LACK OF POLICE PROTECTION HERE IS TOLD

GULLARD GETS TEN YEARS

ANCHORAGE: A ten year sentence for one count of involuntary manslaughter was handed down to James Lee Gullard of Eagle River by Superior Court Judge C.J. Occhipinti.

The sentencing came one and a half years after the accident on March 6, 1970 in a car that Gullard was driving collided with a second vehicle resulting in the death of three East High School Cheerleaders and Michael Cremin, a Chugiak High Student.

The accident took place following a wrestling meet at Chugiak. The two vehicles collided at approximately Mile 15, on the New Glenn Highway.

Gullard reportedly has had several charges pending against him since the above mentioned accident.

These, according to Judge Occhipinti are two charges of driving while under the influ-

EAGLE RIVER: Police protection, or more accurately, the lack of it in the Greater Chugiak Area, was the prime subject of discussion at the Monday meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce.

Guest speaker was Richard Smerden, of the Chugiak Security Patrol, who described the numerous violations which continuously take place within the community, and the lack of State Trooper personnel to handle them.

Smerden pointed out that the gamut of local crimes range from petty theft of candy from local supermarkets to sale of narcotics and dangerous drugs.

During the night hours, when most crime takes place, there is usually only one trooper available, and he is principally located in the Muldoon area.

It often takes several hours for a call for a State Trooper in this area to be answered.

Smerden also stated that he has been informed that there is little likelihood that additional troopers would be

ROAD SERVICE ONLY HOT ITEM ON BALLOT

EAGLE RIVER: The proposed Road Service for the Eagle River Fire Service District appears to be the only controversial item to appear on the ballot next Tuesday.

A public meeting held at the Eagle River School last Thursday, was continued last night (Tuesday) when some of those attending the meeting asked to be shown copies of the petitions which supposedly bore signatures of residents from all sections of the area to be included in the service area.

Present at the Thursday meeting were Sid Clark, Public Works Director for the Borough; Bob Bell, Superintendent of Maintenance, Lamar Penrod, Assistant Superintendent of Maintenance, and Dave McClellan, General Road Foreman.

It was explained at the meeting that summer road maintenance would include graveling and grading, dust control, oiling, installing of culverts, pavement and curb repair, in stallation of signs and lighting.

In the winter it would cover snow removal, sanding and salting and drainage during the spring runoff.

It was pointed out that at the

PAUL SWANSON TO BE "WRITE-IN" CANDIDATE

CHUGIAK: Paul Swanson, incumbent on the Board of Supervisors of the Chugiak Fire Service District has indicated that he will run as a "Write-In" candidate to the Board.

Swanson, whose term expires, stated that he would accept a write-in nomination when he learned that through a misunderstanding no one had turned in a petition for that office.

Because no petition was filed, voter in the Chugiak Fire District will be handed a blank ballot. They may write in the name of any person they wish to elect to that office. However they should bear in mind that Swanson is the only one who has indicated that he will accept the office if elected.

LOCAL ELECTION INFORMATION

CHUGIAK: Tuesday, October 5th is election day for the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, and voters in the Greater Chugiak Area will be asked to vote on five areawide propositions, for two school board members, and on road service for the Eagle River Fire District (Service Area 9) and for a member to the Board of Supervisors for the Chugiak Fire District (Service Area 8).

The polls will open at 8am and close at 8pm. The polling places will be; for the Eagle River and Eagle River Valley Precincts, the Eagle River Elementary School, the Chugiak Precinct, the Chugiak Elementary School, the Birchwood precinct, the Birchwood Elementary School, and the Peters Creek Precinct, the Peters Creek Service Station.

This election the voters will be using the punch card ballots, such as those used last year. These are tallied by computer, which speeds up the tally process considerably.

Candidates for the School Board include only one local resident, Kenneth Bell, of Eagle River. Other candi-

ates are Larry Carmichael, Richard Gay (incumbent) Lex Johnson, Ronald Latimore, Tay Thomas (Incumbent) and Dr. Aron Wolf.

The five bonding propositions are "A", 4 million for sewer bonds, "B" 2 1/2 million for roads and drainage; "C", \$500,000 for parks and recreation, "D" 2 million for 'Open Space' Bonds, (this is to enable the borough to purchase land which it is deemed best to be kept undeveloped for the public interest). "E" \$42,400,000 for school bonds (this is to cover a 3 year capital improvement program.

The local residents do not vote this year for Borough Assemblyman.

The vacancy for a member to the Board of Supervisors to the Chugiak Fire District is to be a write in, as no candidate filed a petition for this post. However, Paul Swanson, whose term is expiring has indicated that he will run as a write-in candidate.

SHARON GIDCUMB IS QUEEN

CHUGIAK: Sharon Gidcumb is the 1971 Homecoming Queen for Chugiak High.

Sharon was selected from six "Princesses" and was crowned in a colorful ceremony during the halftime of the game with Kenai last Saturday.

The Chugiak High Band paraded onto the football field, and formed the letter "C", while the Princesses rode around the field seated on the hoods of autos.

Then each princess was escorted onto the field by members of the Cross Country and Football teams.

It was then announced that Sharon had been elected queen and was presented with her crown.

