HOPE DIM FOR LOCAL REPRESENTATION IN JUNEAU

CLIMATE A KEY FACTOR IN 12 MONTH SCHOOL PLAN

BIRCHWOOD: The Alaskan climate could very well be the key factor in the success of a 12 month school plan.

This was the consensus of opinion of the parents who attended the meeting held last Thursday at Chugiak High School.

The committee had been the last of a series called by the REFOCUS Committee in the areas served by Anchorage Borough High Schools.

REFOCUS Committee was appointed by the Anchorage Borough School Board to study among other things, the possibility of utilizing the schools 12 months of the year.

A number of possible plans were offered for discussion, however, the fact that a number of children would be on vacation during the months of

district in Minnesota was introducing such a plan, but there was no information on its success available as yet.

The meetings conducted by REFOCUS in other Anchorage Area High Schools had very poor attendance it has been reported.

Attendance at the Chugiak meeting was the highest of any of the schools.

REFOCUS will evaluate all of the input received at the meetings, and then prepare a questionnaire which will be sent home with all students in the district. They will make their recommendations to the school board based on the response to the questionnaire.



CHUGIAK: Hope for local representation in the State Legislature dimmed this week when Superior Court Judge Edward V. Davis turned thumbs down on Governor Egan's reapportionment plan.

Under that plan, the Greater Chugiak Area and a portion of Mt. View would have been able to elect four representatives and two senators.

The reapportionment matter has been turned back to the Governor for further action and resubmission.

The Governor has indicated that the matter would be appealed to the State Supreme Court, however, even if the plan is upheld, unless a ruling is handed down by the Supreme Court by May 31st, (deadline for registration for the primary election) the election would have to be conducted under the reapportionment plan of 1966.

Marlene Kayler, Election Supervisor for the Anchorage District said that she was confident that the population figures for this area were accurate and that the reapportionment would be held.

however, the fact that a number of children would be on vacation during the months of winter appeared to disturb many parents.

Other factors that would have to be considered in any deviation from the traditional summer vacation would be the effect on summer recreational and camping programs all of which would have to be adjusted to such a change.

It was pointed out that the use of the schools all year was not an economic measure. In fact it would probably cost more as additional teacher and maintenance personnel would be required. Also the change over would be an expensive operation. Such a change over in programming in Atlanta Georgia cost that area in the neighborhood of three million dollars.

The advantages in the 12 month school would have to be in improved study programs, etc.

Some advantages which were suggested were the opportunity for family vacations other than in the summer, reduced competition for student employment and reduction in the drop out rate and vandalism.

Disadvantages listed were the effect on extra-curricular activities and athletic programs and problems encountered for students transferring in and out of the school district.

The success of the plan in Atlanta was pointed out, however it was asked if such a plan had been tried in an area which experienced severe winters, such as in this area.

3 HURT IN COLLISION WITH CAMPER

EAGLE RIVER: Three persons were injured and required hospitalization following a collision between a camper pickup and a Mercury sedan at Artillery Road and New Glenn Highway last week.

The accident took place at approximately 5:00pm.

Few details of the accident are available, but it appeared that the pickup was Westbound on Artillery Road, and collided with the sedan which was Southbound on the Glenn.

The force of the impact caused the camper unit to be thrown completely from the pickup bed to land upside down on the pavement.

Injured in the accident were the driver and passengers of the passenger car, Mrs. Edity Oraurke and her daughter, and Lauren Medley. They were transported to the 5049 Air Force Hospital by the Eagle River Fire Company Ambulance, where they were treated for facial injuries.

The pickup bore a Louisiana license plate, and the driver said that he had arrived in Alaska only the Sunday before. He had been in Eagle River trying to locate trailer space. He remarked that the trip had been plagued with bad luck, as they had a little girl die on the way up.

7:00pm, with the meeting to start at 8:00pm.

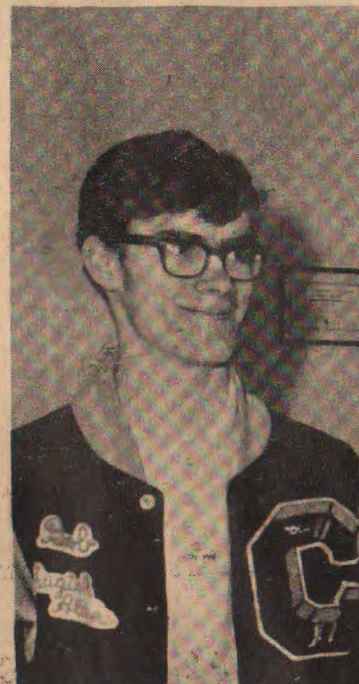

Bob is a member of the National Honor Society, plays the

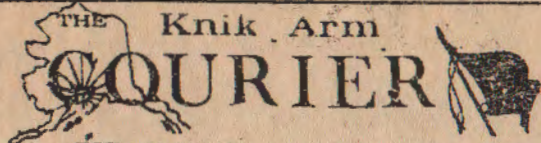
figures for this area were accurate and that the reapportionment would be upheld. She said that the only thing which might be overthrown was the designated seats.

