PALMER: Sunday, February 6 is "D-Day" for Direct Distance dialing in this area.

Starting at 1:30 a.m. on Feb. 6, all MTA subscribers in the Greater Chugiak Area will be asked to place long distance calls using this method. Calls placed the conventional, operator handled method will tie-up toll boards resulting in a slow down of service.

The dialing procedure for placing DDD calls is relatively simple. First the caller dials his access code (a two or three digit number) next he will dial the area code of the region being called. If outside Alaska, and finally the telephone number to be called.

A toll free long distance Directory Assistance number, (555-1212) will be offered with implementation of DDD. The caller simply dials his access code, the area code of the region being called if outside of Alaska, and 555-1212. No charge will be made, even if the operator asks for the caller's number.

Plans have been made to hold it in the Sherrod Elementary Scholl Gymnasium in Palmer. Registration of prospective bidders will begin at 10:30a.m and the auction will start at 12:3-p.m.

Interested persons are urged to plan to register early, as a large number of bidders is anticipated.

The lands covered by this auction are west and northwest of Palmer, extending northward to the Montana Creek area. To be offered for sale will be 72 private recreation and 45 utility units.

The private recreation units range in size from 0.82 to 40 acres and the utility units from 4.08 to 160 acres. Prices for the sale units begin at \$500 for one small unit to \$39,800 for 160 acres.

Six private recreation and 34 utility units will be offered for 55 year lease. The six recreation units are from 0.992 to 40 acres in size, while the 34 utility units range from 24.42 to 160 acres.

Annual rental rates are from \$40 to \$2,260. Bidding for each lease unit will begin at the minimum acceptable annual rental which is based on 6% of the appraised fair market value of the land. The person offering the highest annual rental as the bidding progresses will be awarded the lease.

All leased units will be reappraised at five year intervals to keep the income consistent with the value of the land. The reappraisals are based on the value of the land as it was at the time it was leased, and may increase or decrease the annual rental.

Improvements made by the lessee will not increase the annual rental.

The agricultural tract of 80 acres will be offered for a 15 year lease. The minimum acceptable annual rental of the tract will be the minimum annual rental of \$40 but the bidding will start at 10 cents

ATWATER FIRST TO FILE IN NEW DISTRICT

EAGLE RIVER: Galen Atwater, of Eagle River is the first to file for the State Senate in the new Anchorage Northeast District.

Atwater, a registered Democrat, is filing for the E2 seat for the four year term.

Atwater has been in business in the local area on and off for the past fifteen years. At the present time he is the head of Atwater-Foster Development Corp, which consists of Eagle River Taxi, Eagle River Plumbine and Heating Supply and Open Road of Alaska motor homes.

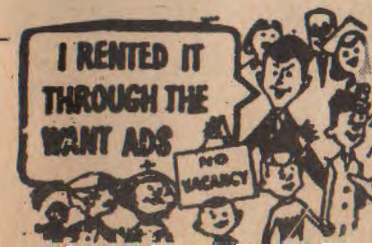

Atwater says that if elected his prime concern would be road improvements for the local area. He feels that it is wrong to be spending millions for bridges in the Southeast part of the State when the people of Birchwood have been

putting up with dirt roads for years.

CUT OVER WILL REQUIRE TEAMWORK

PALMER: The February 6 cut over to Distance Dialing (DDD) will involve a lot of teamwork.

The four step, five hour procedure involving thirty five communities (including Matanuska Telephone Association's eight) will begin at 11:00 P.M. on February 5.

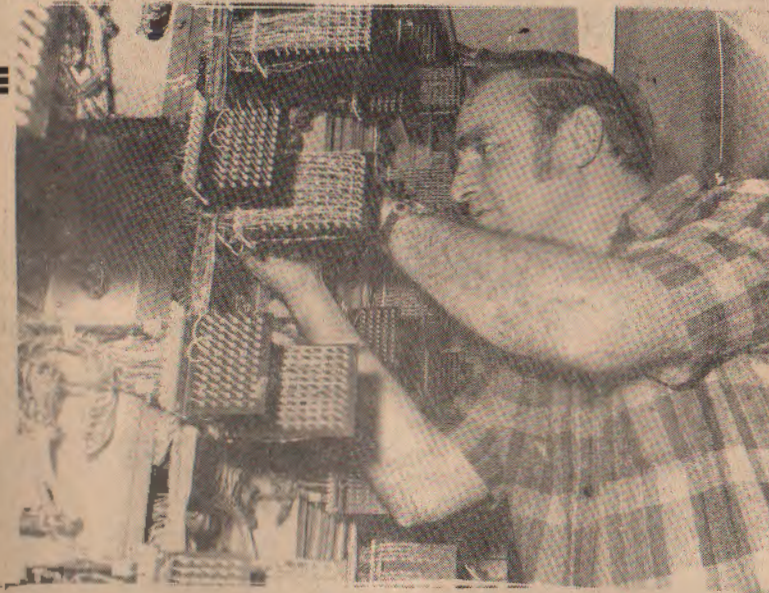
At this time, the first step in procedure coordinating test boards in Anchorage, Seattle, Edmonton, Portland, Whitehorse, Fairbanks, Juneau, Ketchikan and Neklason Lake will begin with the turning down (taking out of service) a portion of the longlines serving these areas. After turning these long lines, test lines, test boards are to notify the Anchorage control center.

