ONE OF TWO TYPES ZONING TO BE CONSIDERED HERE

**YOUTH SERIOUSLY
 HURT WHEN CAR
 HITS SNOWMACHINE**

BIRCHWOOD: A thirteen year old Birchwood youth was seriously injured when the snow-machine on which he was a passenger collided with a car near Chugiak High School last Friday, February 4th.

The victim was Richard Steele, an eighth grader at Chugiak Junior High.

He was transported to Providence hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company ambulance. He was suffering from multiple fractures of the left leg both above and below the knee and possible internal injuries.

HIGHWAY DEPT.

PLEADS "NO FUNDS" FOR LOCAL ROAD

IMPROVEMENT

EAGLE RIVER: The Alaska Department of Highways pleaded "no funds available" to most of the highway priorities presented by the local Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber had written to Governor William Egan listing these priorities. The

Both of these plans will be explored in depth at a series of two public meetings to be held in this area during the next two weeks.

The first session will be held on Wednesday, February 16th, 1972 at the Eagle River Elementary School starting at 8:00pm. The second meeting will take place on Tuesday, February 22nd, at Chugiak High School, also at 8:00pm.

Local residents are invited to either or both of these meetings to convey to the planners their

DESIGN PICKED FOR HOMESTEAD ELEM. SCHOOL

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB School Board, at their meeting last night approved the design for the Homestead Elementary School which is to be built in Eagle River.

The plan approved was that of the Ocean View Elementary School, which recently won a National Award for excellence in school design.

This school is of the open structure with movable partitions.

The Tundra Elementary School design, which had been originally considered for the Homestead design was rejected for the reason that it was not considered suitable for the site.

Other board business included the evaluation for insurance purposes of all borough school buildings. The total evaluation for schools within the Greater Anchorage Area Borough is \$110,000,000.

ing these priorities. The Governor had, in turn, forwarded the letter to Commissioner of Highways Bruce Campbell who had replied to the Chamber.

The list of priorities was headed by the need of lighting of intersections on the Old Glenn Highway, the surfacing and upgrading of Birchwood and Eagle River Loop Roads, the upgrading of the Old Glenn Highway, the improvement of Eagle River Road and the building of a road connecting Eagle River to Girdwood.

The only project which Mr. Campbell indicated any funds were available for was the Eagle River Road realignment, which had already been approved and was scheduled.

The Girdwood link was dismissed as being a part of the development plan for the Chugach State Park and not a Highway Department matter.

The Chamber Board felt that the "no funds" plea was the same old song that the Highway Department has been singing, and felt that funds could be made available if the proper ear could be reached. The board voted to continue to press for these priorities.

The Chamber Highway Committee reported on the schedule of completion of the various sections of the Anchorage to Fairbanks Highway.

Included in the plans is the proposal of a rest-stop at the point where the Eagle River sewer crosses the new Glenn Highway, with a place where Campers might dump their holding tank directly into the sewer trunk.

The Chamber Board discussed the proposed land use plans to be aired at local public meetings to be held by the Borough Planning Department. They voted to go on record at these meetings as

BOMB HOAX EMPTIES CHUGIAK HIGH

BIRCHWOOD: A bomb hoax emptied Chugiak High last week, chasing students and faculty out into the snow for 18 shivering minutes while State Troopers searched the building.

The threat was made over the telephone at approximately 1:13 pm on Thursday, February 3rd.

The phone was answered by one of the office staff. The caller was male, and from the sound of his voice apparently youthful. He warned "You have a bomb in the building which will explode in 30 minutes."

The Alaska State Troopers were notified, who evacuated the building and then conducted a search. When the time the bomb was to have exploded had past, and the search had turned up no bomb, the building was re-occupied.

Elden King, CHS Principal, stated that as yet there no clue as to the identity of the caller. King said that MTA is installing equipment at the school which will immed-

ately lock into any such incoming calls and permit it to be traced to the phone at which the call originates.

Alan G. Scheen, Associate planner for the Borough stated that it is his belief that the borough will adopt the plan which is favored by the majority of the local residents.

EAGLE RIVER: The Chugiak Ladies Club held their annual election of officers last Thursday at a meeting held at the home of Irene Green in Eagle River.

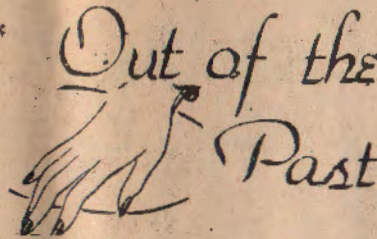

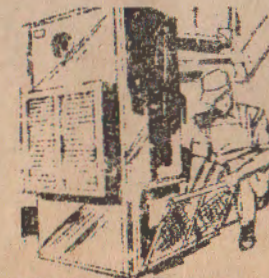

DDD CUT-OVER NOT WITHOUT PROBLEMS

CHUGIAK: Direct Distance Dialing came to the Greater Chugiak Area, as well as thirty five other communities throughout Southeastern Alaska. The cut-over did, however have it's share of problems.

