The only other racer to complete the race in under 10 hours was James Piland, in a Polaris in 9:50:39. He took first place in the Mod. III division.



TO LOOK FOR
NEW SITE FOR
CHUGIAK
GRADE SCH.**

ANCHORAGE: A request that the new Chugiak Elementary School be built on a site other than that occupied by the present school was made to the GAAB School Board at their Tuesday night meeting.

Thomas Blavka, President of the Chugiak Elementary School PTA made the presentation to the school board and backed this request up with petitions signed by local residents.

ANCHORAGE: Opponents, as well as proponents of the latest unification proposal will have their opportunity to voice an opinion at a public hearing scheduled for tomorrow, Thursday, at 8pm at the Borough Assembly meeting hall on Tudor Road.

This plan would involve only the residents of the Anchorage Bowl, and would offer them the choice of either unifying as a first class home rule borough or a second class borough. By turning down both of these propositions, they would be voting, in fact, to retain the present form of government.

While the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area and of the Girdwood area would not be included in this unification plan, the effect of the exclusion of these areas would be very important.

The question as just what their status would be has yet to be answered.

Other Board action on matters of interest to the Greater Chugiak Area included a request by the Chugiak Children's Services to incorporate the local Day Care Center into the on the job training program at Chugiak High.

This was referred to the Borough's 4C Committee.

The site development plan for the Eagle River Elementary School was approved by the Board. This is to upgrade the playground facilities at the school.

Sue Green, Chairman of the re-focus committee announced the scheduling of a public hearing at Chugiak High. This is to discuss the possibility of a 12 month school year. This hearing will be held on Thursday, April 13, at 7:30pm.

The Board voted to continue grade requirements for all athletic activities, but tabled for the next meeting discussion of corporal punishment and "F" grades.

Mike Stratton, a student at East High and Chairman of the Student Advisory Board has been extended the privilege of sitting on the school board and has freedom of discussion, but may not vote.

ASSEMBLY TABLES COMMUNITY CENTER UNTIL MONDAY

YOUTH SHOT FOLLOWING SNOW MOBILE MISHAP

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly last Monday, tabled for one week voting on the construction of a Community Center which would serve the Greater Chugiak Area.

The vote was 9 to 1 in favor of tabling, with Assemblyman Ed Willis casting the only vote against the motion.

Assemblyman Marsh moved the matter be tabled for the reason that the memo before the Assembly did not list the functions of the Center nor how it would be financed.

The Assembly was to have considered a proposition to purchase the Broadwater Building, which would require remodeling, as well as repairs to damage suffered in a fire earlier this year, as opposed to a new construction.

CHUGIAK IS TWENTY FIVE

CHAPTER II: It was in April of 1947 that the Community Club was called to a special meeting to select a name for the community.

The meeting was called by the McDowell's because they wished to go into a business and felt that they might name their business after the community.

The meeting was held in the McDowell home, which was later to become the business establishment as well as their home.

Under the glare of a hissing Coleman lantern, and seated on packing boxes, common furniture in the community then and for some time to

come, President Cloyce Parks conducted the meeting.

The same members attended this meeting as were present at the first, as newcomers as the first, as newcomers would not arrive for two or three months yet.

At this meeting, no meeting of minds could be arrived at and it was decided to call another meeting the following week and consider all the names suggested.

The next meeting was at the Parks home. Again the same people attended.

Names suggested included Parksville, Mink Creek, Knik Heights, Inlet View and Rocky Run.

Henning (Johnny) Johnson, said just in his work among

the natives he had discussed the mountains against which the community nestled. They said the white man had corrupted the name and spelling of the range. According to his informants, the mountains were Chu-ge-ak, meaning "The Place of Many Places".

He offered this name, with the angloized spelling of "Chugiak" as his nomination.

After a great deal of discussion a vote was taken, with the families of Parks, Media, Swanson, Johnson, McDowell and Fetrow each casting two ballots. The final tally showed seven for Chugiak and five for other names.

So the community of Chugiak was born. Its boundaries were to be Mile 13 of the Glenn Highway on the south to Mile 31 on the north, from the crest of the Chugach Mountains on the east to the shores of the Knik Arm on the west.

Incidentally, the McDowell business was named Moosehorn, a name already chosen by the time of the second meeting.

This is an account of the history of the community of Chugiak as taken from the minutes of the Chugiak Community Club, and printed to commemorate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of this community.

AARP TO MEET THIS FRIDAY


OLD CHUGIAK: There will be a meeting of the Knik Arm Chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons, (AARP) on Friday, March 17.

CHAMBER BD. HOLD'S SPECIAL MEETING

EAGLE RIVER: The Board of Directors of the local Chamber of Commerce held a special meeting last Friday night at the home of Glenn Briggs in Eagle River.

The meeting was called to resolve two matters of Chamber interest, namely the consideration by the Borough Assembly of the construction of a community center in Eagle River, and preparing a presentation on the subject of Unification at the Public Hearing this Thursday.

The Board voted to recommend to the Assembly that they consider the purchase of the Broadwater Building for a community center, as opposed to constructing a new building for this purpose.

They listed among other reasons for the recommendation, the accessibility of the building, the abundance of parking space, room for expansion and the more than adequate water supply, a point to be considered since the building would also house the new quarters for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company.

On the matter of Unification, the Board, after considerable discussion, resolved that they did not oppose the areas within the Anchorage Bowl unifying if that was their wish.

They only asked that the rural areas which would be excluded by such unification be assured adequate protection in case of a fire.

ROAD BIDS ARE ASKED

Bids are being asked by the Federal Highway Administration for construction work on the Yakutat Highway in Tongass National Forest, according to Ralph M. Phillips, regional administrator and contracting officer in Portland, Ore.

The project work calls for roadway grading, furnishing and placing special subbase aggregates, and construction of two reinforced concrete and steel girder bridges on a 1.841 mile extension of the highway, beginning about 24 miles east of Yakutat.

The estimated price range for the project is \$1 million to just under \$2 million. A contract time of 250 calendar days will be allowed for performance of the work. The improvement is being financed with Alaska Forest Highway funds.

Bids will be received at the Alaska Division Office, Federal Highway Administration, Room 871, Federal Office Building in Juneau until 11 a.m. May 8.


