OLD CHUGIAK: The Board of Directors of the Chuglak Benefit Association has been instructed to discuss terms of a land swap with the Borough School District by those attending a General Membership meeting of CBA last Friday night at the Chuglak Elementary School.

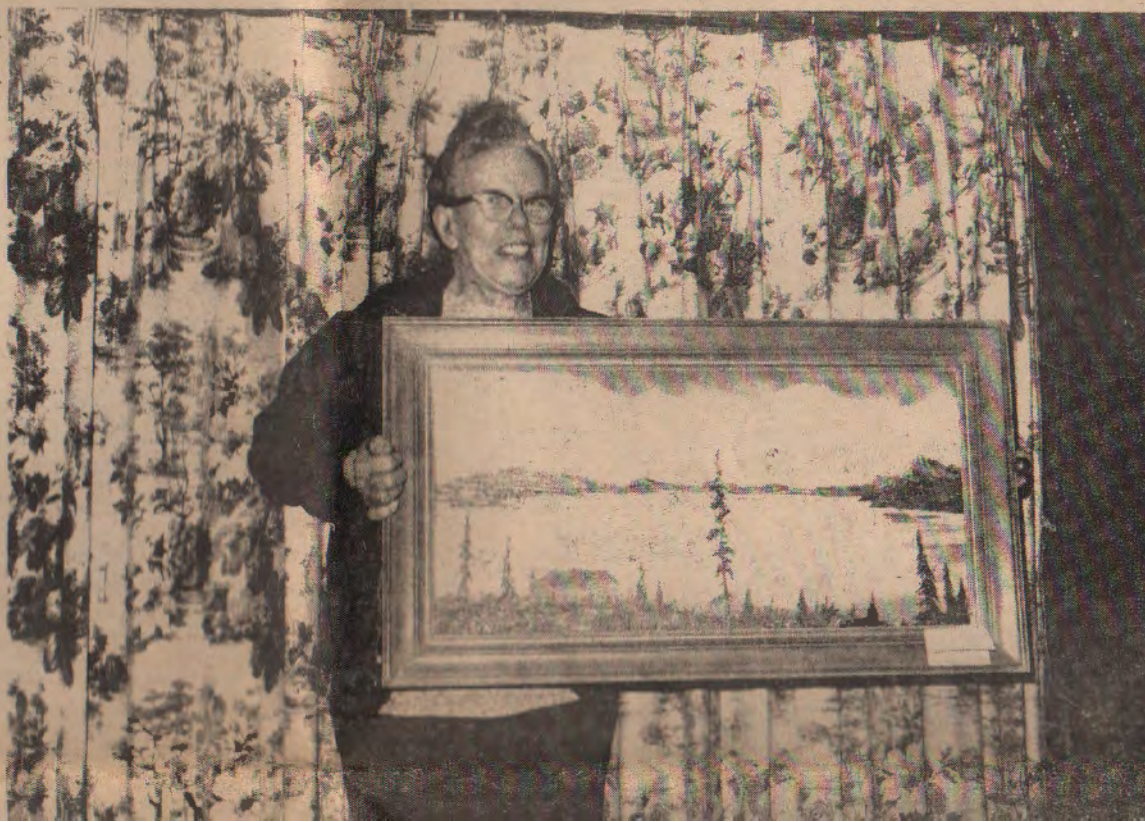
The Borough Assembly had voted to accept an offer made by CBA to exchange land at the Mile 21 Carnival Grounds for that presently occupied by the Chuglak Elementary School, along with the buildings thereon.

to approve the concept of a land exchange, and instructed the Board of Directors to meet with the Borough and try for an acre for acre swap.

CHUGIAK: The local Chamber of Commerce has signed the franchise which would authorize this community to participate in the Alaska Scholarship Pageant Inc. to select a candidate for the title of Miss Alaska in the State wide contest.

Mrs. Betty Gaston, of the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company had made the initial inquiries into local participation, and had met with the Chamber to ask if they would act as the sponsoring organization for the pageant.

As the sponsoring group the Chamber would, in name, be responsible for conducting the pageant, and for underwriting the \$250.00 scholarship which the winner of the local pageant would receive.

Mrs. Gaston plans to call a public meeting of all interested individuals and organizations and from among these elect a Board of Directors, officers and committees.

The Borough Assembly had modified the terms of the proposed swap by asking for the entire 25 acres at the Carnival Grounds, instead of the 14 acre (acre for acre) exchange that CBA had offered.

Some of the membership felt that CBA should stick to their guns, and offer only the 14 acres as in the original proposal, while others feared that unless CBA gave the borough all the acreage they asked for, they (the Borough) would back out of the deal and build the new school on the present site (undesirable because of inadequate water and drainage.)

There were some who felt the whole deal should be rejected. The reason given for this was that the school buildings, which would become the property of CBA would prove so expensive to maintain that CBA could go broke in a very short time.

It was pointed out that at the time that CBA originally proposed the exchange it was expected that the buildings could serve as a community center, and numerous groups and agencies would rent parts of the building, helping to defray the cost of upkeep. Since that time, the Borough voted to purchase the Broadwater Building in Eagle River, to be converted to a community center. This, it was pointed out, diverted most of the potential tenants that CBA had been counting on.

