BIRCHWOOD SLATED FOR MEA SUB-STATION

ANTI-CHARTER GROUP MEETS TONIGHT

EAGLE RIVER: Opponents of Unification will meet tonight at the Eagle River Theater to map plans for the defeat of the proposed Charter.

This is to be the first in a series of meetings of a coordinated boroughwide campaign of anti-charter forces.

The meeting will begin at 8:00pm, and everyone interested in defeating the Charter is urged to attend.

Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from this area, and long time opponent of unification stated that the prime objective of this campaign will be to get out the vote.

FIRE DESTROYS WALLACE HOME

OLD CHUGIAK: The homestead cabin of Mr. and Mrs. Til Wallace, located high on a ridge in Old Chugiak was once again the victim of fire.

On last Saturday afternoon the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company received a report of smoke coming from the vicinity of the Wallace homestead.

The Fire Company reported that they were unable to



PALMER: A new substation and six-tenths of a mile of 115 KV transmission line are earmarked for the Birchwood area through a loan application to the Rural Electrification Administration by the Matanuska Electric Association.

The project calls for the construction of 7.0 miles of 34.5 KV and 15.2 miles of 115 KV transmission line. In addition to the Birchwood substation one is proposed for the Butte and Bir

Butte and Big Lake areas. With the exception of the line in Birchwood, the transmission line will be located in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough.

These facilities will make it possible for MEA to provide service to an estimated 765 new consumers and to meet the increasing power demands of present consumers.

Little evidence to show that the rural voter have changed their minds on unification, and if only a way can be found to get each and every rural voter to the polls, then he is sure the charter can be defeated just as it was last year.

Willis also stated that donations of funds to promote this campaign will be sought at the meeting. "There is a lot of money backing the Charter", he said, "and while we will be fighting with votes rather than money, we are going to need all we can get."

The "kitty" for the drive has already been started with the pledge of \$100.00 from the local Chamber of Commerce.

Other organizations, businesses and individuals are asked to contribute as much as they are able to.

The Eagle River Theater where the meeting is to be held is located at the corner of Eagle River Loop and Eagle River Road.

bring any attention to the scene of the fire as a land developer in the area had cut across the road leading to the homestead, making it impossible for them to get a truck through.

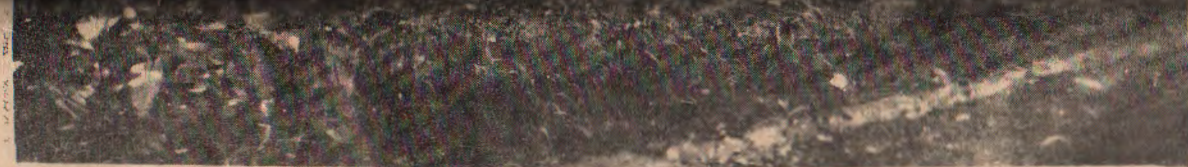
Wallace himself was able to get through on a motorcycle and found the house completely destroyed by fire.

The Wallace's have not been living on their homestead for several years, but Wallace found evidence that someone had been occupying the cabin recently. Whether the fire had been deliberately set, or was the result of negligence was not immediately determined.

The original Wallace homestead cabin had been burned by arsonists several years ago. More recently the cabin which was burned last Saturday had been broken into and vandalized.

Wallace, who operates Wallace Construction and Klondike Rock and Mining has been the victim of acts of vandalism repeatedly during the past number of years, both to his home and equipment.

Wallace said that he believed that the cabin did have some insurance coverage, but not enough to cover the loss completely.

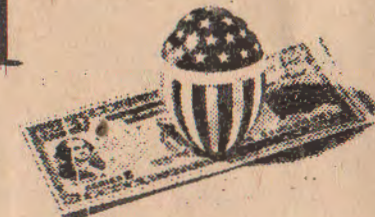

The tow line parted, and the van skidded across the road and flipped onto its side.

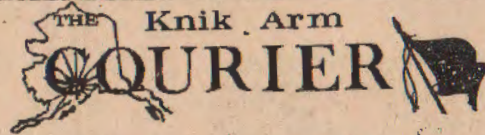
The driver of the VW, Carol Gurler age 22, of Gulkana suffered an apparent broken collar bone and other injuries.

REGISTRATION FOR CHARTER ELECTION

EAGLE RIVER: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area who are not registered to vote in the August 31st Charter election, will be offered the opportunity to do so within the next week.

A special registration booth will be set up at the Alaska Cleaners in the Eagle River Shopping Center on Friday and Saturday, August 7th and 8th and again on Friday and Saturday, August 13th and 14th. Registrars will man the booth from 9am until 6pm on those days.

