Willis was particularly un happy that the Assembly wa: not given an opportunity to review the complete minutes of the Planning Commission Hearing held at Chugiak last week. It was as a result of testimony presented at this hearing that the Commission made their recommendation that the Carnival Grounds site be given concept approval for the school location.

It has been held by both Willis and Kallenberg that the reasons listed for opposing the site are based on inaccurate and false information.

Willis feels that inspite of the fact that the motion to accept the recommendation of the Planning Commission was defeated 7 to 3, there is still hope of salvaging the exchange.

Assemblyman Garrigues had moved that the present site of the Chuglak Elementary School be retained for the construction of the replacement facility. Assemblyman Parker moved to table the discussion until next week. Willis said that when the matter is brought up again, he will ammend the motion to read that the Carnival Ground land be considered.

In the meantime, Willis has asked both Asplund, and Bob Morris, Borough Staff Director to come out to Chugiak sometime during the intervening week and inspect both the present Chugiak Elementary School site and the land being offered by CBA at Chugiak Carnival the Grounds.

ANDY KIRK NAMED FOR SPECIAL HONOR






LADIES CLUB HOLDS MEETING


Brady started running at 72m and arrived back at Hope City at 11:15am. Although he was sixth overall to finish, it was pointed out that the first three were on roller skates.


