KNIK BRIDGE HEARING TOMORROW

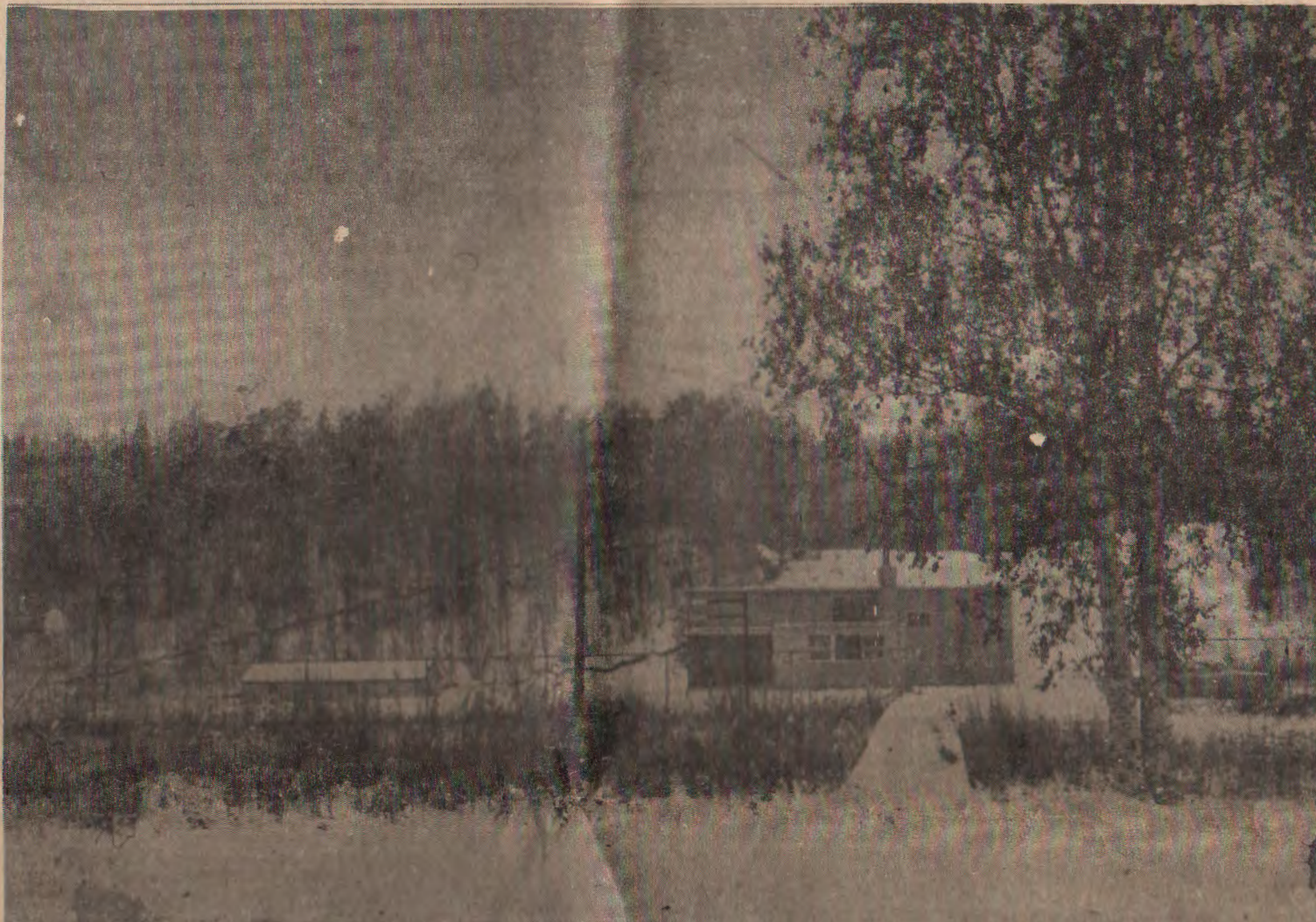
THE BUTTE: The public hearing to discuss a replacement for the old Knik River bridge will be held tomorrow, Thursday, October 5th, at the Butte Fire hall at the Butte.

Residents of the Butte area had asked for the hearing to determine if something could be done with regard to the posting of signs which indicated that the bridge was unsafe for heavy loads.

The Highway Department has requested emergency replacement funds from the Federal Government, and is asking for supportive facts on the importance of that portion of the Old Glenn Highway.

Bob Kallenberg, of Chugiak, a candidate for the State House of Representatives from District 6, stated that the present bridge, which was constructed in 1936 under the jurisdiction of the old Alaska Road Commission is deteriorating to the point where repairs are too costly.

CHUGIAK: Local voters yesterday turned down a proposition to construct a building to house local branches of the Borough offices by a vote of 536 No to 400 Yes.

This was the only local item of any controversy on the ballot with Assemblyman Ed Willis, and Supervisory Board member William Ramsey elected on unopposed tickets.

The present load limits prohibit fire trucks from the Butte Fire Company to use the structure. The Butte Fire Company is responsible with serving the Goat Creek area. Also school buses can not use the bridge. Kallenberg also pointed out that the bridge is the only way that residents can leave the area in time of flooding.

Cost of building a replacement for the bridge has been estimated at 4 50 5 million dollars.

The public hearing will take place at 7:30pm at the Butte Fire Hall on Plumley Road, next to the Barnhardt mill.

PROTECTED SWANS MAY BE CONFUSED WITH SNOW GEESE

ANCHORAGE: Thousands of whistling and trumpeter swans are now concentrated on the Susitna Flats across Cook Inlet, and a Department of Fish and Game waterfowl biologist has cautioned hunters to avoid confusing the swans with snow geese, a much smaller bird.

Swans are protected by Federal and State laws.

Phil Havens, an Anchorage waterfowl biologist said snow geese are rarely encountered around Upper Cook Inlet marshes, except in the spring.

A recent aerial waterfowl census of the area turned up approximately 1700 swans, but only two snow geese.

Havens said the two species are easily distinguishable and that the snow goose is a much smaller bird than the swan and had black wing tips.

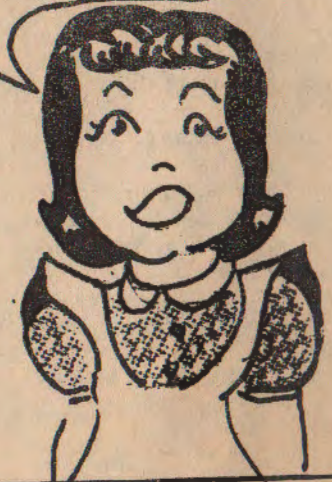

CAMPER FIRE REPORTED AT EKLUTNA

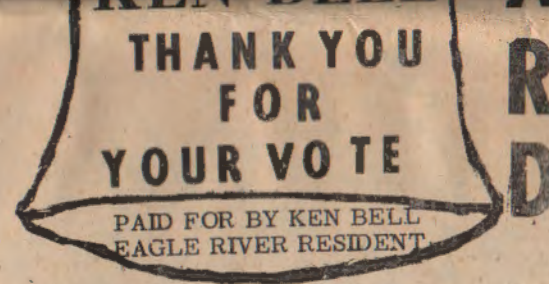
EKLUTNA: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company responded to a call on Sunday, October 1st from the Eklutna FAA Station.

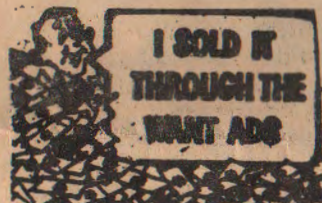
