RURAL VOTERS DUMP CHARTER AGAIN

FLEA MARKET NEXT WEEK

OLD CHUGIAK: The upcoming Flea Market, to be sponsored by the Birchwood Loopers Homemakers Club will have many attractions, ranging from rummage and white elephant sales to baked goods.

Highlight of the event will be a one man art show, featuring the works of local artist Merice Richner.

The Flea Market will be held on September 10th, 11th and 12 at the Carnival Hall at Mile 21 on the Old Glenn Highway.

Friday, the 10th will be set up day, with most of the booths open and offering their merchandise for sale.

A spokesman for the Loopers stated that many individuals and organizations have rented booth space, and this promises to be the biggest and best Flea Market to date.

BIDS FOR GLENN HIGHWAY PROJECT TO BE OPENED

ANCHORAGE: Bids for the construction of the section of Glenn Highway from Boniface Road to Gate 1 Fort Richardson were opened at 2pm on August 26th, according to Deputy Commissioner of Highways Charles S. Matlock.

This project includes grading, drainage and hot bituminous paving of 3.5 miles of roadway including a composite steel and concrete bridge 90 feet long with clear road width of 40 feet, illumination and traffic signals.

Two bids were received with M-B Contracting of Anchorage being the apparent low bidder.

Yesterday's election read like a re-run of last year, when the first version of the Charter squeaked by in the City only to be dumped overwhelmingly in the rural precincts.

With all the rural precincts with the exception of Girdwood reporting by press time, the total rural vote was 10,721. With 3,844 voting "Yes" and 6,877, voting "No".

This compares with the vote of last year when 9,548 voters outside the city turned down the Charter 6,145 No to 3,403 Yes.

Voters within the City of Anchorage voted 3,129 in favor of the Charter as opposed to 2,896 who voted "No". This total of 6,025 voters compares with last year when 3,138 in the City voted Yes while the No vote was 2,622 for a total of 5,760 votes cast.

BRIDGE REPAIR NEARLY DONE

PETERS CREEK: The repairs to the flood damaged bridge across lower Peters Creek are almost completed.

The bridge, which was almost washed completely away during the heavy rains last month, was found to still be structurally sound, and has been repositioned on new pilings. The bridge has been raised approximately four feet higher above the water that it was originally to prevent future high water from repeating last month's disaster.

All that is left to be done is the completion of the approaches, and residents of Lower Peters Creek should be able to drive across the bridge by the end of this week.

The bridge across Little Peters Creek, also washed away by the flood is next scheduled to be replaced.

FEED STORE TO OPEN IN EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: A new feed and animal supply store will be opening soon in the Eagle River area.

Eagle River Feed and Seed will be owned and operated by Steve Jenschke, who also owns O'Malley Supply on the Seward Highway. The store is to be located at Mile 14 1/2 on the Old Glenn Highway in the former Miss Alaskan building.

Eagle River Feed and Seed will offer a complete line of animal feeds for both household pets as well as livestock along with a selection of medicines for livestock, feeding equipment and tack.

With the local area's fast growing horse population in mind, they will also be able to fill orders for hay, with free delivery anywhere in the Greater Chugiak Area.

DALE FRENCH, OF PETERS CREEK CASTS HIS BALLOT IN TUESDAY'S CHARTER ELECTION.

PAUL HAIR AND COMPANION FOUND DEAD

ANCHORAGE: Alaska State Troopers have identified the bodies of eleven year old Paul Hair of Birchwood, and his adult companion Lorraine Zimmerman of Anchorage as the two which were found at Jackass Creek near Mile 110 on the Glenn Highway.

Zimmerman and the boy had been the subjects of a massive search since their disappearance on August 14th. The pair had left on what was to have been a two day trip up the Glenn Highway with scheduled stops at Gunsight Mountain and Eureka Lodges. When they failed to arrive at either destination, the search was begun.

The body of the boy was discovered at 9:00am on Sunday by a group of men who were in the process of clearing an abandoned roadway which led to a mining claim. The body was found on the road. They notified the State Troopers, who searched the area and discovered the body of the man in the creek approximately 100 yards from where the boy was found.

Autopsy reports indicated that both were the victims of drowning.

Although Jackass Creek is normally a narrow, and shallow creek, located at the bottom of a deep gorge, there were indications of recent high water.

State Troopers stated that there was evidence of a number of bruises on both of the bodies.

No sign has been found of the vehicle in which the pair were riding. Although the State Troopers indicated there was a possibility that high water could have carried away all wreckage, they had not yet called off their search for the car, which is described as a tan Toyota four wheel-drive vehicle with a white top, Alaska license number 87180.

