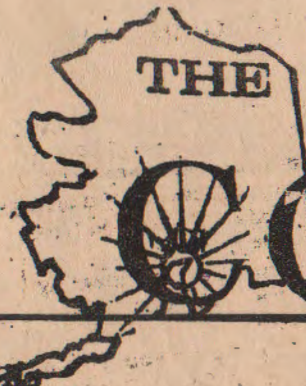

LARCENY ATTEMPT IN BIRCHWOOD

EAGLE RIVER: Four were injured and taken to Providence Hospital following a two car accident which took place last Saturday, December 23rd, at 12:05 a.m.

The collision took place at mile 1 on Homestead Road. According to the Alaska State Troopers, Steven Lane Rousculp, of Anchorage was westbound on the road when he met the second car, a 1972 Pinto, driven by Roy Franklin Deal of Chugiak, who was approaching in the opposite direction.

Deal said that he pulled to the right side to allow the other car room to pass, however, the 1968 Chevrolet Camero which Rousculp was driving skidded on the glare ice and collided with the Deal car.

Both cars sustained major damage, the Camero an estimated \$1,000, while the Pinto, at \$2,500 was considered totaled.

Injured was the driver of the Pinto, Deal who sustained facial lacerations; his wife Sandra suffered a possible neck injury while their children, Harry age 5 and Tabatha age 3, sustained facial lacerations.

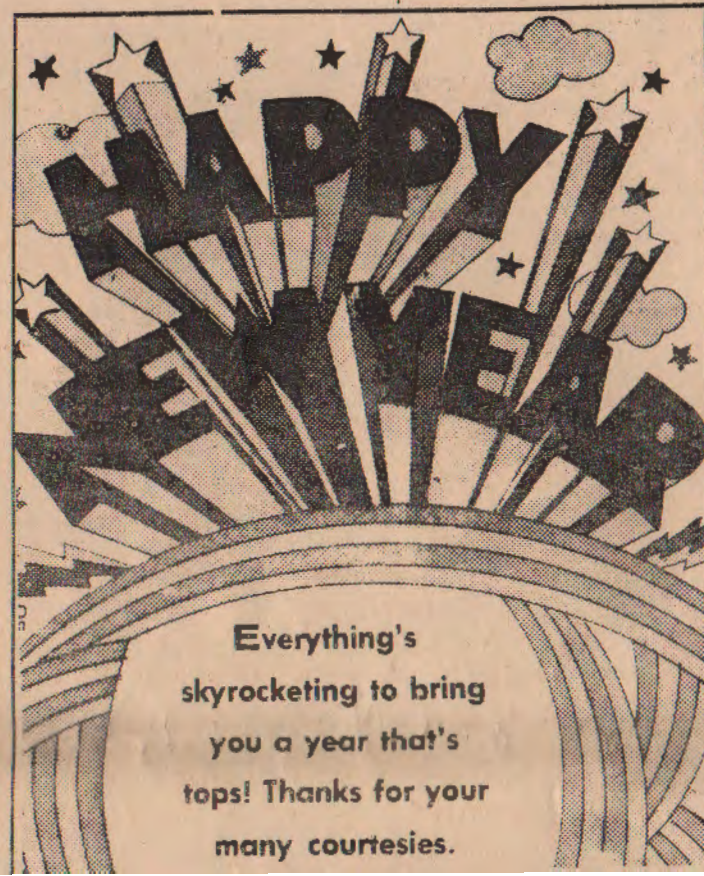

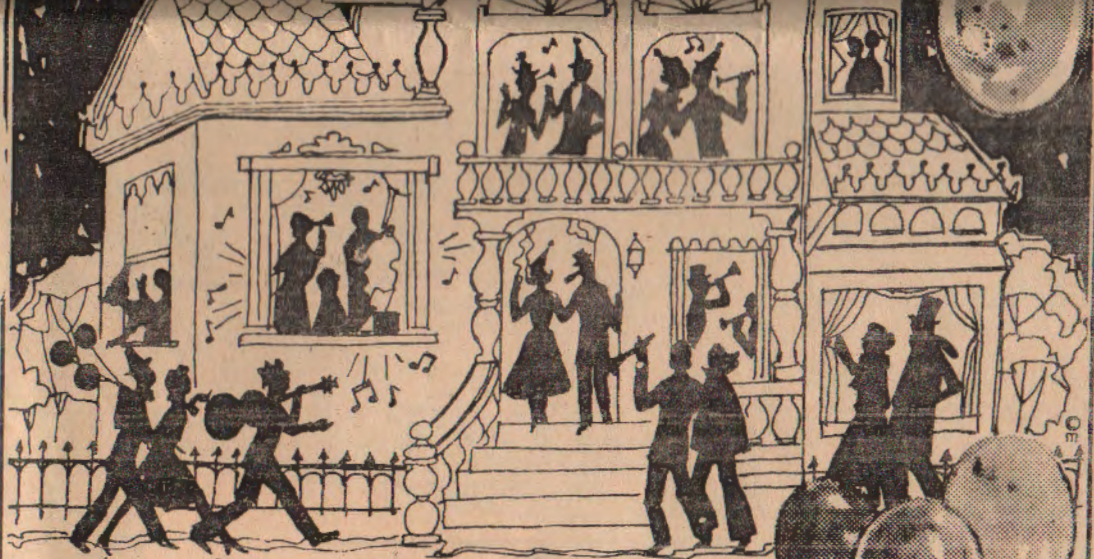
