THE BUTTE: The public hearing to discuss a replace ment for the old Knik River bridge will be held tomorrow, Thursday, October 5th, at the Butte Fire hall at the Butte.

Residents of the Butte area had asked for the hearing to detemine if something could be done with regard to the posting of signs which indicated that the bridge was unsafe for heavy loads.

The Highway Department has requested emergency replacement funds from the Federal Government, and is asking for supportive facts on the importance of that portion of the Old Glenn Highway. Bob Kallenberg, of Chugiak, a candidate for the State House of Representatives from Distrist 6, stated that the present bridge, which was constructed in 1936 under the jurisdiction of the old Alaska Road Commission is deteriorating to the point where repairs are too costly.

The public hearing will take place at 7:30pm at the Butte Fire Hall on Plumley Road, next to the Barnhardt mill.


FAULTY HEATER IS CAUSE OF CABIN FIRE

EAGLE RIVER: Clunie Lake located on the extreme east ern boundary of Ft. Richardson in the Eagle River area is being considered as a possible seaplane base to suppliment the overcrowed Lake Hood floatplane facility.

The duties of the committee will include reviewing the PROTECTED SWANS MAY BE CONFUSED WITH SNOW GEESE

ANCHORAGE: Thousands of whistling and trumpeter swans are now concentrated on the Susitna Flats across Cook Inlet, and a Department of Fish and Game waterfowl biologist has cautioned hunters to avoid confusing the swans with snow geese, a much smaller bird.

Swans are protected by Fed eral and State laws.

Eagle River Post of Cook Inlet marshes, except in the spring.

A recent aerial waterfowl census of the area turned up approximately 1700 swans, but only two snow geese.

Havens said the two species are easily distinguishable and that the snow goose is a much smaller bird that the swan and had black wing tips. Havens said the aerial census also turned up more than 9,000 Canada geese, and that shooting for both ducks and geese is expected to be good this coming weekend. However, many of the small
