REAPPORTIONMENT....WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR THIS AREA?

ANCH. NATURAL GAS OPENS LOCAL OFFICE

EAGLE RIVER: Anchorage Natural Gas has opened an office in the Eagle River area from which their local representatives will be operating.

ANG received approval last year to extend natural gas service to the Greater Chugliak Area as far as Eklutna, and have already begun to lay the pipe.

The crossing of Eagle River was accomplished late in November, and this week they are beginning to lay the lines.

The river crossing is located just east of the bridge near the Eagle River campground. The installation of pipe starts on the Ft. Richardson military reservation, cross the river at that point, and continue along the Old Glenn Highway as far as Lower Fire Lake. It will then be extended in a westerly direction along the north side of Lower Fire Lake as far as Chugliak High School and Birchwood Elementary School.

SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE COULD SPELL TROUBLE FOR HOMESTEADERS

ANCHORAGE: The subdivision ordinance proposed for adoption by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough could spell trouble for many homesteaders in the Eagle River Area.

The proposed ordinance, to apply boroughwide, would classify sections of the borough as either urban, suburban or rural.

As proposed, the entire Fire Service District in Eagle River has been classified as suburban. Under this classification subdividers would be required to provide public sanitary sewer systems

FOUR CHS SENIORS TO VIE FOR JR. MISS TITLE

BIRCHWOOD: Four senior girls from Chugliak High will be among the finalists to compete for the title of Anchorage Junior Miss at the pageant to be held at West High Saturday, January 8th.

The girls are, Jane Arndt, Helen Blair, Connie Bough, and Luann Dumelle.

The pageant, which begins at 8:00pm, is sponsored by the Captain Cook Jaycee's of Anchorage.

The winner of this pageant will go on to compete for the State title of Alaska Junior Miss, who in turn will be eligible for the National competition.

Contestants are judged on three standards: Poise and Appearance, Youth Fitness, Scholastic Achievement, a Personal Interview and Talent.

Scoring is 35% for the interview, 20% on talent, and 15% for each of the others.

Miss Arndt will perform a dance routine for her talent.

CHUGIAK: Governor Egan recently announced reapportionment plan has been greeted with mixed re-action throughout the state, however it is doubtful that interest runs any stronger than it does among the residents of the Greater Chugliak Area.

It was felt by many that any change would be an improvement for this area over the inclusion in the Anchorage District, with it's fourteen representatives elected at large.

Under the Governor's plan the five local voting precincts (along with the Goat Creek area) are included with portions of Mt. View and Muldoon in the district described as "Anchorage Northeast".

The geographic description of this area is "All of that area drained by streams flowing into the Knik Arm from the east from and including the Old Knik River Bridge on the line more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the center line of Knik Arm where it intersects the north projection of the east-west dividing line of the Fort Richardson Military Reservation and Elmendorf Air Force Base.

Thence southerly along said dividing line to the Glenn Highway.

north side of Lower Fire Lake as far as Chugiak High School and Birchwood Elementary School.

Persons living along this route will be offered natural gas service. The service will be extended throughout the community at a later time as public interest will demand.

A spokesman for Anchorage Natural Gas stated that they expect to be able to turn on the gas to prospective users in June or July of this year.

At present salesmen will be operating out of the local office contacting prospective users and supplying information on the cost of conversion from their present heating systems.

To date they have signed up fifteen customers. ANG has purchased the building next to the Chugiak VFW Hall at Mile 13 1/2 Old Glenn Highway, and are in the process of remodeling it. An open house is planned when all remodeling is completed.

BIRCHWOOD: The annual election of officers for the Allen Memorial Democratic Club will be held on Wednesday, January 5th, at the Birchwood Elementary School.

The meeting will take place in the school library starting promptly at 7:30pm.

Membership in this club is open to all registered Democrats living in any of the five voting precincts in the Greater Chugiak Area.

suburban. Under this classification subdividers would be required to provide public sanitary sewer systems, community water supplies, street names and paved streets. A spokesman for the planning department stated that the paving of streets could be waived by the public works department at their discretion. He cited as an example, a situation where the subdivision was accessible by an unpaved unimproved road.

Local homesteaders feel that it is a mistake to classify the entire area as suburban, and that the restriction imposed would make it prohibitive for some of them to ever be able to sub-divide their property.

A number of property owners have engaged an attorney to present their objections at a public hearing on the ordinance, scheduled for Thursday December, 13th.

This hearing is for the purpose of taking testimony and answering questions. It will be held at 7:30pm at the Borough Assembly meeting room at the Borough Offices on Tudor Road. A second public hearing will follow in about three weeks at which time adoption of the Ordinance will be considered.

The Chugiak Fire Service District has been classified as Rural under the proposed Ordinance. As such the only changes imposed on subdividers would be the naming of streets and graveled roads.

