


POSSIBLE HIGHWAY **RE-OPENING** RUMORED







NEW LODGE **OPENS SOUTH** OF EAGLE RIY

SOUTH FORK: A new Mecca for winter sports enthusiasts will open this coming Sunday at Mile 2.2 Hiland Road, south of Eagle River.

The "Ice Palace" is owned and will be operated by Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Stewart. of Hiland Road.

The Ice Palace is a large two story building, and was planned with the snowmobilers and cross country skiers in mind.

The ground floor of the lodge will contain a "fast food' type of restaurant, where short orders will be available. As many as 65 people can be seated at one time at the tables in this portion of the building. The second floor will be occupied by the bar and dining room. At resent, only the bar is open, and will serve beer and wine.

A Grand Opening is planned at a later date when dining room facilities are completed.

The Stewarts homesteaded on Hiland Road in 1958. They are the managers of the Eagle River Sanitary Land Fill,

Mrs. Stewart said that they have an ample parking lot, and invite people to bring their snow machine trailers in and unload there. They also welcome cross country skiers to use their lodge as a take off point.

Their Sunday opening coincides with the Women's Eagle River 50 snowmachine race which will start and fin-

sh at the Ice Palace. They will open at 7am this Sunday only to accomodate the racers, but their normal hours will be 10am to 10pm for the restaurant, with the bar remaining open until midnight.

For the time being, the Ice Palace will be open on weekends only, Mrs. Stewart concluded.


