COMMISSION GIVES NOD TO SCHOOL LAND EXCHANGE

WOMAN KILLED IN HIGHWAY WRECK

EAGLE RIVER: A young woman from Anchorage was killed outright in a two car collision which took place a Mile 15 on the New Glenn Highway last Saturday, May 6th.

The victim was Renee Yearsley, age 21 of 1302 32nd Avenue in Anchorage.

The accident took place approximately 3:15am, when Miss Yearsley was returning from Palmer. She had driven there to pick up a friend, Miss Kitty MacNeil, who had a singing engagement at Palmer.

Few details are available on the accident, but apparently the Volkswagon sedan which Miss Yearsley was driving collided with another car driven by Paul Smith of Was-

The motion came as the result of testimony heard at a public meeting held at the Chuglak Elementary School last night.

Robert Kallenberg, a member of the Planning Commission, and himself a resident of the Chuglak Area moved that the Commission uphold the action of the April 25th meeting of the school board at which time that body voted to approve the land swap.

The motion was amended to read that the Commission recommend that the present site not be used for the construction of the new school facility and that the CBA land be given concept approval pending the obtaining of tech-

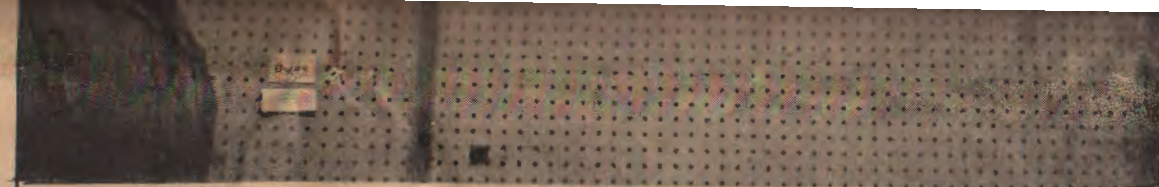

EVERYTHING "GO" FOR CLEAN-UP DAY

CHUGIAK: Everything is "Go", for Clean-up Day in the Greater Chugiak Area, with local organizations and individuals prepared to pick-up every scrap of litter along the public highways from Ft. Richardson to Eklutna.

Three trucks from the State of Alaska, as well as four trucks owned by Anchorage Refuse Company will be picking up the bags of trash which will be gathered from along the roadways by crews of volunteers and they will be taken to the Eagle River Sanitary Land Fill, which will be open all day on Saturday, May 13th for free dumping.

A number of local organizations are participating in the campaign and will cover all the roads in the following order. Eagle River Lions Club from the Ft. Richardson sign to Mile 15 1/2 intersection on the new Glenn Highway. Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts from Mile 15 1/2 on the New Glenn to Peters Creek. Chugiak Elementary School PTA, along the Old Glenn Highway from Peters Creek to the South

Birchwood Loop Road. Chugiak Lions Club, along the Glenn Highway from Peters Creek to Eklutna. The Knik Little League, along the old Glenn Highway from the Eagle River Shopping Center to Fire Lake Lodge. 7th and 8th grade students from Eagle River to Mile 15 1/2. 9th graders, Eagle River Campground and South Fork and Hilland Road. Birchwood Elementary PTA, Birchwood Loop Road.

Older members of the Boy Scouts and the Knik Little League will pick-up along the Eagle River and Eagle River Loop Roads.

Pick-up stations for trash will be located at Halfway House and Peters Creek Service in Peters Creek; at the Chugiak Senior Center, Spring Creek Lodge, Moosehorn and Wheeler-In in Old Chugiak; at Ray Gays at Mile 16 in Fire Lake; at Lions Club Park, Eagle River Theater and Tusk's in Eagle River, at the Eagle River Inn and the Ice Palace on Hilland Road and at Thunderbird Falls.

In Birchwood the pick-up points will be at the Birchwood Elementary School, at MTA Exchange building at the Bob Armstrong residence and at Reuters Apartments.

All State and Anchorage Refuse trucks will be authorized to distribute tickets to youngsters picking up trash. One ticket will be given for each bag of trash filled. The children will then deposit half of each ticket at their schools to be drawn for prizes listed elsewhere in the Courier.

The trucks will also accept trash gathered from non-public roads and private yards. This may be brought to the closest pick-up station.

