officiate.

Members of the family have asked that in place of flowers memorials be made to the Heart Fund.

Summer Session Draws 2,000

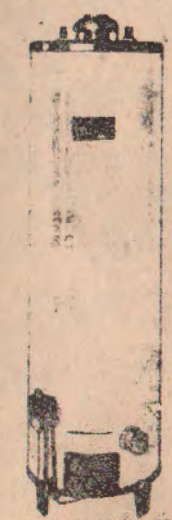
More than 2,000 students have enrolled for summer semester classes at Anchorage Community College and the University of Alaska, Anchorage.

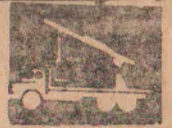

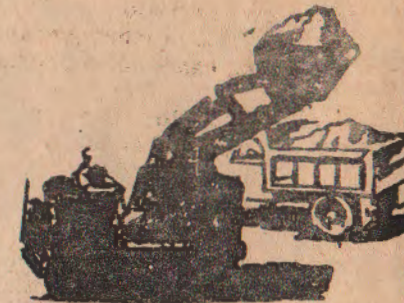

On Monday, at 3:00pm they answered a call to Aurora Parkway where they extinguished a stump fire.

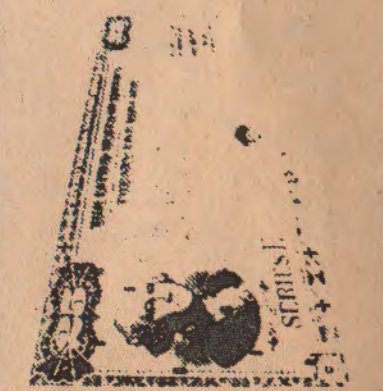
At 6:20 on the same day they were called to the Spangler residence on Division Street where burning garbage had gotten out of control.
