MOTHER OF MURDER SUSPECT AIDS IN CAPTURE

PUBLIC MEETING TO AIR ROAD SERVICE

EAGLE RIVER: Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis announced a public hearing at which all questions concerning the proposed Road Service District in Eagle River will be answered.

The meeting will take place on Thursday, September 23rd at 8pm at the Eagle River Elementary School.

Willis said the area which is to be included for Road service on the October 5th ballot encompasses the entire Eagle River Fire Service District.

Willis said that petitions had been submitted to the Borough asking for this road service. He said that most of the signatures appeared to be from two areas; that close to the Eagle River Shopping Center and that in the vicinity of Man O' War Road.

BORO SILENT ON CITY SECESSION

ANCHORAGE: Borough officials are silent on the prospect of the secession of the City of Anchorage from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

Assemblyman Ed Willis declined to comment on what impact such an act might have on the Borough Government.

"It's just talk so far on the part of a few" he stated. "Let's wait and see what the City Council decides before we go into it."

BELLINGHAM Wash: Alaska State Troopers today announced the arrest in Bellingham Washington, of Willis B. Mayo Jr. escaped prisoner, wanted in connection with the deaths last month of Lorance Zimmerman of Anchorage and Paul Hair, age 11, of Birchwood.

Mayo was picked up by the Bellingham police at 4:45 AM Tuesday (Anchorage Time).

At the time of his arrest he was riding in a vehicle with six companions (4 male and 2 female).

State Troopers stated that the clue which led to the arrest was supplied by Mayo's mother who lives in Portland Oregon.

She had been interviewed by local police and had given them a description of the car which Mayo might have been driving.

The description of the car and of Mayo had been transmitted to police in Oregon, Washington and California, and the car was located in Bellingham. It was believed

two areas; that close to the Eagle River Shopping Center and that in the vicinity of Man O' War Road.

As proposed, the Road Service if it is passed would be implemented immediately, with a special assessment of 2.5 mills to cover costs for the remainder of the fiscal year.

Roads in the service area would be upgraded for winter and maintained through the winter months and also upgraded during spring break-up.

State maintained roads within the service area would be maintained by borough equipment, with the State contracting the maintenance work to the borough. This added income to the service area, Willis explained, would enable the borough to station a road grader at all times in the area.

Willis said that he has invited Mr. Robert Bell, maintenance supervisor for roads from the borough to attend the meeting to explain the program and to answer questions.

PALMER MAN IS STRICKEN HERE

OLD CHUGIAK: Frank Clark of Palmer was taken ill last Saturday while visiting with friends, Mr. and Mrs. F.S. Lee of Old Chuglak.

The Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance was summoned and he was transported to the Valley Presbyterian Hospital in Palmer.

Most local residents seem to feel it would be "good riddance" if Anchorage should form their own first class borough and forever remove the threat of unification and annexation from rural areas. Others fear it is only a ploy to force the Boundary Commission to take some action, since that group has indicated that they would prefer to let all matters of annexation rest following the shattering defeat of the Charter last month.

Forced action of the Boundary Commission might bring them to act upon the petition to annex the Spenard and other areas which was submitted by Anchorage last year, and which was deferred until the outcome of the Charter Election was learned.

ILLEGAL ALIEN ARRESTED

BIRCHWOOD: A report of a suspicious looking man who was seen snooping around the planes at Birchwood Airstrip led to the arrest of a Canadian citizen who had entered the state illegally.

Alaska State Troopers arrested Bryce Charles Hurst, and turned him over to the Immigration authorities.

Hurst had apparently crossed the border illegally after having been refused admittance.

AMBULANCE CHARGE VOTED DOWN

ANCHORAGE: A move to charge a fee of \$35 for every ambulance call in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough was defeated last Monday by a vote of 9 to 1.

Many appeared at the Assembly meeting to speak against the proposed charge, including seven members of the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Co. Reasons for asking that the fee should not be charged ranged from sentimental to practical. The original ambulance had been donated by the Anchorage Lions Clubs for the use of the Community, and it was felt that it was never intended that this service be charged.

Also it was felt that persons in need of transportation to a hospital might hesitate because they were financially unable to pay the fee.

It was also pointed out that a accident victim who was unconscious and was transport-

ed by an ambulance called by another person might not be held responsible for the charge.

It was also pointed out that approximately 50% of fees collected for ambulance calls could be spend trying to collect delinquent bills.

Assemblyman Lang was the only one who voted in favor of the charge.

He is vice president of the local Chamber of Commerce.

He is replacing Lee Jordan, of Birchwood who recently resigned from the Board.

and of Mayo had been transmitted to police in Oregon, Washington and California, and the car was located in Bellingham. It was believed that at the time of his arrest Mayo was enroute back to Alaska.

