CBA MEMBERSHIP TO MEET ON LAND SWAP

OLD CHUGIAK: The Board of Directors of the Chugiak Benefit Association voted last night to accept the terms of the land exchange for the Chugiak Elementary School, subject to the approval of the general membership of CBA. This approval will be sought at a CBA General Membership meeting to be held on Friday, June 2nd, at the Chugiak Elementary School.

The meeting will begin at 8:00pm, and all members of CBA are urged to attend.

To be eligible for membership of the Chugiak Benefit Association, one must have been a resident of the Greater Chugiak Area (Eagle River, Fire Lake, Birchwood Old Chugiak, Peters Creek and Eklutna) for 30 days or longer and be age 13 or older.

Membership is automatic for anyone meeting the above qualification and this includes the privilege of voting at any CBA General Meeting.

Dale Briggs, President of the Chugiak Benefit Association recommended that the terms of the GAAB Assembly be accepted with the following reservations:

That the Community is not to

be deprived of the free use of this area under this "School-Park concept". That the commitments made to the Rodeo Association are to be honored.

That the tentative commitments to the different organizations in the community that have not been physically responded to are open to and negotiated location change, (meaning for instance, the tennis courts have not been built nor has any money been spent on the location so a change of location would not work a financial hardship on anyone.)

That any change in the location of any existing facilities, the ball diamond for instance, must be made by the Borough. The facility itself cannot be eliminated.

In the original land exchange offer, CBA had offered an acre for acre swap for the land presently occupied by the Chugiak Elementary School. This comprises approximately 14 acres. In the proposal by the Borough Assembly, the Borough asks for the entire parcel of land contained in the Carnival Grounds complex, approximately 25

acres.

Briggs stated that the fact that the Borough has thrown this imbalance of acreage (25 to 14), CBA is justified in protecting the rights of the residents of the community in the use of the park portion of the "Park-School" area.

Briggs observed that the Borough might grumble about these reservations, but that they themselves opened the question when they changed the original acre for acre swap with no strings attached.

The acreage the Borough is negotiating for is the 25 acres contained in the triangle formed by the two highways and North Birchwood access. This does not include the portion of CBA land occupied by the Chugiak Senior Center.

The CBA Board hopes that sufficient CBA members turn out for the meeting to form a quorum. It is imperative that the matter be resolved at this early date in order to be able to get work underway on the new school this construction season.

PETITION SEEKS TO PROHIBIT PARACHUTING

PETERS CREEK: A petition which asks that the sport parachute club which has been jumping at Oberg's field in Peters Creek be prohibited from using that area has been circulated.

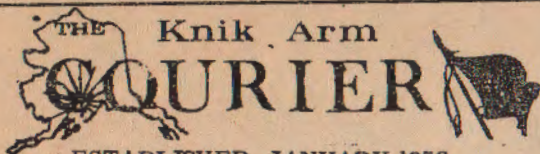
Russell Oberg, owner of the property which the Para-Angels have been using said that he received a Xeroxed copy of the petition in the mail.

Oberg said that he has no way of knowing who mailed him the copy as the envelope had no return address. Nor has he any idea to which agency the original copy of petition was simply addressed to "Gentlemen".

The person or persons who drew up the petition complained of several things.

They stated that the road used by the jumpers and the spectators was one which the local children had to use to reach the school bus, and felt that the jumpers and the traffic they brought on the road created a danger to the children walking to and from the school bus. Oberg pointed out that the Para-Angels only jump on weekends and occasionally in the evening during the summer. At which time there would be no children walking to catch

the bus.
The petitioners also stated that the jumpers and the spectators had made the road impassable by driving over it during the break-up. Oberg said that this road had been impassable almost every spring since it was built. In fact he said, some of his neighbors who signed the petition have in past years parked their cars on his property when they were unable to drive in, and many times they had come to him when they had become stuck and he had pulled them out with his tractor at no charge. Oberg said, in fact, he has kept the road clear of snow every winter at no charge to his neighbors.

