## A SSEMBLY GIVES GREEN LIGHT TO COMMUNITY CENTER

### UNIFICATION A DEAD ISSUE

**ANCHORAGE:** The predicted death of the Unification proposal came about at Monday's assembly meeting in the last minutes of the meeting under the Assembly Comments.

Assemblyman Ben Marsh moved that the motion to reconsider, made at the last meeting by Lang be brought before the Assembly.

When the matter came to a vote, the results were 4 yes and 4 no. Since a minimum of 6 votes were required to pass the proposal, it joined all other moves to unify the borough and city in defeat.

Assembly President Jim Garrigues commented that when and if unification comes up again, it should issue from the citizens of the borough, and not generated from above as was this one.

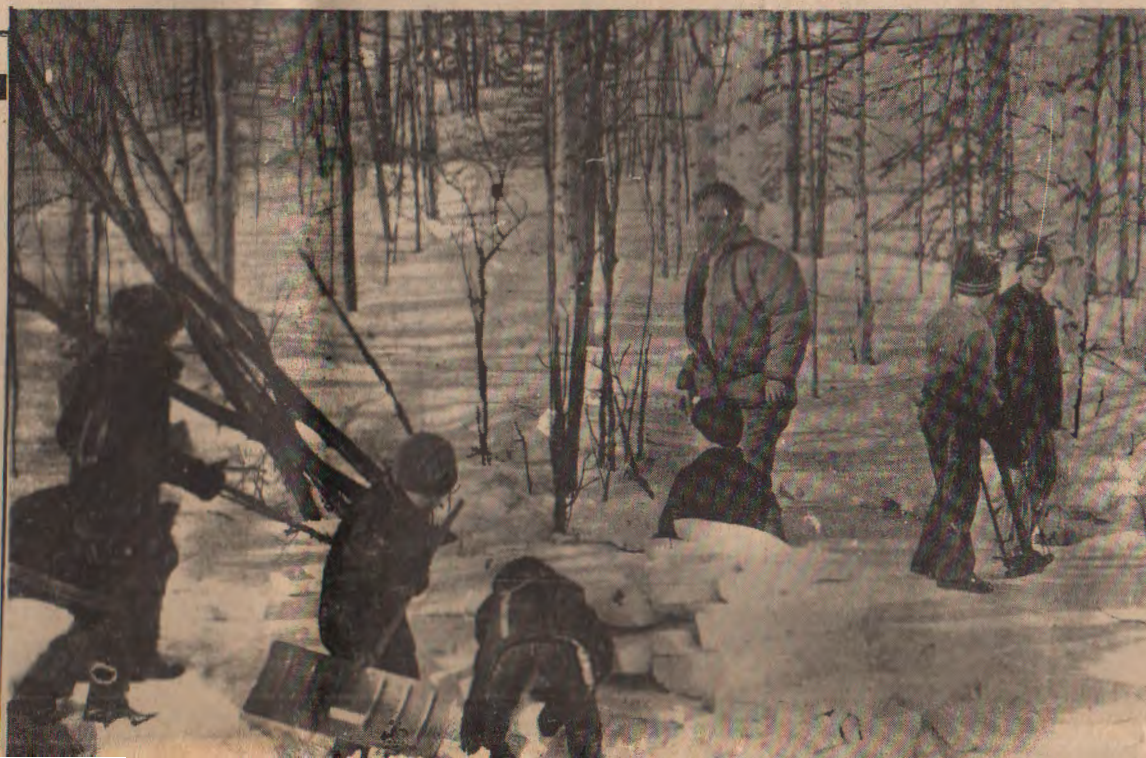
### STUDENTS LEARN TO SURVIVE

**OLD CHUGIAK:** Learning survival is one of 6 mini-courses being offered at Chugiak Elementary School.

Chuck Heath, 6th grade science teacher and an avid outdoors man, has been preparing students to find shelter to build a fire in the snow and to learn not to panic should they become isolated in Alaska's hostile environment.

Mr. Heath described panic as the major cause of injury or fatality. He feels that anyone should be able to survive on materials available in the outdoors.

Students taking the survival course have learned to prepare their own food, to prop-



**ANCHORAGE:** The GAAB Assembly last Monday finally gave the green light to a proposal to lease or purchase the Broadwater Building in Eagle River, to be used as a Community Center for this area.

After questioning a length, as to how this project was to be financed and to what uses the building would be put, the Assembly approved the memo 72-127B with a vote of 6 to 2.

Thus the assembly has authorized the Administration to proceed with development of contract documents to acquire the existing Broadwater Facility in Eagle River, and bring them back to that body in for form of the necessary ordinances and contracts for commitment of future year funding.

The Broadwater Building, formerly the Eagle River Bowl, and more recently a plastics plant was gutted by a fire last year.