Princesses were Connie Bough, escorted by Richard Weger; Cross Country team, Vickie Sanders, escorted by Dirk Mills, Football team; Roxy Knecht, escorted by Rod Willis, Football team; Patti Johnson, escorted by Phillip Best, Cross Country team; Babbette Jones, escorted by Terry Hite, Football team.

Sharon, a senior, was escorted by Dave Day, of the Mustang Varsity Football team.

Additional troopers would be available in the foreseeable future. He stated that if more State Troopers were recruited, they would be stationed in remote villages rather than in this area.

He felt that the only sure way the community could hope to get additional police protection was to work toward getting a constable's office established in the area, or to think along the lines of an Auxiliary to the Alaska State Troopers.

He said that he had discussed both these possibilities with Col. Dankworth of the Alaska State Troopers, and that the Colonel was checking with Juneau to learn if either was possible.

The Chamber had written to Governor Egan asking for additional State Troopers for this area, but to date had received no reply.

BIDS OPEN FOR KNIK ROAD PROJECT

ANCHORAGE: Deputy Commissioner of Highways Charles S. Matlock opened bids for Project X-12740, Knik River Road in the Central Highway District on September 21.

This project includes grading and drainage of 9.66 miles of roadway extending east from its junction with the Old Glenn Highway following along the south bank of Knik River. The project also involves the construction of a timber bridge.

Five bids were received with Pacific Wagley of Fairbanks being the apparent low bidder at the time of the opening. The contract calls for a completion date of 190 calendar days.

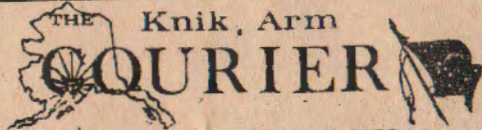
JUNIOR TROOP ? - This will be Peters Creek's own troop but has not been assigned number yet.

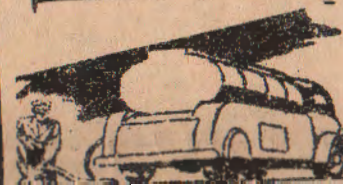

forced to sell their property. Examination of the petitions at the follow-up meeting last Tuesday brought out that it appeared that most of the signers lived either in the area immediately behind the Eagle River Shopping Center or in the Dan Bell Subdivision.

It was pointed out, however that there is no minimum of signatures either percentage wise or by number which are required on a petition to bring a service to a vote.

Assemblyman Ed Willis expressed his regret that he had placed the matter on the ballot without public hearings, and said that had he to do it over again he would have called these hearings. He pledged to introduce ordinances to the Assembly which (if the Road Service Proposition passes) would delete certain areas from the Service District. He said that he has already established the legality of this step. He said this has been done elsewhere in the borough in reverse, where some areas have ased to be included in already established service areas.

He said that each case would be heard and judged on it's own merits.

MEA LOAN APPROVED

PALMER: On August 13th, the Matanuska Electric Association was advised by the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Cooperation (CFC) that it had approved MEA's application for a short term loan in the amount of \$250,000.

These funds are to be made available on a six months revolving loan basis and will be used for consumer construction.

This is a high interest rate loan secured to allow MEA to continue its heavy consumer extension program until REA loan funds become available near the end of this year.

In addition to MEA's regular forces, there are two Rogers Electric crews, one working in the Matanuska-Susitna Valleys area and the other working in the Greater Chugliak Area.

MEA's crews assisted by the two contract crews are pushing hard to complete all of the backlog of consumer extensions before the end of the construction season.

ON OCTOBER 3, GENERAL OBERATION BOND ISSUES TO TALLING \$9 MILLION WILL GO TO THE GREATER ANCHORAGE AREA VOTERS.

Q. WHAT ARE THESE BOND ISSUES?

A. There are four:

1. Roads and Drainage-\$2.5 million
2. Parks and Recreation-\$500,000
3. Open Space Land Aquisition-\$2 million
4. Sewers-\$4 million

Q. WHO WILL VOTE ON THESE BOND ISSUES?

A. The full faith and credit of the borough will back these four bond issues. Thus all qualified voters in the borough will vote on them, HOWEVER, only those persons who benefit will repay the bonds.

Q. HOW WILL THE EAGLE RIVER AND CHUGIAK AREAS BENEFIT FROM THESE BOND ISSUES?

A. If Eagle River voters approve the road power for the Eagle River Service Area, the Roads and Drainage bond moneys could be spent, in part, in Eagle River.

The Sewer bond issue provides for extension of sewer trunks and laterals. Open Space Land Acquisition bond funds, which will provide for borough participation in federal matching program that could see the borough obtain three federal dollars for each borough dollar, may be used anywhere in the borough.

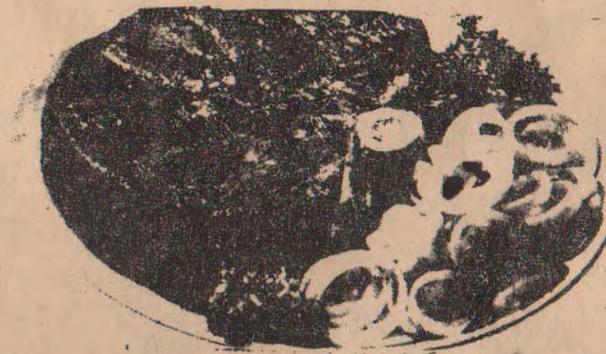