Another complaint of the petitioners was the noise of the airplane used to carry the jumpers aloft. Oberg said that the plane makes far less noise than the snow-machines and motor cycles which roar down the road and through his fields day and night all year long. He said that he and his family have been awakened at 2am in the winter by snow-machines

ow. He said that the plane does not pass over any homes when taking off or landing. Also a beef of the petitioners is that Oberg is conducting a commercial operation. Oberg explained that the Para Angels are a non-profit group. He said that had offered to let them use his field in the same spirit that he has supported other recreational activities in the community. Year after year he has kept the Babe Ruth Field near his home maintained, as well as the Little League Diamond. He said that the Club had offered to pay him a token of \$20 per month to defray the cost of maintenance of the airstrip and the jump zone, but that he had never asked them for any money. Oberg believes that this group of high principled, clean-living young people should be encouraged. Members of the club are not permitted to use alcohol or to smoke, and could very well serve as an example to the youth of the community, he said.

He also pointed out that the Para-Angels had not been approached by any of the signers of the petition. The club had complied with all FAA

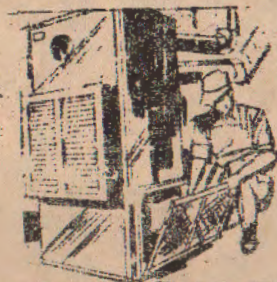

NO INJURY WHEN CAR HITS BERM

uated the Anchorage Head Start program and the combined Head Start-Day Care Enrichment programs of the Chugiak Children's Services at the Parent-Child Center in the United Methodist Church of Chugiak.

The official report has not yet been returned, but the team's reaction to the CCS programs was enthusiastic, so much so that an invitation was issued to Dr. Edward Zigler, Director of the Office of Child Development, to visit the Chugiak program.

Dr. Zigler has been a strong advocate of expanding the scope of Head Start through new and innovative programs in the area of day care, more outreach activities in the community and "high school training for parenthood, among others.

Chugiak Children's Services a non-profit corporation that grew out of the Head Start parents' policy group, was established for that purpose, and currently sponsors Head Start, day care and pre-school enrichment programs, a cooperative training program with Chugiak High School's Child Development, Bachelor Arts and On The Job Training classes offering OJT practicum positions for five students, and Adult Basic Education classes for the Greater Chugiak Area.

Head Start and Enrichment classes ended May 19th, with Day Care continuing throughout the summer.

A series of 6 summer recreation Day Camps will be offered June 12 - August 18, at the Parent-Child Center.

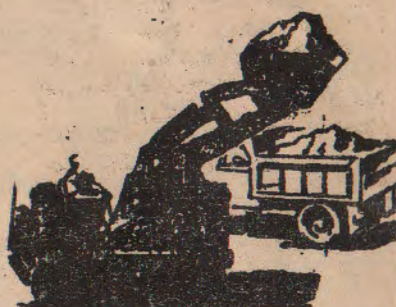

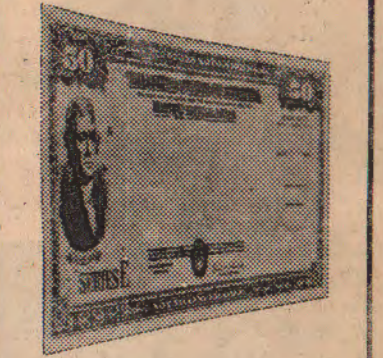

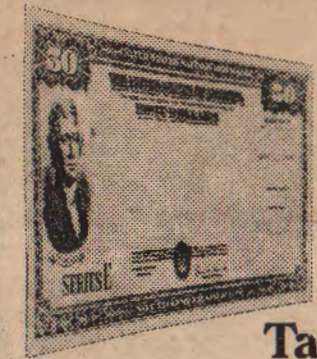
