MEA APPLIES FOR REA FUNDS

PALMER: Rebuilding of several existing lines in the Greater Chugiak Area are included in the construction plans to be financed by a loan applied for by the Matanuska Electric Association.

On June 29th, the Matanuska Electric Association submitted an application to the REA and CFC for a \$4.9 million concurrent loan to provide construction funds.

If approved, REA's portion would be \$4,461,000 with the rest coming from CFC, \$439,000, to provide for the 1972 and 1973 construction

GROUP SEEKS TO HALT CANNIK IN

ANCHORAGE: A group which calls themselves "People against Amchitka" are seeking to have Alaskans to write to President Nixon urging him to cancel the Cannikin atomic test at Amchitka.

According to Mrs. Malani Gerrish, of Muldoon, a number of petitions have been printed, and some will be placed in business places in the Greater Chugliak Area asking for a halt to Cannikin.

Mrs. Gerrish asks all who are opposed to the test to sign their petitions in addition to writing to the President.

She asks that anyone wanting information on the subject call her at 333-1472.

The requested funds are for the construction of new consumer extensions and a variety of system improvements to provide additional capacity to supply the requirements of existing members as well as 795 new consumers.

New substations are planned in the Birchwood, Butte and Big Lake areas. Additional transformer capacity is planned for the Lucas Substation in Palmer. Several miles of new transmission line will be required to transport power to these substations.

The construction plans rebuilding of lines in Palmer, Wasilla, Big Lake and Talkeetna as well as in Chugliak.

When completed these lines will provide the additional capacity needed by the growing loads.

Consumer extensions to 765 new members will require the construction of about 223 miles of new distribution line throughout the service area.

Included is the necessary line to connect the system to the Talkeetna area and permit the shutdown of the Talkeetna generating plant.

This large construction program, planned to increase system capacity, to improve electric service and reliability in all areas, and to extend to many areas not now served, is contingent upon the favorable consideration of the application by REA and CFC.

The rate of growth in all parts of the service area is such that all of the various parts of the construction plan are urgently needed to keep pace with the snowballing needs.

STATE AID POSSIBLE FOR LOCAL FLOOD VICTIMS

CHUGIAK: Some State aid may be available to the residents of Little Peters Creek and Lower Peters Creek, according to Don Lowell of the State Disaster Office.

Lowell stated that although in both cases the roads and bridges were not state built or maintained, the need of these people could not be ignored.

Lowell said that a team from the Governor's office would be in the area this week and would be assessing the extent of the damage and determining the cost of replacement bridges. He said the extent of the aid would be dependent on available funds.

In the meantime residents of Lower Peters Creek have constructed a temporary foot bridge at the site of the washed out bridge, eliminating the necessity of using the railroad bridge to cross to and from their homes. However,

LOCAL HOMES NEEDED FOR BOARDING STUDENTS

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area have been asked to open their homes to high school aged students from remote villages which do not have high school facilities.

These are students both male and female from grades 9 through 12.

So far, according to Oscar Kawagley, Director of the Boarding home program, 19 students have been placed in this area, with the possibility of four more homes to be made available.

All of these students will attend Chugiak High this fall.

Mr. Kawagley has many more students that could be placed in this area if homes are available. The state pays \$150 per student per month to the family who provides the housing.

It is preferred that the students be placed in pairs or in homes where there are other teenagers for companionship, Mr. Kawagley said.

Anyone interested in helping an Alaskan student to the education he or she might not otherwise get is asked to call either Oscar Kawagley at 277-8634 or Andy Kirk at 688-2548. Andy Kirk and Dick Kerbow, both teachers at Chugiak High will be working with these students for the week before school opens.

A Preview of "One People" Government

A little noted incident at the Anchorage City Council meeting last week may be a fair example of how the residents of the rural areas will be treated under the unified "One People" government.

We refer to attempt on the part of some of the City Councilman to get the rest of the Council to go on record as being opposed to the extension of natural gas service to the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area.

Their main reason for opposing it appeared to be that they did not feel residents of this area should get gas service at the same rate as those in Anchorage. They felt the rate should be higher.

Since the natural gas is provided by a private utility, and higher rates would in no way benefit Anchorage residents just as lower rates would not cost them anything, this reason-

ing appears to be nothing more than the same old sectionalism that pro-unification voices try to make us believe doesn't exist.

Fortunately the remainder of the Council did not go along with the few in this move, and the Council did not voice the opposition which would have thrown the proposal into public hearings. However, the reasons for this were apparently motivated by fear of the harm it might do to the charter vote than by any desire to be fair to local residents.

This was publicized by Anchorage newspapers as "City Council Okay's Natural Gas Service for Eagle River", to make it appear to residents of this area that we should be grateful to the City Council for the service.

Had this come up at a time when the vote of residents of this area were not being woo-

ed, we feel that the Council would have not been so generous.

The City of Anchorage are "One People" all right, and we are another, and let's hope that this is remembered on August 31st, when they ask us to turn over all our freedom of choice to a City dominated Unified Assembly.