They have not yet found an explanation for the report that a man answering to the description of Zimmerman, who was driving a car of the same make and model and was accompanied by a boy resembling the Hair child were seen

at Beaver Creek and elsewhere in the vicinity of the Alaska Canadian border. This latter report had caused the Troopers to issue a warrant for Zimmerman for child stealing.

HEART ATTACK VICTIM TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

BIRCHWOOD: An Eagle River woman was rushed to Providence Hospital last Friday, the victim of a possible heart attack.

Beverly Stevens was at the Wilson residence on Birchwood Road when she was taken ill.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance responded to the call.

the City voted Yes while the No vote was 2,622 for a total of 5,760 votes cast.

On the local scene, it was a landslide against the Charter.

In Precinct 147, (Eagle River Valley) a total of 388 votes were cast; 355 "No", 24 "Yes". Last year this precinct tallied 290 votes.

In Precinct 148, (Eagle River) the "No" vote was 402 and the "Yes" vote was 25, for a total of 440. Last year the total vote for Eagle River was 370.

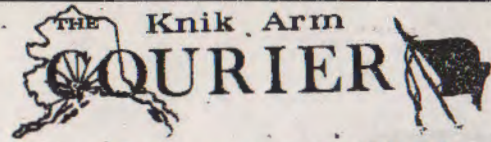
In precinct 149, (Chugiak) the vote this year was 281 "No", and 21 "Yes" for a total of 306 cast. Last year...269.

Precinct 150 (Birchwood) the total vote this time was 333, with 312 voting "No" and 7 "Yes". Last year...282.

In precinct No. 151, (Peters Creek) the total vote was 177, 162 "No" and only 4 "Yes". Last year....153 votes were cast in this precinct.

With this second defeat of the Charter, Unification at this time becomes a dead issue.

The current Charter Commission will not get a chance to re-write the document. Under State law, they will be dismissed, and before unification can be attempted again a vote must be put to the residents of the borough as to whether they wish to unify or not. This must also pass inside the City as well as in the areas outside. Another Charter Commission would have to be elected if Unification did get a green light by the voters, a prospect unlikely at this time.

FISH AND GAME BOARD SOLICITS PROPOSALS

JUNEAU: Proposed changes in the sport and commercial fishing regulations are now being accepted by the Alaska Board of Fish and Game.

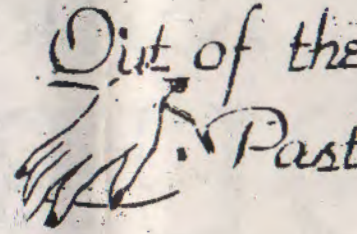
Regulatory changes for the 1972 season will be considered by the board at its meeting scheduled to start on November 29th.

Oscar Dyson, chairman of the board, said that public proposals for regulation changes must be received by September 30, and may be submitted to any board member or to any office of the Department of Fish and Game.

Dyson noted that the board will meet only once to consider proposed changes and that final action on the proposals will be taken at the November meeting. The commercial fishing section will include consideration of king crab proposals.

Each proposal must be precisely stated and must contain a justification for the regulation change. The proposal also must refer to the specific regulation by number.

All interested persons and organizations are urged to submit their proposed changes as early as possible in order to meet the September 30 deadline.

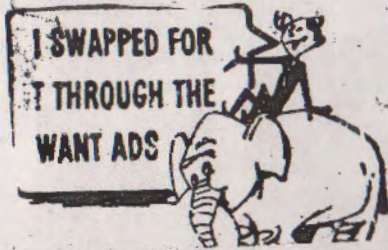
FT, RICH: Both local girls softball teams lost to teams from Fort Richardson last week.

STUDENT LOANS ARE AVAILABLE

ANCHORAGE: Seven hundred and fifty applications for student loans have been received by the Student Scholarship Loan Committee, according to Mr. Walter R. Furnace, Chairman. These applications represent

applications. In some cases married students are filing for the same expenses while in other cases applicants are not totaling the columns on the application and requesting a total expense allowance.

The law provides monies loaned by the State to be used only for tuition required fees, books and board and room. Students in an undergraduate program are eligible for up to \$2,500, for any

the students' abilities from instructors, employers or others familiar with the applicants' abilities, and (4) on the student's record of achievement.

No interest will be charged the student while he is enrolled full-time and in good standing or while he is fulfilling required military service. Interest at the rate of 5% will begin following termination of the applicant's study, or military service and repayment will begin within one year after that time.

Loans are to be repaid fully within six years, except in cases of hardship where extension may be granted.

Under the law a portion of the loan may be forgiven, provided the students completes the course of study and guarantees to spend at least two years in the State of Alaska. Portions of grant extend from 10% for residency from two to three years and up to 40% for over five year residency.

Mr. Furnace stressed that applicants should carefully complete the application and submit it to the Department of Education, Scholarship Loan Program, Pouch F, Juneau, Alaska 99801.