To be eligible to vote in the election, one must be a citizen of the United States, age 18 a resident of the state for one year and a resident of the election district for 30 days.

Persons who may have moved since their last registration are asked to come down to the registration booth and have their address changed on their record.

Bear Camp Must Be Registered

Fall bear camps in game management units 9 and 10 on the Alaska Peninsula must be pre-registered before September 1, the Fish and Game Department reminded hunters today.

The regulation applies to both resident and nonresident hunters where aircraft will be used for transportation.

Camp registrations are valid for the duration of the hunting season, but may not be changed, transferred to a different location or to other persons. The exact location of the camp must be marked on an aeronautical chart.

The injured boy, Steve Musgrove, 17, was taken to Providence Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance.

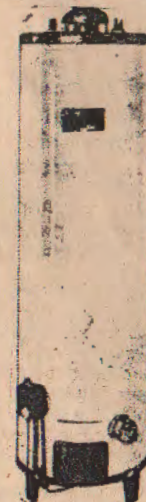
He was treated for cuts to the head.

Cars Need Licensing

Vehicles belonging to recent arrivals in Alaska are subject to the state's registration laws if the owner goes to work, says Emery W. Chapple, state commissioner of public safety.

Chapple said Alaska law requires a person who brings a vehicle into the state which is registered in another state, and who uses the vehicle for pleasure only is exempt from licensing and registration for 90 days after entry into the state.

This exemption does not apply if the person becomes gainfully employed in the state or takes action which indicates his intention to acquire residence in the state, he said.

Texas Horses Are Prohibited

The importation of horses from Texas into Alaska is currently prohibited according to a recent quarantine order, Dr. James Pazaruski, assistant state veterinarian, said this week.

There had been some local concern that Texas horses might spread a severe foreign disease, Venezuelan Equine encephalomyelitis, now in existence there. The disease also affects man.

Following the control of the disease in the areas it now affects, the order says, horses from these regions will still be allowed to enter on a permit

Social Security For The Young

Young people working during their summer vacations are doing more than earning money they see, a local Social Security representative has pointed out.

They are also building valuable work credit toward Social Security protection for themselves and their future families, he said.

Anyone earning \$50 or more during the summer three-month quarter period have earned a quarter's coverage, he explained.

A father or mother, 28 years or younger, protects the family with survivor benefits after only one and one half years of work credit. A young worker, disabled between 24 and 31, needs work credit for half the time between 21 and the time he had to stop working.

If disability starts before age 24, only 3 quarter years credit are needed in the three years preceding disability.

In many cases, it was emphasized, credit based on vacation jobs later provided just enough coverage to bring a young family needed income upon the severe disability or death of a parent.

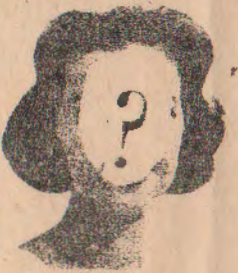

I have never seen a letter on this subject in your column, and I wonder perhaps if you avoid publishing them in your nice little family newspaper. We do need help, however and we have the greatest respect for your god judgement. Perhaps if word is delicately as I can it will not offend any of your readers.

Back in the town we came from our young daughter became very seriously involved with this boy, and there were the usual consequences.

The boys parents were very unsympathetic, and even expressed doubt that their son was guilty.

My husband and I decided the best thing to do was move to another part of the country and stand by our daughter ourselves. The child we are raising as our own, and no one here is any the wiser.

Now we are hearing from the boy's parents and they have suddenly become very interested in their "grandchild". During the past year their son (an only child) was killed in

Vietnam. It has become very important to them that the baby (also a boy) bear their last name.

We don't know what to do. We don't want them messing up the lives of our daughter, the baby or us after their original feelings. But on the other hand we want to do what's right. Do we owe these people anything?

Torn apart

Dear Torn apart,
Morally you owe them nothing. They don't deserve any consideration after the way they reacted originally.

However, I strongly urge you to see an attorney if you have not already done so. I don't see how these people can possibly have any legal claim on the child, however, that is something only a lawyer can tell you.

LOCAL TELEPHONES DUE FOR DISTANCE DIALING

If tentative scheduling materializes, several exchanges in the Matanuska Telephone Association will be able to directly dial numbers across the country in December. The direct dialing announcement came at the MTA regular board meeting last Wednesday.

Also discussed at the meeting was the annual membership meeting next Friday, engaging an insurance consultant and the manager's report.