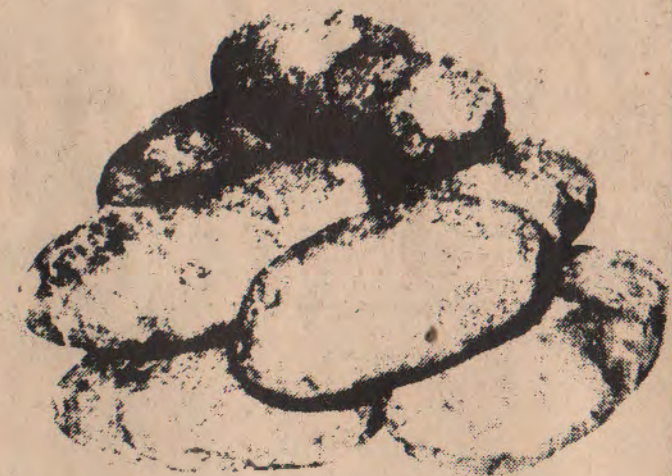

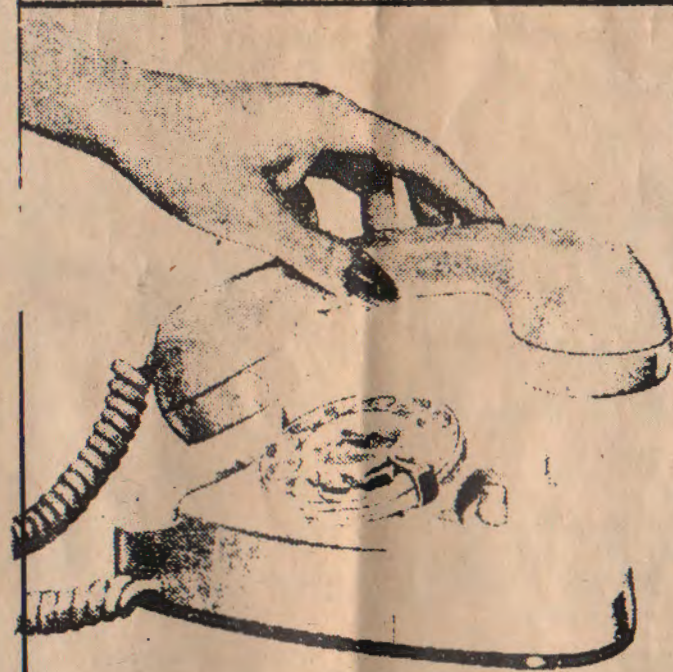

Bond Whitmore, who is the new Principal, came to Eagle River from the Nunaka Valley School where he served as principal for 13 years.

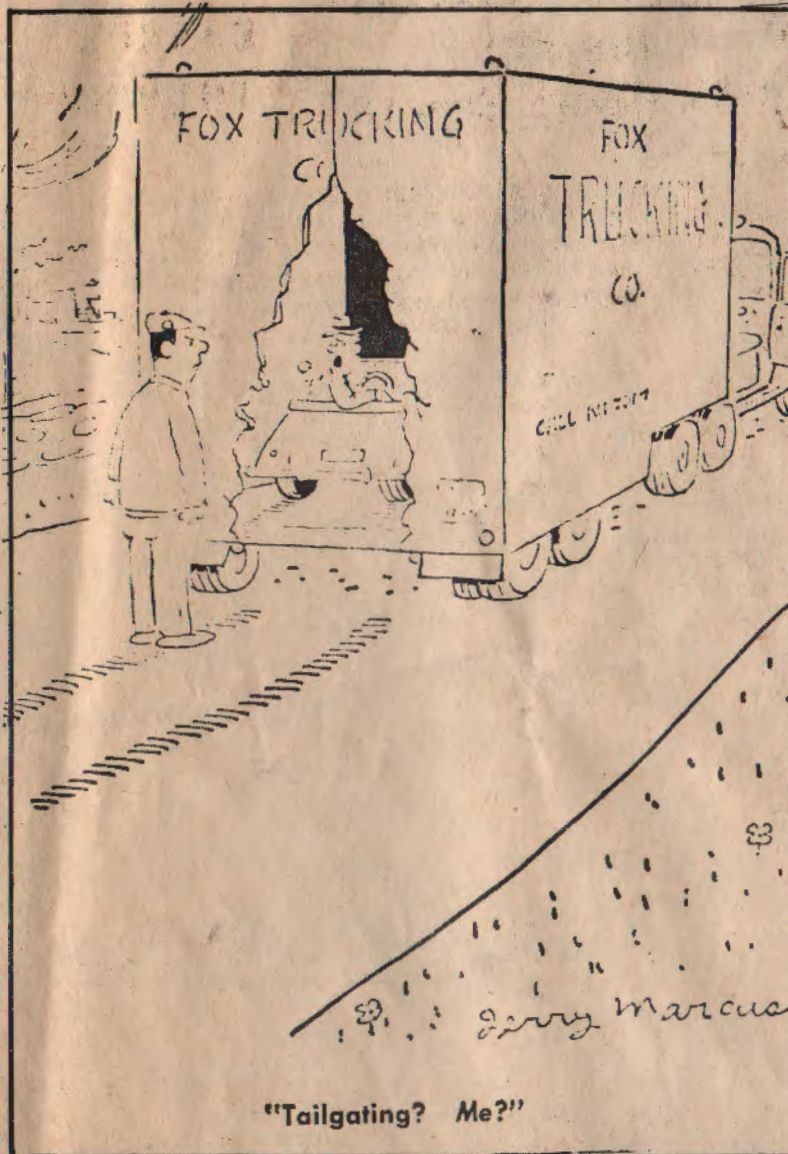