The most serious problems are long distance operator response times and a lack of long distance trunk (lines).

Matanuska Telephone's General Manager, Max Clements, commented "Some slow down of service and tying up of facilities has to be expected in any cut over of this size. With testing and repair on almost all long distance trunks, some problems will result. Hopefully by week's end these two problems will be corrected."

Clements also stated that some problems have been encountered in getting the identifiers working. Operators are having to come onto the lines to obtain the caller's number. ITT will have their own plus Tyee Construction working on the identifiers until some progress is made.

Overall, Clements seemed optimistic that these initial problems will begin to clear up soon. He stated that "Most of the cut-over problems should be cleared within several days. Getting the identifiers to work may take a little longer, but no prolonged delay can be foreseen at this time."

LOCAL FIRM TO HAUL BORO SEWER PIPE

ANCHORAGE: A Chugiak construction firm was awarded the contract for hauling the eight hundred sections or joints of sewer pipe to be used to build a part of the West Interceptor sewer line to the South and west of Anchorage by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

Last month the Borough Assembly awarded a \$22,800 contract to Brittain Construction Co. of Birchwood to haul the pipe from Hydro Conduit Corp., where it was made, and to string it out at the two locations where it will later be installed.

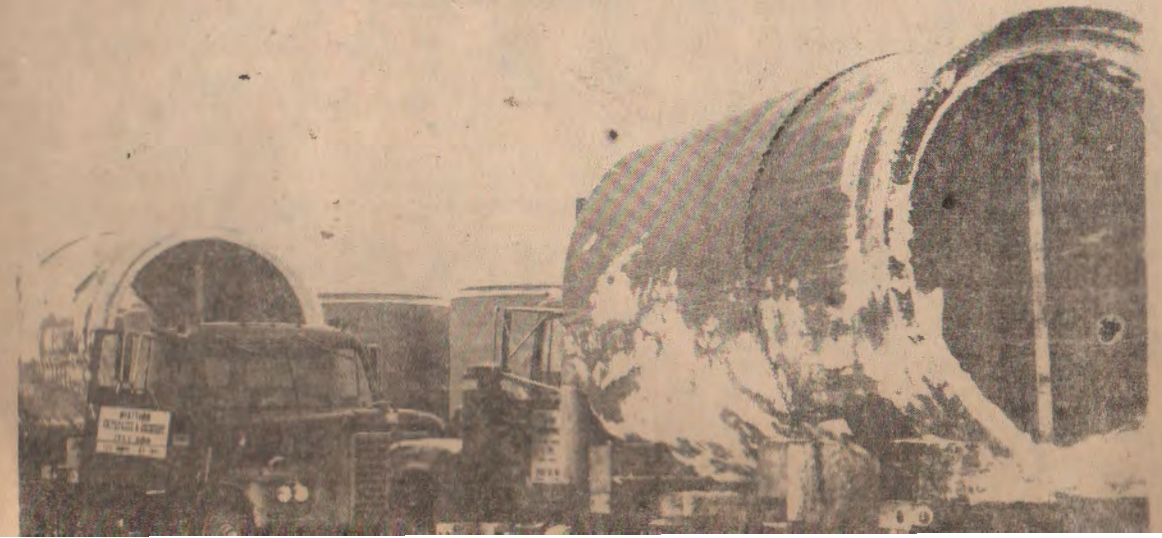
Each section of pipe is 12 feet in length, seven feet in diameter, and weighs 15.5 tons.

This is the last pipe of this size that Hydro Conduit has made for the borough's master sewer program.

Two hundred seventy four joints of this massive pipe will be strung out along Wisconsin Drive between Lake Spear and 36th Avenue.

The remainder of the pipe will be placed along a berm to the east of Jewel Lake Rd. just south of International Airport Road.

It is anticipated that it will take Brittain approximately two months to place the pipe.

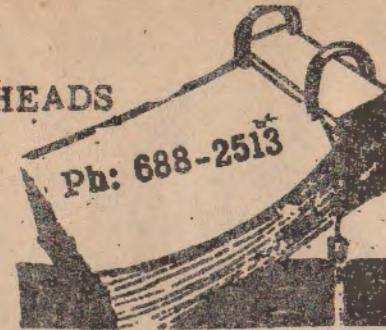