Step two will begin at 12:01am on February 6 and end at 1am. This will be a testing procedure with all malfunctioning of trunk (lines) to remain turned down.

Step three will begin promptly at 1:30am with RCA's old 3CL WESCO SX toll switch in Anchorage being cut-out and the new North Electric X-Bar being cut-in. The cut-over is somewhat simplified by the fact that RCA's North Electric equipment is already handling 17% of the toll traffic.

At this time, all thirty seven exchanges from Cordova to King Salmon will be cut into a Nationwide DDD network.

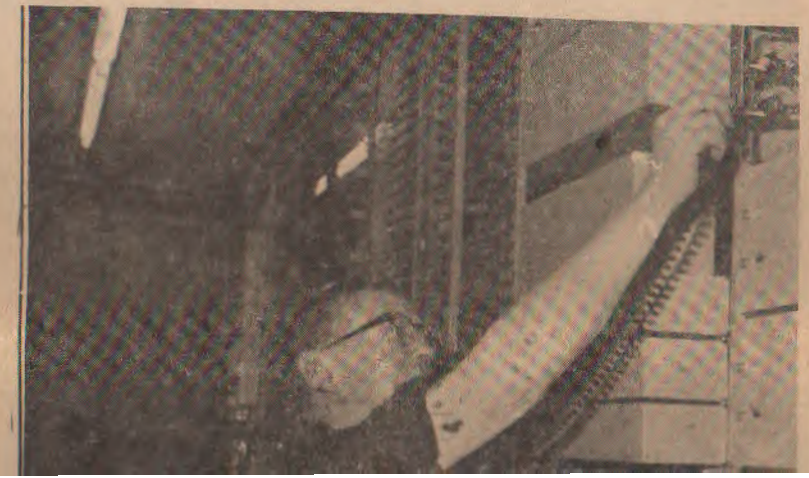

Persons building homes can ask the Oil Heat Institute to figure the cost of heating before they decide the type of equipment they may wish to install.

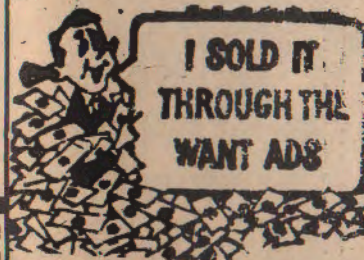

UAA OFFERS WEIGHT LOSS PROGRAM

A new program aimed at the segment of the population that is at least 15 pounds too fat is being offered at the University of Alaska Anchorage beginning Feb. 5.

The program, a weight reduction clinic, is offered at no charge, but is limited to the first 15 persons who enroll.

The clinic is part of the UAA's Community Counseling Center.

The center offers counseling services for a variety of problems including relationships within the family, marriage difficulties, learning disabilities, peer relationships, personal frustrations of alienation, loneliness, and development delays.

Dr. Clifford Hunt, associate professor of psychology and director of the counseling center, said behavior modification approaches will be used in the weight reduction clinic.

Counseling will be provided on an individual or group basis.

Members of the clinic will weigh-in each week. Motivation enhancers will be used, Hunt said, and individuals primarily will be competing against themselves to lose weight.

Sid Gourhan, a graduate student in psychology, will conduct the 10-week clinic, with meetings to be held from 11 a.m. to noon one day a

