EAGLE RIVER WOMAN STARS IN RESCUE DRAMA

YOUTH CAMPS SET FOR ALASKA

WASHINGTON, D.C.: Congressman Nick Begich announced today that the Departments of Interior and Agriculture will operate 95 Youth Conservation Corps Camps this summer for 8 weeks.

This project, scheduled to begin in late June, will be funded by a \$3.5 million Congressional appropriation and will employ approximately 3,000 young men and women, ages 15 through 18. These young people will be selected from all economic, ethnic, and social backgrounds and will participate during this second year of the 3 year YCC

camp.

Applicants for the program must show an interest in conservation of the Nation's natural environment, have no history of criminal or anti-social behavior, and possess work permits in States where they are required. In general, the young people must be in good physical condition, although opportunities for the handicapped may be provided in some camps.



EKLUTNA LAKE: A dramatic rescue, with an Eagle River woman in the starring role took place last Sunday, February 13th at Eklutna Lake.

Mrs. Ruth Mueller and her husband Richard had taken their two snow machines to Eklutna Lake and were traveling along the lake shore when they came to a place where a feeder stream entered the lake.

While crossing the icy surface of the frozen stream, Mrs. Mueller's snowmachine spun out of control and went over a steep embankment.

Mrs. Mueller was thrown from the machine and rolled down the bank ahead of the machine. She was stopped by a stump of a tree, and the snow machine which had by that time caught up with her, fell against her, breaking her leg.

will participate during the second year of the 3 year YCC pilot program.

The Youth Conservation Corps Camps in Alaska will be located at Chugach National Forest (Forest Service), Fairbanks District Office (Bureau of Land Management) and Mt. Edgumbe School (Bureau of Indian Affairs). All of these projects will be coeducational. Chugach National Forest will employ 24 persons, Fairbanks BLM 20 persons and Mt. Edgumbe 20 persons. Applicant information may be obtained from the above locations.

A public school system or other youth serving organization will probably be used to recruit and process candidates who live within the boundaries of a designated area. In this way, transportation costs are minimized by employing Corps members as near to their places of residence as possible. This procedure also limits the total number of candidates who must be considered for the small number of positions available under the limited study program.

The Youth Conservation Corps program was designed to provide conservation work that is vitally needed to improve the quality of our lands and waters, to provide gainful summer employment for the Nation's youth, and to provide for the buildup of a reserve of environmentally aware young citizens.

Youth participating in this program will be paid a fixed sum for the 8 week tour of duty amount to \$300. Camp facilities will range from tents and rough bunkhouses to large barracks-type buildings and college dormitories. In some instances, small groups may occupy remote ranger stations or temporary work

YOUTH HURT IN SNOWGO ACCIDENT

EAGLE RIVER: An Anchorage youth, injured in a snow-machine accident was transported to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Ambulance last Sunday.

The victim was Bruce Eastwood, age 19, who had reportedly struck a tree while riding his snowmachine in the vicinity of Chugiak High School.

He was transported by a private car to the Eagle River Inn, where the ambulance was summoned.

He appeared to be suffering from numerous cuts and lacerations, according to a spokesman for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company.

PARENTS TOUR NEW CHS CLASSROOMS

BIRCHWOOD: Parents attending the Monday night meeting of the Chugiak High PTSA were treated to a tour of the newly completed classrooms.

The athletic program is benefited by the two exercise rooms, constructed off the gymnasium. One room is being used for workouts for the wrestling team, while the other is being utilized by the girls for gymnastics.

The new shop room boasts not only wood working equipment but also machine shop equipment.

The tour proceeded to the home economics department with new individual kitchen units in one half, while the

other was devoted to sewing with a number of machines available.

The new science department is shared by the chemistry and biology classes, with two laboratories in one open classroom unit.

The pride of the school is the new library, which not only affords room for many more new books, but also has a place where students who wish to type their school work may find typewriters available for their use. These are placed in partitioned study units off the library.

Mr. Elden King, Principal of Chugiak High explained how the design of the new addition was such that it could be expanded into a two story building as the school population grows in coming years.



Although she and her husband were alone at that time, he remembered having passed another party of snow-machinists, and went after them for help.

These men notified the Alaska State Troopers, who in turn called the Rescue Coordination Center.

A helicopter was immediately dispatched from the 5040th Helicopter Squadron at Elmendorf.