The purchase price as proposed would be \$200,000.

## FIRE CO. SAVES CHUGIAK HOME

OLD CHUGIAK: Prompt action on the part of the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company saved the John Mongelli residence at Mile 18 from destruction by fire.

The fire broke out at approximately 10am last Thursday.

The Mongelli's were not at home at the time. A neighbor, who contacted Mrs. Mongelli at her place of employment nearby at Great Land Realty, also called the Fire Company.

The fire was apparently caused by an overheated pipe from the floor furnace which caused the floor joists to catch fire.

The Fire Company was able to keep the Fire Damage confined to the living room of the house.

Mrs. Mongelli has asked that their thanks be extended to all those who have helped them.

As part of the survival course activities, students have prepared shelters out of willows and ice caves but most importantly have learned not to fear the unknown.

As a climax to the survival Mini-course, the students with Mr. Heath will spend the night in their own shelter, cook their own dinner, the following morning cook breakfast and clean up for the school day.

Other Mini-courses include skating, journalism art, plants and animals of Alaska and Drama. The mini-course on drama will climax with a school-wide presentation of "Winnie the Pooh" to be presented early in May.

Principal, Peter Zanke outlined an expanded Mini-course program for the 1972-73 school year to include Greek and Roman Mythology, Early Civilizations, Geographical Land Forms, Westward Movement and Ecology and Conservation.

The Mini-course is described as lasting 3 weeks with 2 classes per week. Students have the option of selecting one of the courses listed.

The Mini-course provides a student with an opportunity for in-depth study of one specific area of interest, thus enriching his educational experience.

# SCHOOL SITE CHANGE TO BE CONSIDERED

ANCHORAGE: Representatives of the Chuglak Elementary School PTA, at a work session of the GAAB School Board, presented their proposals to either move the school to another, more suitable site, or to ask a guarantee that the present site be improved to insure adequate water, drainage and playground area.

An alternate site, proposed by the local representatives was a portion of the Chuglak Carnival Grounds, which CBA had offered to exchange for the site presently occupied by the Chuglak Elementary School.

The School Board agreed to have engineers look over the present site to determine if it could be improved so that the demands of the PTA would be satisfied.

They felt that with the two new wells that have been drilled last year, plus the holding tank, that there was no longer a water problem. They also felt that by removing a portion of the hill behind the present site, the drainage of the area would be improved.

At the same time, the leveling of the hill would provide the additional playground area.

If the engineers determined that the above was not feasible, then they would look at alternate sites for building the new school facility.

## TWO BOND ISSUES IN SPECIAL ELECTION

ANCHORAGE: Two Borough Bond issues, totaling thirteen million dollars will go to Borough voters in a special election Tuesday April 4th.

A 10,000,000 dollar bond issue is earmarked for completion of the Anchorage Area's Master Sewer program and to establish a revolving loan fund to provide lateral sewer lines for homes and businesses.

The second bond issue, for three million dollars will provide funds to purchase park land along a 4.5 mile stretch of Campbell Creek between Ft. Richardson military reservation and Diamond Blvd.

Since these bond issues will be backed by the full faith and credit of the borough, all qualified persons in the borough may vote in the April 4th election.

It is anticipated that most or all of the bond funds will be expended in the Anchorage Area.

**CHUGIAK IS TWENTY FIVE**

(Commemorating the 25th Anniversary of the Founding of Chugiak)

CHAPTER 14: February of 1947 slipped into March, as it did this year. Spring came on with nice warm days and with it came the beginning of the flow of settlers that was to increase and continue.

As soon as the snow was gone the Fetrow house began to go up at it's present location. At that time, Mile 19 was 1/2 mile farther north than it is now.

Vernon Halk started a small cabin at mile 20, where he later build Spring Creek Lodge.

Fred and Dorothy Hasekoester took a site adjoining that of Verne and just north of him. Hal Noggle settled on

the shore of Upper Fire Lake and built the house that now is the residence of the Tom Towne family.

The first fire in the community occurred on the 4th of July when a fire cracker thrown from a passing automobile lighted oil-soaked dry gas around the fuel drums for the Diesel generator at Fire Lake Lodge. In order to prevent the drums from exploding, holes were shot in them.

All the men in the area turned out to fight the fire and most on the lake side of the highway, covering little more than one acre.

Hal Noggle brought his D7 tractor down but the fire was under control by the time he arrived and it was not used.

Cloyce and Justine Parks began construction on the big log dining room that had long been

planned. It was built just north of the frame store known as Parkville, but burned to the ground a number of years ago.

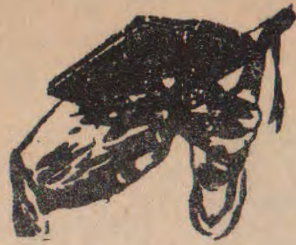


