WATER SKIERS ASKED TO DRAFT ALTERNATIVE TO LAKE CLOSURE

PETERS CREEK: Water skiing proponents who appeared at a public hearing last week concerning the closure of Mirror Lake to power boats of over 6 horse power were offered the opportunity to come up with an alternative solution to the problem.

According to Ted Smith, director of the division of Parks and Recreation.

Smith suggested that the water skiers form a committee to come up with some workable plan whereby he take could be open to higher powered boats for the specific

purpose of towing water skiers. Smith said that in his opinion this would have to be a zoned program, with the lake open to skiing only during certain specified hours of the day.

Approximately 50 persons attended the hastily called meeting last Wednesday night. Approximately half of those there were local residents who favored the closure, while half were water stiers, who opposed it. Smith into the water skiers appeared to be Aucho a residents, rather than uglak Area people.

ANCHORAGE: Books, everywhere, in every village, in every home in the state.

This is the goal of the Alaska Library Association.

It is not an impossible goal. A library need not be a solemn impressive building. A few shelves in a place convenient to people, an interested person willing to give a little time to keep track of who has which book ("checking them out" is the librarians term), and the aid of the Division of State libraries in Juneau, and a library anywhere is a reality.

The Division of State Libraries will, upon request, send a selection of books on long term and initial supplies such as book cards, date due cards etc., and gift materials as avallable. Current books can be received and returned by mail. The only stipulation is that the service must be free and available to everyone in the area. The person acting as librarian, however, is free to state at what regular hours the service will be open, and should have the backing of the community.

The division of State Libraries also has a monthly mail service from the State Library available to individuals, schools and families. This service alone can create an active little library for a very small community. Since most libraries work together, a community having a library

We v: have continuous entertainment all evening, Also we are arranging to have more tables and benches to sit on.



Talkeetna Land Auction Scheduled For July 22

Approximately 6,800 acres in the Willow-Talkeetna area will be offered for lease or sale at a land auction to be held in Talkeetna on July 22 at 1 p.m., the Alaska Division of Lands has announced.

Fifty-eight of the 93 parcels at the auction are owned by the Mat-Su borough, borough chairman Robert Vroman said.

The lands are located on both sides of the Susitna River between Willow and Talkeetna. The tracts for sale or lease have been classified as private recreation, utility or commercial, according to F. J. Keenan, director of the Division of Lands.

Of the properties up for sale, 29 are classed a private recreation, 31 as utility and one 160 parcel is designated comnercial. Lease properties include 27 of the private recreation type, with one of these, the smallest offered in the auction, just 0.65 acres. One lease unit is set as utility and three are commercial.

The largest of the 'racts being offered is a 340-acre parcel in the utility sale class ap-


The second venicle, driven by Mancel Pederson of Old Chugiak, apparently struck the other car in the rear due to the inability of the driver to stop in time.
