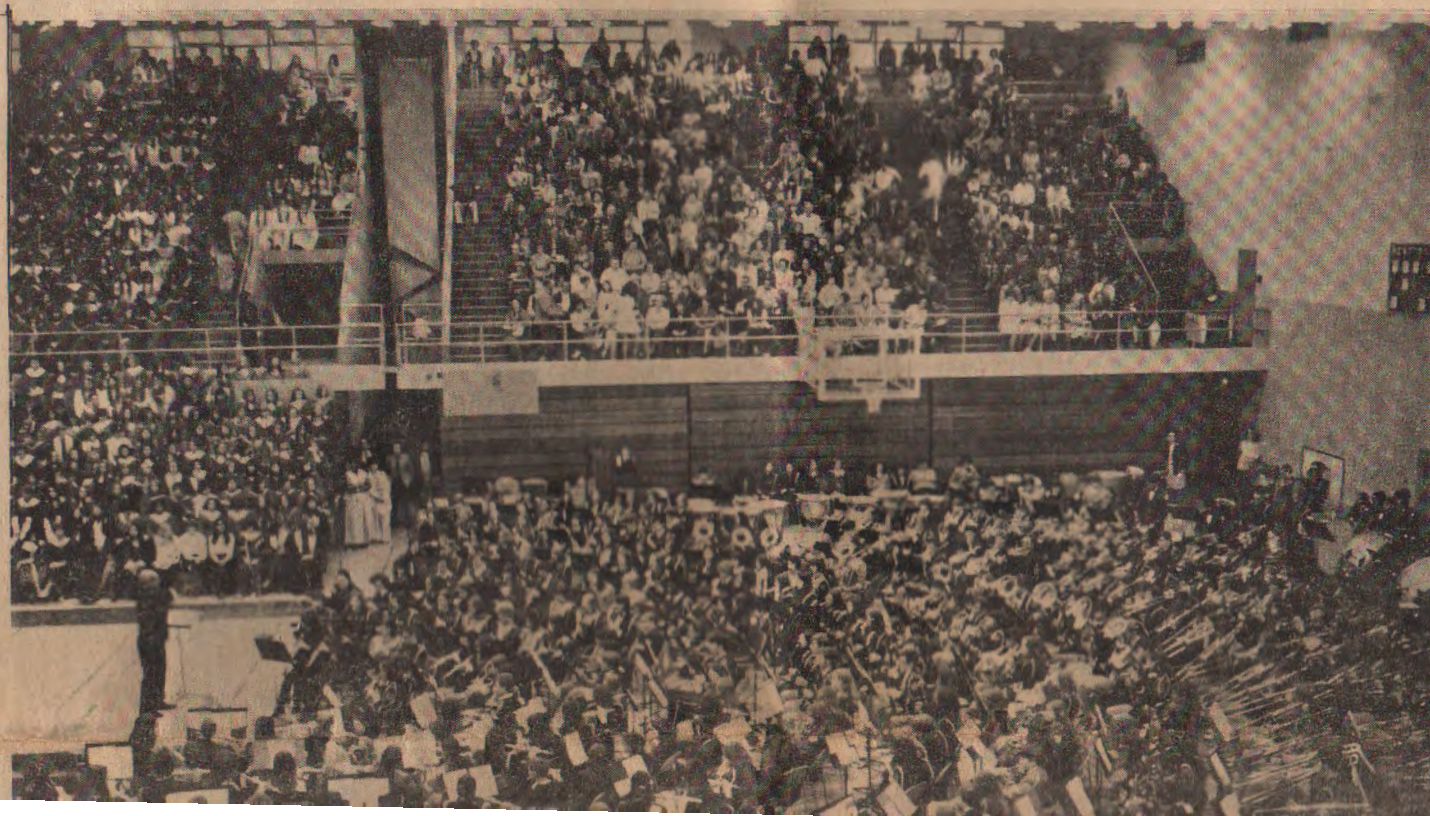
ART SHOW THIS WEEKEND

BIRCHWOOD: The Sixth Annual Spring Art Show will open Friday, May 5th at 10am at Chugiak High School.

Sponsored by the Chugiak Ladies Club, the event will commemorate the 25th Anniversary of the Founding of Chugiak with the theme of Early Alaska.

The show will feature the works of adult as well as junior artists from the local area, from Anchorage and Palmer as well as the Military Bases.