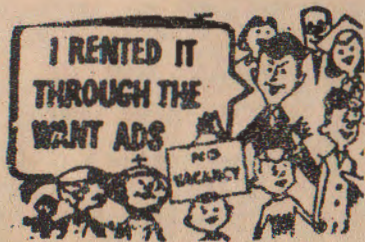

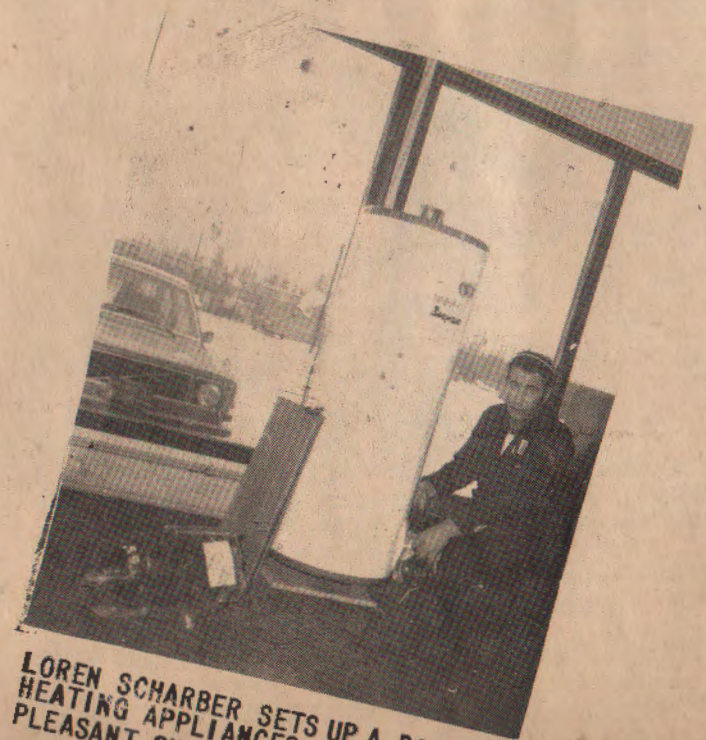

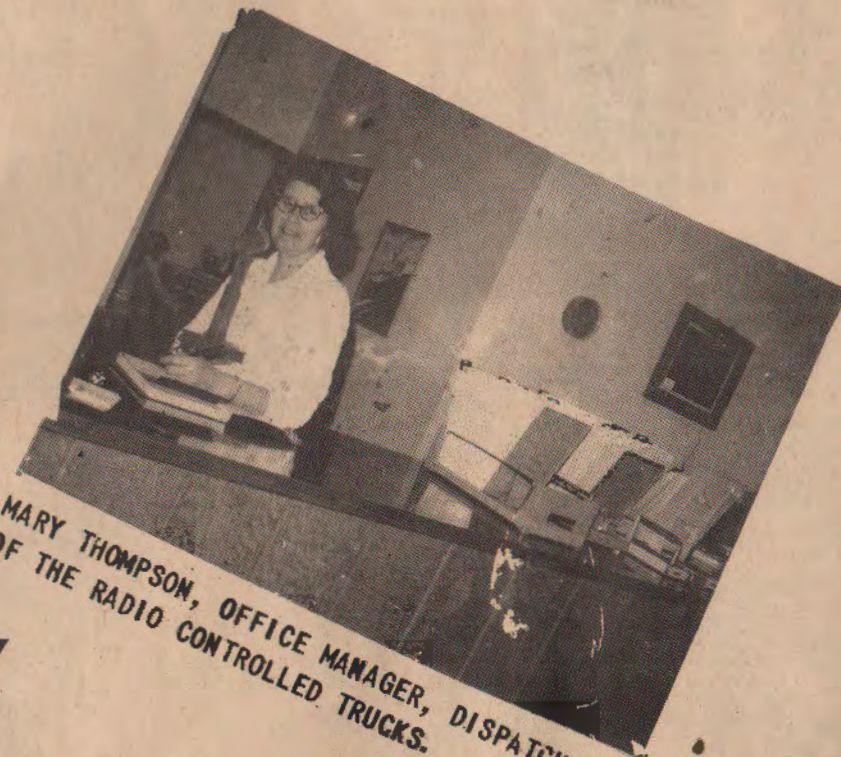

EDUCATIONAL TV SEEN BY '73

If the Alaska Legislature approves funding, an educational television facility could be operating in Anchorage by July, 1973, an official of the Southcentral Alaska Educational Broadcasting Association says.

This is to be the annual election of officers, and all members are urged to attend.

Larry Motz, president of the association and supervisor of the audio-visual section for State Operated Schools, says the association is in the research and planning phase so it can immediately begin implementation of plans upon allocation of funds.

Gov. William Egan has submitted a budget request of \$557,000 to the legislature to launch the tri-borough educational TV station here.

The association has submitted articles of incorporation and by-laws for incorporation under state law, which will enable it to apply to the Federal Communications Commission for a license.

Under its articles of incorporation, Motz says, the association would receive federal grants to supplement state funds for operation of educational television facilities. The association would contract for the actual operation of the facilities.

The association is comprised of representatives of educational institutions in the Anchorage, Matanuska-Susitna and Kenai Peninsula boroughs in addition to various public organizations including the Alaska Federation of Natives, Alaska Festival of Fine Arts, and the Public Health Service.

Other officers of the association are William McCaughan, coordinator of media services for the Anchorage School District, vice president; Norman Rousey, superintendent of Kenai Schools, secretary, and Thomas Beirne, director of external affairs for the University of Alaska, Southcentral Region, treasurer.

They do not feel that anyone could possibly ever tell their families the truth, as they are a military couple and never expect to return here or that anyone who might know about the adoption would ever meet any of their folks.

What would you advise them?

Dear Weiting,
I am afraid that I could never advise anyone to attempt such a deception.

The effect the truth might have on their family would be insign-nificant to what it might do to the child if he should learn of it in later years.

Such matters are difficult to keep secret. Anyone who is in the military and has been tran-sferred around very much knows how old acquaintances keep turn-ing up, even after years.

Tell the truth, there is nothing to be ashamed about an adoption. If your friends feel that adoption is something disgraceful perhaps they should reconsider the mat-ter.

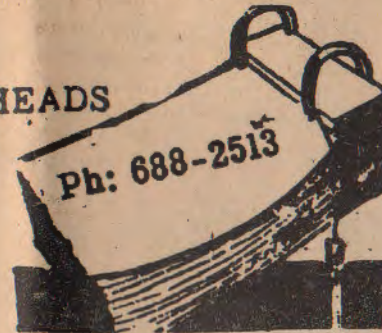