Bids from ITT (International Telephone and Telegraph) were read as the lowest in supplying the local exchanges with automatic number identification equipment for the direct distance dialing system. The equipment is to cost \$43,722, and installation is to cost \$55,004.

Installation of the equipment for the Palmer, Wasilla, Big Lake, Chugiak and Eagle River exchanges should be completed in 120 to 150 days. Max Clements, MTA manager, said. When completed, the equipment will be cut into the RCA system now going in in the Anchorage area.

The board engaged P. G. Hupperten and Associates in insurance consultants, to review the association's insurance coverage.

The manager's report mentioned the problems involved in receiving equipment due to the West Coast longshoremen strike. One shipment needed for the Wasilla office was tied up in Seattle, but Clements said he had assurances that other equipment was being rerouted.

Plans for the annual membership meeting were discussed. An RCA representative is to be the guest speaker at the meeting, which will follow an MTA hosted dinner at the Palmer Elks hall. The meeting will start at 8 p.m.

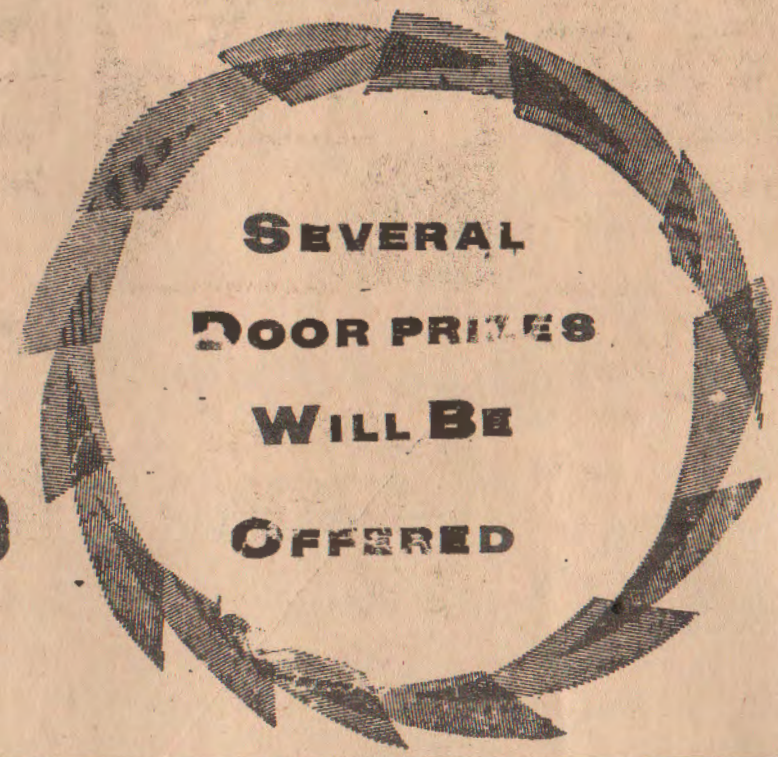

Hunters Will Register For Antlerless Moose

Early-season antlerless moose permits will be allocated by hunter registration this year, rather than by public drawing as in the past, the Department of Fish and Game announced this week.

The season will be closed by field announcement if the desired number of moose are taken earlier. Early-season permit holders will not be eligible to register for the next antlerless hunt tentatively scheduled for November.

Permits for such hunts will be issued beginning Aug. 2, Sterling Eide, acting regional supervisor for the Game Division in Anchorage, said.

Hunters may register for the special hunts at most Fish and Game offices during normal office hours beginning Aug. 2. Eide cautioned that hunters wishing to register for the antlerless season must have their hunting license and harvest ticket in possession before registering for the hunt.

Successful hunters will be required to bring out the skinned, forward portion of the lower jaw to be used in age composition studies. Special maps will be issued to permit holders, and hunters will be required to have their permits in possession while hunting. Should the hunter take a bull moose during the first season, his antlerless permit automatically becomes invalid.

Game management units holding antlerless hunts will be 13B and 13C near Glennallen, 14A and 14B in the Anchorage area, unit 7, and subunits 15A, 15B and 15C on the Kenai Peninsula.

Eide said that parts of these game management units would be closed to the taking of antlerless moose. Closed portions include the floor of the Matanuska Valley, a portion of 13B along the Richardson highway and much of the roadside areas in 15C.

Maps detailing these closures will be provided with the permits. The closures will force hunters into highland and off road areas; therefore, they anticipate a difficult hunt in these units.

The registration hunts, Eide said, will provide the Fish and
