WOMEN'S EAGLE RIVER 50 MILE RACE THIS SUNDAY

DECISION PENDING ON ROSEBUD LICENSE

ANCHORAGE: A decision is pending following the public hearing concerning the license for Rosebud Refuse Company of Eagle River.

According to Phil Rensvold, hearing officer for the Transportation Commission, the protestant, Anchorage Refuse had asked for additional time to file a brief. They were given until next Monday, December 18th to do this.

The defendant, Rosbud Refuse, may also present additional testimony by next Monday if they desire to.

Rensvold stated that he expects the matter to be concluded not long after the filing of the brief. This should be early in January, if not sooner.

Rosebud will continue to operate with a temporary license until such time as the decision is handed down, Rensvold concluded.

MUSTANGS TASTE VICTORY AND DEFEAT

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak Mustangs tasted both defeat and victory on the basketball court in last weekends games with Service and Dimond.

In the game last Friday with the Cougars, it looked good for Chugiak all through the first quarter.

The Mustangs scored the first basket within 5 seconds and dominated the court all through the quarter ending the period ahead of Service 16 to 6.

The second quarter belonged to Service, with the Cougars racking up 6 points in the first 45 seconds, and going on to pull ahead of Chugiak 29 to 23 at halftime.

During the third quarter both teams traded baskets, with Service pulling ahead to end that period 45 to 39.

They hung on to their lead and defeated the Mustangs by 65 to 58.

On Saturday, against the Dimond Lynx, it looked like the Friday game in reverse, with Dimond getting the tipoff and running back to score in the first 10 seconds. After that both teams traded baskets, ending the first quarter Dimond 21, Chugiak 20.

The VW. Van which Mrs. Hill was driving was struck by a pick-up truck driven by Charles Lanz of Anchorage.

Mrs. Hill was dead on arrival at Providence Hospital.

A passenger in her car Robert CuPont, of Chugiak was taken to 5040 Air Force Hospital by the Eagle River Ambulance. He was listed in critical condition.

Lanz was taken to Anchorage Community Hospital where he

was treated for minor injuries and released.

Linda Jane Hill was born in Washington D.C. July 22nd, 1939. She has been an Alaskan resident since October of 1948. Her home was on Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood.

She is survived by 3 children, Peter, age 12, James 10, and Kenneth age 8, all of Birchwood, and by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wilson, of Anchorage.

She was a member of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and was President of the Frontier Riders Saddle Club.

Funeral services were held on Saturday, December 9th, at 2pm at Spenard Heights Mortuary. Officiating was

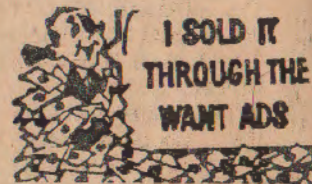

HOSPITALS COOPERATE IN PREGNANCY CARE STUDY

SEATTLE: Alaska's 28 hospitals, including all community, public and military hospitals, the Alaska State Department of Health, the Alaska Medical Association, the March of Dimes and the U.S. Public Health Service are cooperating in a unique effort to determine how prenatal care affects the outcome of pregnancy in the State of Alaska.

Also to be determined is the extent to which women utilize prenatal care and services and facilities available to them.

Beginning on January 1st through June 30th, in all hospitals throughout the State, women who have given birth will be asked to fill out a voluntary questionnaire about the prenatal care they have received during their pregnancy.

At the request of the Alaska State Department of Health and Social Services the survey questionnaire was approved by the Alaska Medical Association and the Alaska Hospital Association.

Where needed and requested by hospital administrators, the March of Dimes chapters in Alaska will help provide volunteers to assist with questionnaires.

Public Health Nurses in each community have also volunteered to help where needed to avoid placing an undue burden on busy hospital staffs. It is estimated that approximately 3,500 questionnaires will be completed during the survey.

The March of Dimes, through its medical department in New York will also provide technical assistance in evaluating the results of the questionnaire forms and make the information available to the participating
