EAGLE RIVER MAN SUFFERS FATAL HEART ATTACK

GOOSE BAY: Salvatore F. (Pete) Parillo, of Eagle River died of an apparent heart attack, suffered while riding a snowmachine near Goose Bay last Saturday.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, it was a heart attack which caused Parillo to lose control of the machine leading to an earlier report that his death was caused by a snowmachine mishap.

Parillo, who was employed as a pipefitter at Ft. Richardson, was born August 17 1934 at Amsterdam New York.

He has been an Alaskan resident since 1966.

dent). Vice President, Jim Simpson (student) Wendy McClellan (student), Bob Hildeman (student) and Leo Powell (parent.)

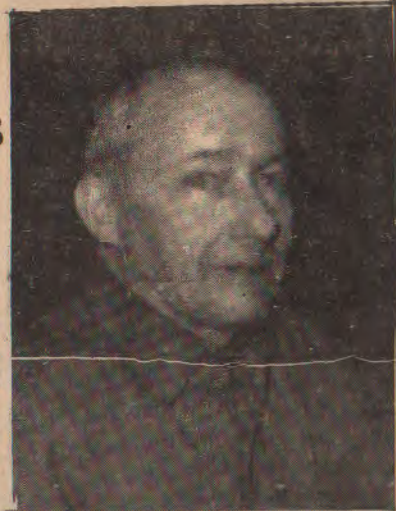

At this hearing the Borough Administration will propose an election in which the voters of Service Area 3, will be offered 3 choices, 1, to form a 1st class home rule borough, 2, to form a 2nd class borough, and 3 to reject both proposals and retain the present form of government.

Borough Chairman John Asplund hopes to be able to allow residents in the area outside of Service Area 23 to have the opportunity to make the same choices.

Running through the entire meeting was the shadow of doubt that any or all of the proposals were legal.

Assemblyman Walt Parker expressed strong doubts that any one area of the Borough could deny another area of that borough of government.

Three members of the Chugiak Area, who had asked to be heard at this meeting were granted permission to address the Assembly.

These three were O.W. (Bill) Lowe and Robert W. Robinson, both of Peters Creek, and Gerald O'Connor, of Eagle River.

In his remarks Lowe asked for the advisory election recommended by Chairman Asplund, with no legal questions. Simply asking the voters, "Do you want to unify?" and "What type of Government do you want?"

O'Connor stated that he felt the Chugiak-Eagle River Chamber of Commerce should have been contacted along with the Anchorage Chamber.

He said that the residents of this area had never been asked to help work out a unification plan although a number had indicated that they would like to help.

Robinson agreed with Lowe on the need for an advisory

CHUGIAK IS TWENTY FIVE

(Commemorating the 25th Anniversary of the founding of the Community of Chugiak

PART I: On 7 February, 1947 the community of Chugiak was born, though it did not even have a name at that time. Residents along the highway gathered together in the home of Paul Swanson to form a community club, whose purpose was to promote the community which was sure to grow here and to provide a social group.

Present at that first meeting were Paul and Margaret Swanson and their daughter Martha and son Steve; Cloyce and Justine Parks, Henning (Johnny) and Ruth Johnson, and their daughters Gail and Sherrie, Jim and Marie McDowell and son Bruce, Simon Media and his wife Bobbie and the latest arrivals on the highway, Les and Dottie Fetrow and son Larry.

Those not present but living on the highway at the time in-

cluded the owners of old F: Lake Lodge, and Pippels Mile 14 and the Glenn Bridge at mile 13. Dale Briggs was building his home, but had yet-moved into the community.

At this first meeting, the club was formed with Cloyce Parks as President. A committee was appointed to draw up by-laws for the club, which was to meet again within a month to adopt the by-laws as written. Refreshments were provided by the hosts, the Swansons.

There was no electricity in any home at that time, nor were there telephones. The only business along the highway was the old Fire Lake Lodge. Most of the homes within the area of Mile 19.

Traffic was extremely light, limited to not more than 3 cars per hour on a busy Sunday afternoon.

The Glenn Highway, more commonly known as the Palmer Highway, was hardly more than a two lane road, with gravel surface. It crossed Eagle River about half mile upstream from its present crossing, came down what is now known as Eagle River Rd. and wound serpent-like up Fire Lake hill, passing close to Upper Fire Lake, but not and wound serpent-like up Fire Lake hill, passing close to Upper Fire Lake, but not within view of Lower Fire Lake, which was concealed by the dense growth of brush.

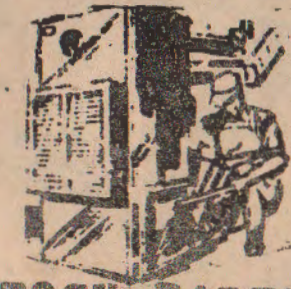

The clinic is open to all women in the area who have not recently had Papsmears.

The Pap smear is a simple, painless test that can detect cancer of the uterus in the earliest most curable stages.

According to the American Cancer Society, "Cancer of the Uterus is now third in rank among cancer killers of women."

The Health Department recommends yearly Papsmears on women until age 35. In women over 35, a test should be done every six months.

The clinic will be held on Tuesday, March 14th, 1978 from 10:00am until 12 noon.

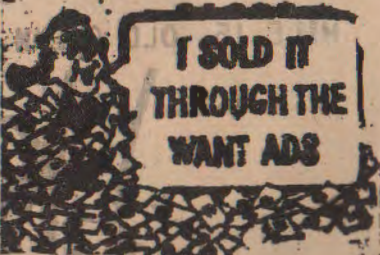
The raffle, sponsored by the Homemakers Club was to help