OLD CHUGIAK: The Borough Planning Commission has called a Public Hearing to be held on Tuesday, May 9th to discuss the proposed swap of the present site of the Chugiak Elementary School for equal acreage at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds.

The meeting will be held at the Chugiak Elementary School, if available, starting at 7:30pm.

This hearing was called as a result of a motion at the Borough Assembly meeting last Monday night when that group was called to act upon a recommendation by the school board that the land exchange be approved.

The school board at their April 25th meeting had voted to accept the offer to exchange land based on an engineering study which showed that the cost of removing the hill behind the present school would be excessive.

When the recommendation was brought before the Assembly, it was brought out

The show is held in the team teaching room at the school. No admission is charged.

ASSEMBLY OKAYS PURCHASE OF BROADWATER BLDG.

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Assembly last Monday, un-animously approved the purchase of the Broadwater Building in Eagle River to be converted to a Community Center for the Greater Chugiak Area.

The only change in the original proposal was made on a substitute motion by Assemblyman Rose which concerned the manner in which the purchase would be funded.

The original proposal called for the purchase and remodeling of the building to be paid for from the Borough Land Trust Fund. Rose said that since that fund was earmarked for areawide purposes, he felt the purchase should be financed by a private lending agency at interest not to ex-

ceed 8%.

The repayment of this loan would not be by a mill levy to local taxpayers, but rather from rentals from agencies utilizing the offices.

The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company will be using 5,000 square feet of the building for a fire hall, also the GOAL Center, the Public Health Nurse and other Borough Offices would contribute toward the rental. Also the Owl Cafe would continue to lease that portion of the building.

The cost of the building to Broadwater is \$115,000 plus an estimated \$100,000 for repairs and remodeling.

The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company already had set aside \$35,000 for the purpose of constructing a new Fire

Hall.

The remainder would be repaid to the Borough at the rate of \$21,500 per year for a period of 10 years.

ELEMENTARY MUSIC FESTIVAL TONIGHT

BIRCHWOOD: The three local Elementary Schools will participate in a music festival to be held tonight, Wednesday, May 3rd at 7:30pm in the Chugiak High School gym.

The festival will feature a combined chorus composed of

4th, 5th and 6th grade students from the Chugiak, Eagle River and Birchwood Elementary Schools.

This is the first time that the local grade schools have conducted their own music festival. In past years they have participated in the music festivals which included students from Anchorage area schools, and were held first at East High and later at West.

Music teachers at each of the three schools have been working individually with their groups, and a combined rehearsal has been held.

The program will feature a group of songs from "The Sound of Music", these are Do Re Mi, Edelweiss, and the Sound of Music. Also on the program is "Born Free", "The Impossible Dream", from the Man from La Mancha, "Tamale Joe", and "Try to Remember". The finale will be "Let There Be Peace on Earth".

Briggs said that no determination has been made as yet which portion of the Carnival Grounds land would be exchanged with the Borough in the event that the swap is eventually approved.

The home of Fred and Dorothy Hasekoster was selected as the place for the service.

Those who attended included all of the members of the Community Club. Rev. Rosignol conducted the worship service at 6:00am. Singing for the service was accompanied by a guitar.

This community breakfast became an annual Easter event in the years following and for several years it was prepared by the Chugiak Homemakers Club. Rev. Rosignol's work in the community resulted in the Chugiak Chapel the first church in the community with Rev. Wilburn Craig as the first pastor.

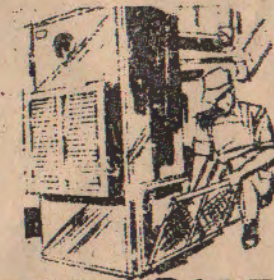

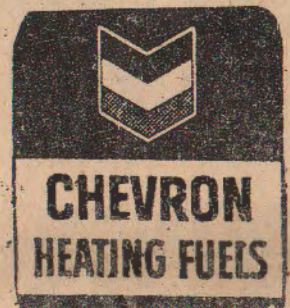

The cause of the fire has not been determined. Miss Smith was able to escape from the car without injury.

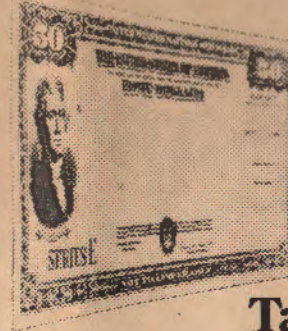