CHS ADDITION COMPLETED

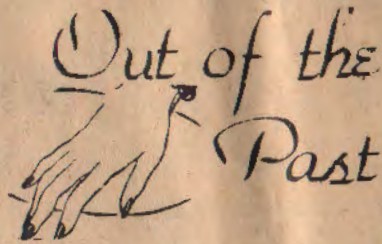

AMBULANCE FINDS PATIENT GONE

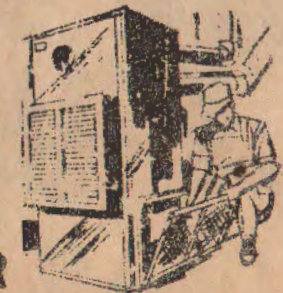

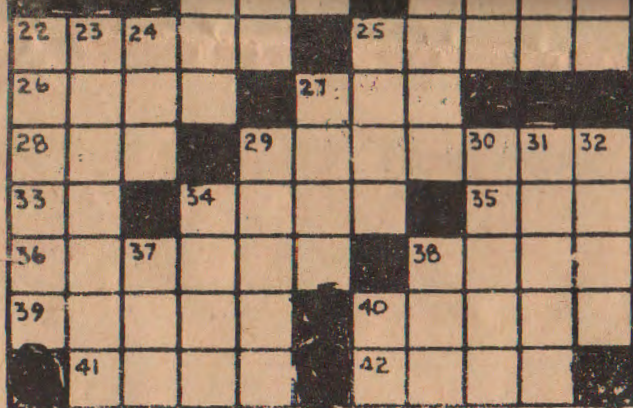



Bogie Benders Conduct Class At Birchwood

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak Bogie Benders, a club of Snow machine enthusiasts are conducting a five week enrichment class for students at the Birchwood Elementary School.

The purpose of this class is to instruct the children in snow machine safety, regulations and maintenance.

The first week will consist of familiarizing the children with the machines, this will be followed by a week teaching snow machine safety and a week devoted to maintenance.

For the fourth week, which will deal with regulations, an Alaska State Trooper will be invited to instruct the class.

During the final week the students will get an opportunity to actually operate snow machines.

The Bogie Benders are a local group, concerned more with the use of snow machines for family outings than for competition, although they have sponsored several cross country races.

ARE GIRLS THE BETTER DRIVERS?

Another claim to male superiority is on shaky ground.

Results of a nationwide test by the Aetna Life and Casualty Co. show something women have known all along. Men may not be the better drivers after all.

In fact the study showed girls reacted slightly better in four simulated traffic emergencies than their male counterparts.

The teenagers, using a driver training system complete with simulated cars and color movies, had to cope with an impending head-on collision, a near sideswipe, brake failure and a tire blowout.

Shown the emergency driving film for the first time, the girls grappled with the crises better than the boys in two out of four situations and tied them in a third.

Although the girls did somewhat better than the boys, neither group scored highly. Overall, more than two out of three reacted incorrectly in the four emergencies, showing the need for more driver preparation in handling the unexpected, the study said.

SNOWMOBILING AT NIGHT

"The moon on the breast of the new-fallen snow gave a luster of midday to objects below." Thus did poet Clement Moore capture some of the sparkling magic of a winter night in his children's classic, *A Visit from St. Nicholas*.

Snowmobiling has enabled countless people to sample the wonder of a winter evening in the woods for the first time. Many of the sport's buffs often consider a nighttime trail ride the ultimate in snowmobiling fun.

But special precautions are necessary to ensure that enjoyment doesn't turn to tragedy, warn snowmobile experts at Kiekhaefer Mercury.

Reduced visibility makes it imperative that you check your headlights and taillights before starting out. It's not a bad idea to keep a spare bulb or two with you at all times. Don't get the idea you don't need lights because there's a beautiful full moon; moonlight is for romance, not illumination.

Avoid crossing rivers, lakes and highways at night and don't break new trails. By staying on established trails you can avoid the extremely dangerous hazards of barbed wire fences and guy wires and the chains sometimes used to keep auto traffic off a private driveway.

The importance of observing normal safety practices, such as not following too closely, letting someone know where you're going, and dressing warmly, is accentuated by nighttime operation.

Remember too that liquor is a dangerous companion on a snowmobile trip. Save the hot toddies for the end of the trail.

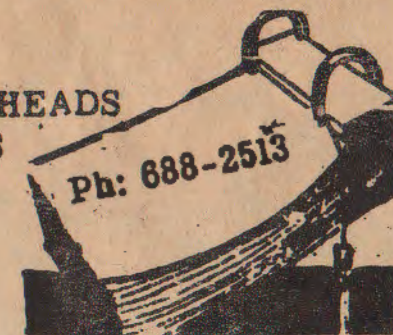