A number of private individuals will be assisting in the pick-up with their personal vehicles. All pick-up vehicles from the state and from Anchorage Refuse will be radio dispatched. Hugo Osterhaus will act as dispatcher and can be reached at 694-2220.

State and Anchorage Refuse vehicles will distribute free Pepsi and Coke to crews who are engaged in the pick-up. Ambulances from both the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies will be

pending the obtaining of technical information such as the availability of water and sewer facilities on site and the legal transfer of the land.

The matter now goes to the Borough Assembly for their final decision.

Approximately 50 local residents attended the meeting and presented their reasons for recommending the land swap to the Commission.

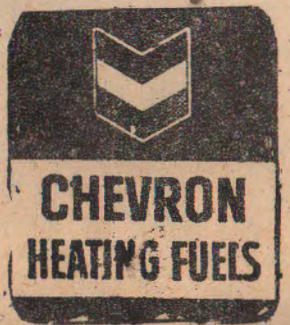

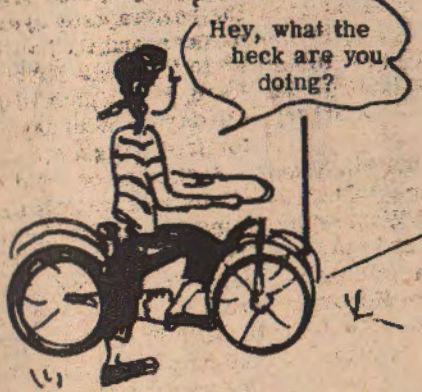

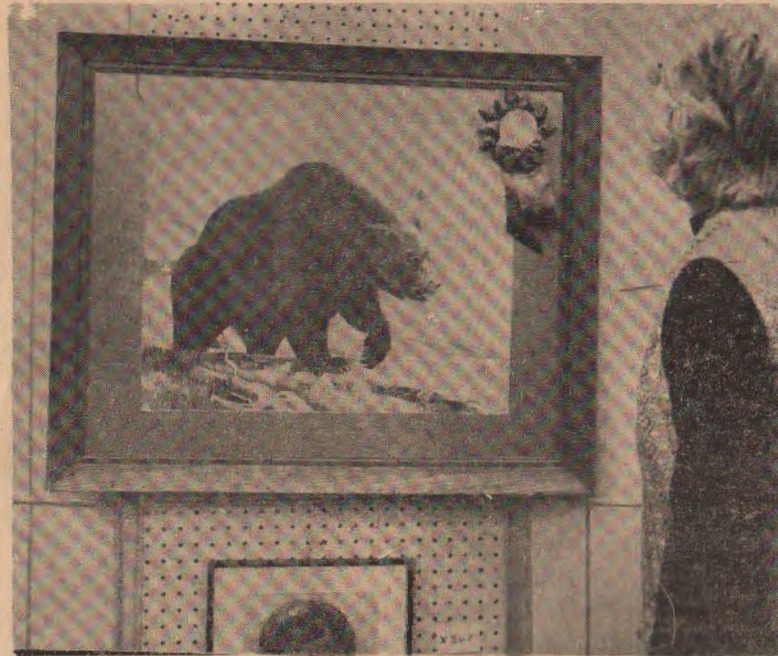

MANY ATTEND WHITEHORSE MEET

WHITEHORSE Y.T.: Last weekend in Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada, the attention of 1,103 people was turned to the problems of individual survival at this time when nations are threatening a collision course.

R.G. Ronco, branch supervisor for the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society in Alaska and the Yukon, was the principal speaker at the circuit convention of Jehovah's Witnesses.

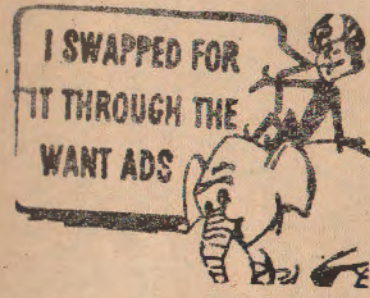

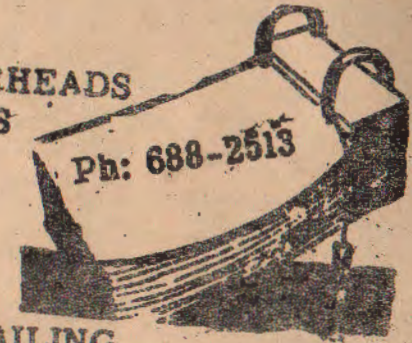