When they arrived at the scene of the accident they discovered that the terrain was not suitable to land the chopper. They then proceeded to hover approximately 100 feet above the injured woman while a para-medical, S/Sgt David Stack was lowered down on a hoist. He applied a pneumatic splint to Mrs. Mueller's leg, then a Stokes litter, (a basket used for lifting injured persons) was lowered from the helicopter. Mr. Mueller and S/Sgt Stack were lifted into the helicopter by the hoist, and the men who had been snowmachining in the area secured Mrs. Mueller into the litter. By coincidence, these men were Air Force personnel and members of the Rescue Coordination Center, and therefore well versed in rescue procedures.

The injured woman was then flown to the 5040th Air Force Hospital, which has a helicopter pad on the premises. There an Air Force ambulance waited to take her to Providence Hospital.

LADIES CLUB TO HOLD WORK PARTY

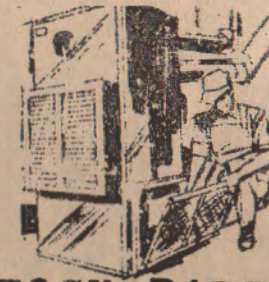
EAGLE RIVER: There will be a work party held in conjunction with the regular meeting of the Chugiak Ladies Club this Thursday, February 17th.

NAKNEK — A day-long celebration to mark the opening of Bristol Bay Borough's first public library is planned for Feb. 26.

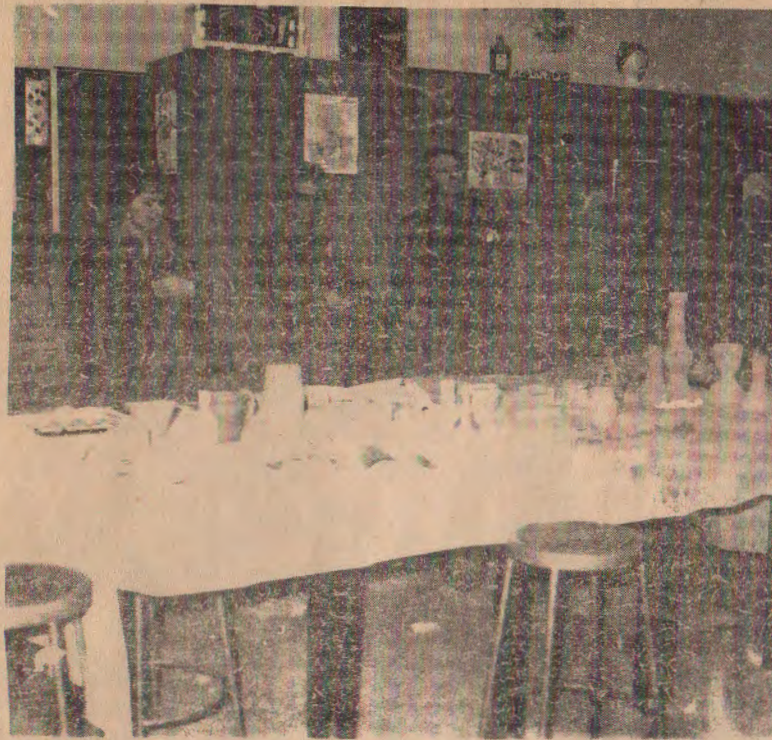

The library-museum was financed with a \$40,000 federal and state grant, and \$4,000 from the Bristol Bay Borough, said Larry Van Campen, borough manager.

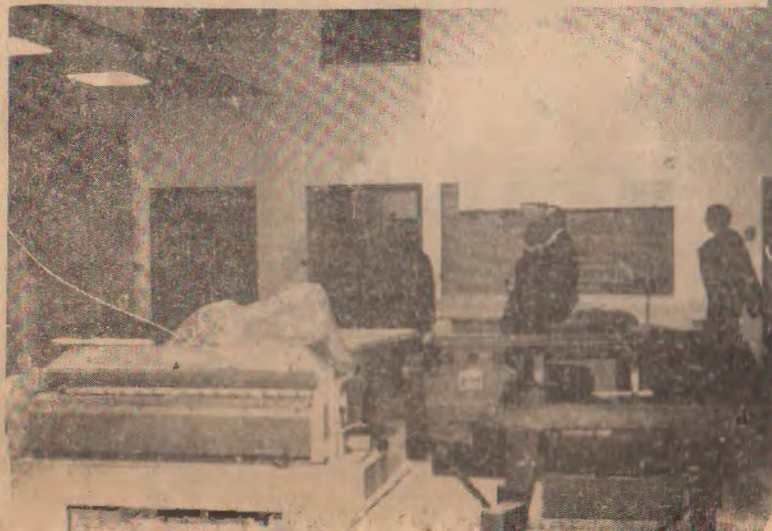
He said the borough has budgeted \$6,000 for library books, and plans to do this each year until the library is plenished.