Bellingham police determined that Mayo's companions had no connection with the crime in Alaska and they were not detained.

Zimmerman and Hair were discovered dead apparently drowned at Mile 101 on the Glenn Highway, after they had been reported missing on a routine trip to Gunsight and Eureka Lodges.

The four wheel drive vehicle in which they had been riding was nowhere near the place where the bodies were discovered, but was found later near Fairview Manor in Fairbanks. The description of the man who was seen abandoning the car, fitted that of Mayo, an escapee from the adult prison camp near Palmer.

Mayo had escaped from the camp on August 14th, the day on which Hair and Zimmerman had disappeared.

An investigator from the Alaska State Troopers was dispatched to Bellingham to arrange to return Mayo to Alaska.

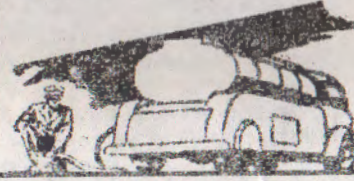

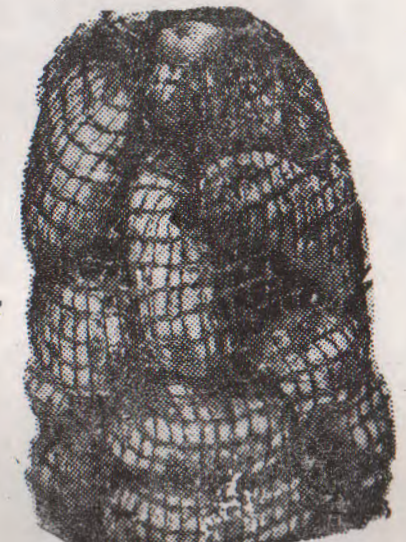

CHILD-CARE CENTER NOW OPEN

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Parent-Child Center opened at 7:00am on Tuesday, September 7th.

For the first time, three year olds as well as four year olds were attending the program, and children were staying for an afternoon program as well as a morning one at the Chugiak United Methodist Church.

On the previous Thursday evening, September 2nd, a delicious stew dinner was served to children and parents interested in the Chugiak Children's Services: Head Start, Day Care and Morning Enrichment programs. Dinner was followed by an introduction to the staff and two films on early childhood education were viewed.

Orientation for parents was conducted on Tuesday and Wednesday, September 7th and 8th while the children in the room next door experienced their first day at school.

According to Janet Lindeman of Chugiak Children's Services, there are just a few more openings in the Morning Enrichment program, a pre-school program for children whose parents do not qualify for Head Start. The successful reception of the Day Care Program has also enabled the non-profit corporation to reduce rates for additional children from one family, so that families with more than one child requiring quality day care and pre-school enrichment services can more easily afford to enroll more than one child in the program. Arrangements are also being worked out to try to offer transportation to the Center from local elementary schools for children who need care up until 6pm when their

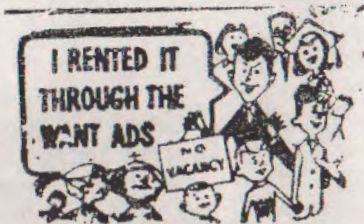


DING-A-LINGS WIN LAST GAME

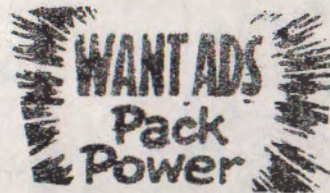

This Sunday the Wickersham will leave Juneau for a one-day trip to Tracy Arm, returning about 6 p.m. On Tuesday the ferry sails from Juneau for a 12-hour round trip to Glacier Bay.

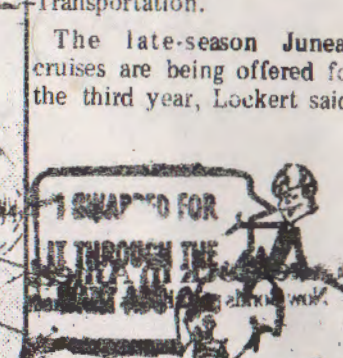
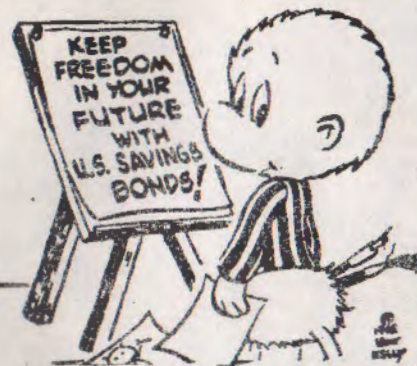
