PRISON IN EAGLE RIVER A SURE THING

ROSEBUD REFUSE GRANTED PERMIT

EAGLE RIVER: Rosebud Refuse, of Eagle River has finally been granted a permit to transport household garbage, rubbish and refuse within the Greater Chugiak Area, according to the Alaska Transportation Commission.

William E. Pettit, who operate Rosebud Refuse had applied for this permit last December 23rd, and following a series of public hearings, the permit has finally been granted.

Prime opponent to the granting of his permit has been Anchorage Refuse, who until that time had been the only carrier permitted to pick-up garbage within this area.

Interested parties have within 20 days of the issuance of this order to appeal the decision of the Commission.

Pettit, who had continued to haul garbage for his customers (but without charge) after he had been ordered to cease and desist last January, said "I am very happy with the decision of the Commission, and I want to thank all the people of this community for their confidence and support."



EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River area has been definitely chosen as the site for the construction of a State Prison, according to a spokesman for the Department of Correction.

A parcel of land consisting of 67.78 acres was transferred to the Division of Correction by the Division of Lands on May 7th. This land is located just south of the Eagle River Campground and belonged to the Department of Mental Health prior to the transfer.

Plans for the proposed prison are presently being reviewed by the Division of Building and will be put out for bid shortly.

This is to be a medium security facility, to house a maximum of 180 inmates. It could be expanded to house 300 as future needs would dictate.

Funding for the building of the facility is through a direct appropriation of 5.2 million appropriated for this purpose by the 1970 legislature. This is to be the beginning of a program for construction of regional correctional institutions throughout the State.

within this area. Supporting Pettit were numerous residents of the Greater Chugiak Area, including the local Chamber of Commerce.

At the most recent hearing, held on June 2nd at the Eagle River Theater, present as well as prospective customers of Rosebud appeared to present testimony as to why they felt he should be granted the permit.

Finding of the commission as result of that hearing were that the highways and roads in the Greater Chugiak area vary greatly in width and type of surface and that the terrain of the neighborhood areas and the type of roads in some of the areas does not represent the ideal conditions for large overhead dumping equipment, such as is used by Pettit's competitor. Also, that the operation of Anchorage Refuse Inc. with 40 routes and 8,000 customers will not be substantially affected by the addition of one small individual competitor in one localized regional area. The Commission felt that this would not endanger the stability and dependability essential to the public needs as set forth in the law, and is in the public interest. On the contrary, additional authority in this area would not only provide the residents with all the advantages of competitive service, but should provide applicant with an adequate financial base to provide the proposed service without substantially affecting the revenues of the existing carrier.

The Commission has given Pettit a maximum of thirty days in which to comply with the requirements for being granted the permit. These include listing tariff naming rates etc., posting surety bond, showing proof of insur-

VETERINARIAN CLINIC TO OPEN HERE

EAGLE RIVER: A team of Anchorage Veterinarians will be opening a clinic in Eagle River sometime next week it was learned today.

Doctors Dan Lavach, David Howe and Ken Spurling of the Chester Valley Animal Hospital will alternate office hours at the local clinic.

The clinic is to be located in the building which was recently vacated by Peters Creek Fuel next to Far North Service.

It is expected that at first the clinic will be open only during the afternoon hours.

Services to be offered will be vaccinations, treatment of minor injuries and illnesses and X-ray facilities. Any surgery or hospitalization will be referred to the Chester Valley facility.

Dr. Howe indicated that they will be available for "house calls" for horses or other large livestock.

They hope to have the clinic equipped and open for service by Monday or Tuesday of next week.

BODY OF SLAIN CAB DRIVER FOUND HERE

BIRCHWOOD: The body of an Anchorage taxicab driver, who has been missing since last Thursday, July 8th was found last Monday night in the Birchwood area.

The man, Harry Hibbs, age 48 had disappeared along with the Yellow Cab he was driving sometime between 11:00am on Wednesday and 2:30am on Thursday.

His last contact with his dispatcher indicated that he had picked up a fare on Fourth Avenue in Anchorage and was to transport him to Eagle River.

The body was discovered at approximately 7:00pm on Monday by two 12 year old youngsters. According to the Alaska State Troopers, the body was in the weeds approximately 15 feet off the road and quite visible. The road is off Birchwood Loop near the Richner residence. The children had reported their find to Mr. Richner, who in turn called the State Troopers. Richner stated that the Troopers responded within five minutes of receiving his call.

The report is that Hibbs was apparently dead for several

days as the result of a bullet wound. Robbery was the apparent motive for the killing.

The Yellow Cab which he was driving is still missing. It is described as a 1970 Dodge with Alaska State license number FH 1009 and Yellow Cab number 39.

The State Troopers are looking for a 20 year old man approximately 5 foot 7 inches in height, slightly built and possibly an Alaskan native.

Hibbs, who has been a resident of Alaska for only six weeks was married. It is not known at this time if he had any children.

LOCAL SEWER PROJECT UNDERWAY

EAGLE RIVER: Residents in the neighborhood of the Eagle River Shopping Area will soon be receiving community sewer service, according to a

spokesman for B.B. & S construction Inc. contractors for the project.

The system, (the first in the Greater Chugiak Area) will consist of a treatment plant of two lagoons with aeration system, and a total of 15,000 ft. of sewage line, including laterals and outfall.

The treatment plant will be located approximately 1 1/2 miles from the Glenn Highway on the military reservation. The treated sewage is to be discharged into the River.

The project, which is scheduled for completion by late October of 1971, will cost \$500,730.00 and is financed by a government loan.

The plant is designed so that additional lagoons and laterals can be added at a later date to accommodate additional users.

This system of sewage treatment is, according to a spokesman for B.B. & S Construction, a highly satisfactory method, with a minimum of odor, and does not pollute the streams once treatment is complete. It has been used in other places in Alaska.

utions throughout the State. It is anticipated that when complete a staff of 60 to 70 people would be employed.

Scheduled completion date is July of 1973.

Local residents first became aware of the proposed prison last fall when this was one of two sites being considered for the facility. The other site was near Anchorage adjacent to the Alaska Psychiatric Institute.

It was learned just last week that the Eagle River site was the one which had been selected.

MISSING DYNAMITE IS SOUGHT

EAGLE RIVER: Alaska State Troopers this week reported the theft of over 300 pounds of dynamite from the Powder Magazine storage area near Eagle River.

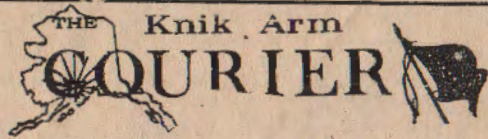
The theft apparently took place sometime between the 4th and 29th of June.

In addition to the dynamite an unspecified amount of assorted explosives including blasting caps and primers are missing.

Two Chugiak area juveniles were arrested in connection with the theft, and some of the explosives were recovered, but the majority is still missing.

State Troopers have warned of the danger of storing the caps in the same area as the dynamite, as static electricity could cause them to go off.

The current investigation was the result of a formal protest lodged by the local Chamber to the Commission.

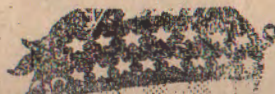