The borough hopes to get the state to start a regional library system, whereby books can be loaned between libraries, Van Campen said.

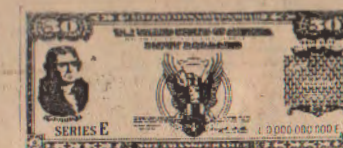

Bi-Lo's "bonus bucks" will be good for more than Bi-Lo products between now and March 15.

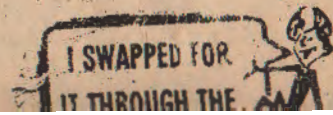
The grocery chain has agreed to redeem the coupons for money that will go to the Alaska Foundation to buy an artificial kidney machine at Anchorage Community Hospital.

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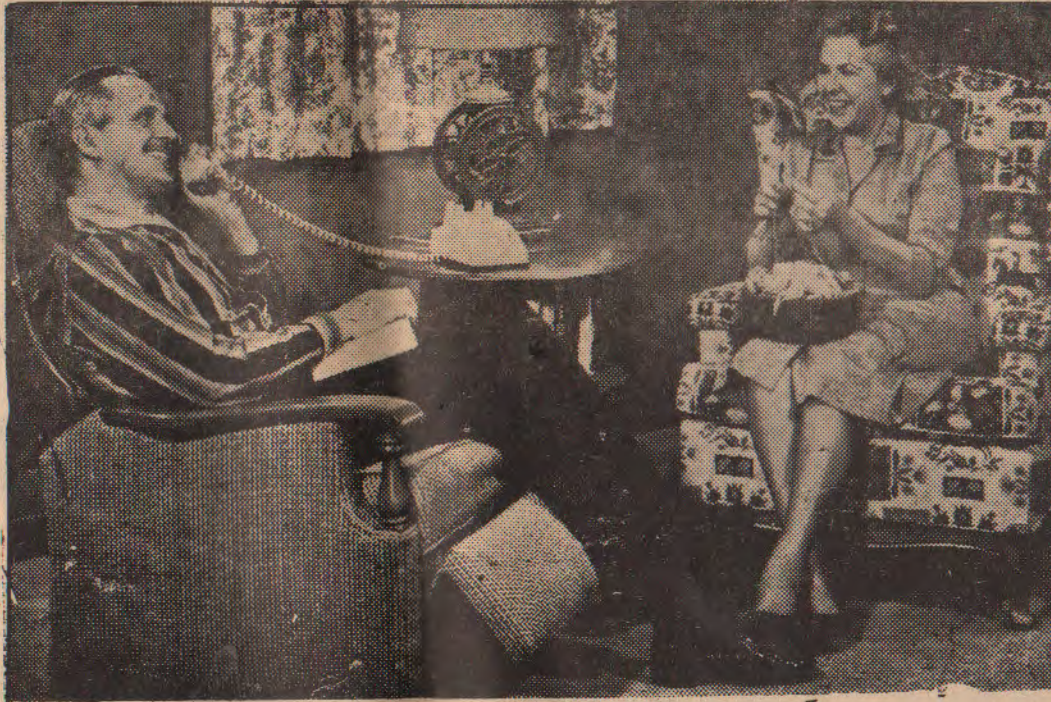

Arctic General, Inc., was apparent low bidder for the Delta River Bank protection and construction of a boat ramp, four miles north of Delta Junction. Arctic's bid of \$30,911 was less than half the engineer's estimate of \$72,260. Only three bidders of the eight responding exceeded the estimate.

The work, to be completed May 15, includes construction of 2,000 feet of riprap on the Delta River and construction of a boat ramp on the river.

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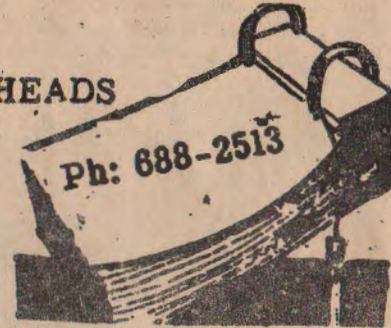