CHUGIAK IS TWENTY FIVE

Commemorating the founding of Chugiak in 1947.

CHAPTER VII: Scouting activities in Chugiak prompts a review of Scouting in this history of the community.

Boy Scout activities began with a meeting at the home of Dale Briggs in 1951. By this time the community was only four years old.

Among those at the meeting were Dale Briggs, Bill Cairns "Chick" LeDeoux, Vern Haik Bill Stephens, Les Fetrow and Walt Williams of the Scout office.

Dale Briggs became the Committee Chairman. The Chugiak Community Club sponsored the Troop and their Institutional Representative was Les Fetrow. "Chick" LeDeoux was appointed Scoutmaster with Glenn Briggs, Mickey Briggs, Bill Cairns Jr., Dennis Christian and Jerry D. Fly as scouts.

Cub Scouts were a Den of the Salvation Army Pack of Anchorage. They included boys from Eagle River to Eklutna.

The first Girl Scout Troop was started by Dorothy Steeby in Birchwood. This troop later became the troop now in existence. The Brownie Troop was sponsored by the Chugiak Homemakers Club, with Cleda Stephens as leader.

In 1956 the Boy Scout Troop was split with the Eagle River Troop still sponsored by the Chugiak Community Club. In 1958 the Community Club was dissolved and no sponsor was available to take over the troop at that time.

The new Chugiak Troop was sponsored in it's first year by the Chugiak VFW Post. After that first year the sponsorship passed to the Chugiak Methodist Church.

At the same time the Salvation Army dropped the Chugiak Den of Cubs and the Chugiak Methodist Church assumed the sponsorship of a Pack.

Since the beginning of Scouting within the community there have been Brownie Troops and Girl Scout Troops established in Eagle River, in addition to those in Chugiak.

LOCAL VOICES RAISED ON LAND USE PLAN

BIRCHWOOD: A fair sized crowd of approximately 55 persons attended the meeting of the Planning Commission held at Chugiak High School last Wednesday night.

The Commission presented a proposed land use plan which contained certain revisions to the plan which they had shown at previous meetings held in the Greater Chugiak Area.

While a few local residents found the plan acceptable as presented, the majority voiced numerous objections.

A member of the Planning Commission stated that the Commission was disturbed by the negative attitude of some of the property owners.

It was pointed out that the maps were general, rather than specific, and that the areas designated for business had been revised to reflect a ratio. Eagle River residents still felt that the business area should be extended further to the north.

One obvious error which was pointed out was the designation of the CBA Property at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds as a business area. The grant under which that property was obtained from the Federal Government precludes it being used for business purpose.

It was pointed out that this plan is a part of a comprehensive plan for the entire borough.

When the Commission has completed further study, they will send the plan to the Borough Assembly with their recommendations. The completed plan will be then used as a guide in drawing up zoning ordinances.

The Commission will keep the records of that meeting open until April 26th for any written comments to be added to the record.

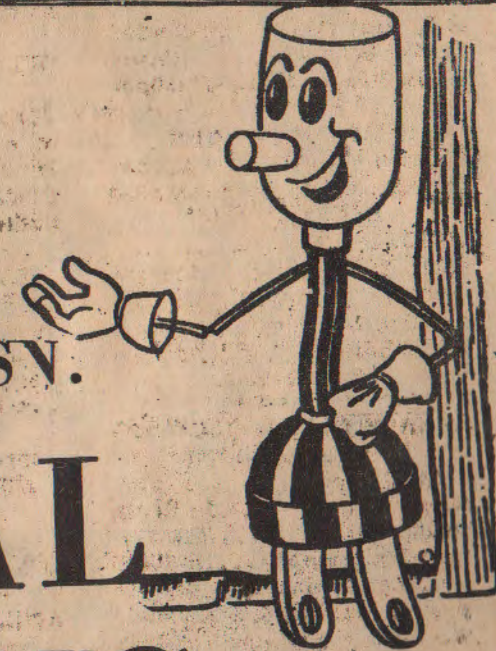
