

LETTER TO GOVERNOR PROTESTS ANNEXATION

CBA SEEKS SCHOOL FOR COMMUNITY CENTER

CHUGIAK: The disposal of the present Chugiak Elementary School buildings after the new replacement has been constructed, has been of particular interest to the Chugiak Benefit Association.

CBA is hoping to be able to acquire the concrete block school building to be used as a community center.

At a meeting with Bill Klingler, of the Borough School Administration and Dean Blount of the Planning Department, Dale Briggs, CBA President presented a proposal whereby CBS would exchange property at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds for the building, with the idea that the replacement school might be constructed at the Carnival Grounds site.

Klingler explained to the Knik Arm Courier that the location of the school is de-

present one. Long range plans call for a school in the Peters Creek area and one in the North Birchwood Loop.

SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE IS MEETING SUBJECT

ANCHORAGE: A Public Hearing, to discuss a Borough Subdivision Ordinance will take place tomorrow, Thursday, January 13th, 8:00am at the Borough Office.



ANCHORAGE: A strong letter of protest was sent today to Governor William Egan, by five members of the Borough Assembly, and Borough Chairman John Asplund, concerning this week's action by the Boundary Commission.

The action referred to was the approval of the annexation by the City of Anchorage of Elmendorf Air Force Base and Ft. Richardson.

The letter calls the action of the Boundary Commission ill advised and handled in an inappropriate manner.

The action of the Boundary Commission followed a meeting conducted last Friday, January 7th. According to the letter, the Boundary Commission had assured those present that this was an informal meeting, and that no official action would be taken as a result of this.

The approval of the annexation, based on this meeting was called a "breach of faith". The Governor was reminded that this was a commission appointed by him. It recommended that a complete study of all aspects of such an annexation be made before any action be taken.

Knk Arm Courier that the location of the school is decided by the borough, and not by the administration. He said that the administration has no preference as to where the school would be built.

Blount, however, turned thumbs down on the relocation of the school to the Carnival grounds. He said that the location (adjacent to the New Glenn Highway) is not considered suitable for a school.

Klingler did point out that as soon as the new school was constructed the building would be declared surplus and turned back to the borough for disposal.

Blount added that it was the plan of the borough to recommend that the building be leased to a local community organization for a nominal fee (such as perhaps \$1.00 per year) for a community center.

He said that he doubted, however that the Borough would be interested in locating any of their local offices in this community building.

Klingler said that he had requested that the disposal of these buildings be put on the agenda of Monday's School Board meeting, so that CBA could proceed with any plans for its use at the earliest possible date.

He felt that the argument that the school be built at another location because of an inadequate water supply was no longer applicable. He said that the two new wells which were drilled last year should take care of any problem.

He also pointed out that any increase in school population would result in building of one or possibly two new schools, rather than enlarging of the

Thursday, January 13th, 8:00pm at the Borough Office Building on Tudor Road.

The meeting is of great interest to land developers in the Eagle River area since it proposes to classify all the Eagle River Fire Service district, as "suburban", and as such require all subdivisions to have such sophisticated features as paved streets, sewers, etc.

Several local interest groups such as the land surveyors, realtors as well as property owners have engaged an attorney to present testimony to show the Planning Commission why this area should be classified as "rural".

Glenn Briggs, a land developer from Eagle River, has urged that as many interested persons from the Fire Service District appear at this meeting to voice their opinions.

Ed Willis, Assemblyman from this area, echoed the objections of the others, but also pointed out that this is a hearing called by the planning commission, and as such is not subject to Assembly action. When the Ordinance is formalized and presented to the Assembly, they will also call a Public Hearing before it is acted upon.

3 LOCAL WOMEN PLACE IN SNOW-GO RACE

EAGLE RIVER: Three local women placed in the money in last weekend's Women's State Championship Snow-machine Race.

Reggie Bishop, took second place in Class L with 5:38:26 hours. Linda Johnson, last year's champion took second place in Class IV, while Tana Charles came in third in this class. Their times were 5:12:16 and 5:26:42 respectively.

Best overall time was Marie Clifford in Mod 1 class with 4:40:26.

The race started on Saturday with near perfect conditions both the trail and the weather. Almost all of the nearly 150 entrants made it to Island Lodge at Big Lake.

Sunday, however, was a different story. The temperature dropped to 27 degrees below zero at the Big Lake starting point, and the trail than one hundred sets of

tracks that had passed over it was brutal.

Despite this, 84 of the racers made it back to the finish line at the Red Barn Inn in Eagle River.

One problem on the return leg was the failure of the Union Oil gas truck to show up at the Eklutna refueling point.

The truck had reportedly broken down. A race committee official pointed out that the public came to the rescue of the racers by bring gas in cans to the refueling point.

When many heard over the radio that there was no gas at Eklutna, they drove out some from as far as Anchorage with gasoline, and not one racer was delayed by lack of gas.

Several instances of frostbite were reported by the racers, one woman suffered a dislocated shoulder, another a broken arm, and a third had to be hospitalized for exposure.

Signing the letter along with Chairman Asplund were Assemblymen Lang Willis, Norreen, Parker and Garrigues.

Willis, assemblyman for the Greater Chugiak section of the borough, expressed his indignation on the manner in which the Boundary Commission had handled the matter. He said that he first learned of their action by reading about it in the Anchorage newspaper.

The Greater Chugiak Area would be directly effected if such annexation were approved by the legislature.

Depending on where the boundaries of the annexed portion of Ft. Richardson were set, the Anchorage City limits could very well be at Eagle River, and even across Eagle River as far as Beach Lake in Birchwood, if all portions of the military reservation were annexed.