This argument failed to deter most of the membership, who felt that even though it might be a gamble, it was still a worth while one.

After several motions were put to a vote and failed to pass the membership finally voted

CPPP WINS PARK BOUNDARY CHANGE

EAGLE RIVER: The organization known as the "Citizens for the Protection of Private Property," came away from a meeting with Commissioner of Natural Resources, Charles Herbert, the winners of the battle to retain the right to have free use of their own land.

Members of CPPP own land which is within the boundaries of the recently formed Chugach State Park, and would have been subject to restrictive regulations which were proposed.

Although CPPP came to the meeting at the Ice Palace last week "loaded for bear", they gained their victory without having to fire a single shot.

Commissioner Herbert agreed that the proposed regulations were not fair to those homesteaders who had filed on their land prior to the creation of the Chugach State Park. Boundaries would be definitely revised to exclude the inholdings on the Park perimeter.

The several inholdings which were completely surrounded by Park land could not be excluded, it was pointed out, but the regulation covering "incompatible use" could be revised.

It was the regulation concerning incompatible use which had caused the homesteaders to become fired up in the first place.

These regulations, had they gone into effect would have exercised the same restrictions on private property as they would have on public park lands; such as cutting timber, or grazing domestic animals without a permit. Neither could they sell or sub-divide their property nor build more than one single family dwelling, no matter how large the land parcel.

CPPP had acquired a war chest of over \$1,000 by asking members to pledge 50¢ per acre for land they owned, and had hired Charles Tulin an Attorney to represent them.

The members then fired off a barrage of letters to Governor Egan, calling his attention to the situation.

This action got prompt response, and Commissioner Herbert appeared at the second meeting of CPPP along with Ted Smith, Director of the Division of Parks, to bring the homesteaders the welcome news.

Joe Janke, a homesteader on the South Fork of Eagle River, and the Chairman of CPPP, said that the organization is not going to disband at this time.

He feels that it should continue to exist as a watchdog to keep tabs on the situation.

The group (CPPP) will meet again on Monday, June 12th, and make plans to attend the public hearing at Grant Hall at AMU in Anchorage on June 14th. This hearing had been scheduled for some time, along with hearings at Juneau and Fairbanks to discuss the proposed changes in Park regulations.

In addition to the above hearings, new hearings concerning the proposed boundary changes would be held in Eklutna, Eagle River and Girdwood, Mr. Smith and Mr. Herbert stated.

All Clubs and Organizations will be urged to send a representative to this meeting. The interested public is also urged to attend.

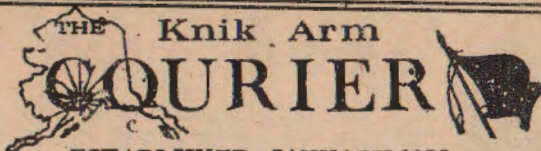
PARADE COMMITTEE MEETS TONIGHT

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company will present approximately 300,000 Betty Crocker coupons to the Delta Junction Fire Company to help that organization in its efforts to acquire a new Fire truck.

The Chugiak Fire Co. has been collecting the coupons for the past few years in an effort to earn a fire truck of their own.

When it was learned earlier this year that the Greater Anchorage Area Borough (which supports the local Fire Co. through a Fire Service District) was going to buy the new Fire Truck for Chugiak, the local volunteers voted to give the coupons they had collected to the Delta Junction Fire Company, which has no public tax support.

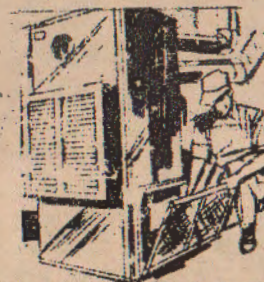

MTA REORGANIZES STAFF

A reorganization of Matanuska Telephone Association's administrative structure has been announced by the board of directors. Through the new line-up, Max Clements, MTA general manager, told the board, he hopes for improved maintenance and better quality control in all the MTA plants.

The regrouping created two new management positions, plant superintendent and superintendent of transmission facilities, upgraded the existing position of material controller, and created three new foreman positions at Eagle River, Palmer and for the central office equipment.

New plant superintendent is Ben Wattum, who will have overall responsibility for the association's plant maintenance. He has been employed

with MTA for 13 years. He lives in Palmer with his wife, Muriel, and three children, Lennie, Scott and Katie.

Joe Moreland, as supervisor of transmission facilities, will head the testing and maintenance of the Eagle River microwave facility, all carrier systems, physical trunks, subscribers loops and special circuits. Moreland's most recent position was with IIT Arctic Services. He, his wife Dorene and son Rocky live on Wasilla Lake.

The existing material controller position was upgraded to management level and Hal Chance will assume these duties. He has been employed with MTA for 16 years. His most recent position was related to inventory control. He and his wife, Gladys, live in Palmer.

The three new foreman positions were created by MTA to give each more authority and responsibility in his particular field.

The three are Galen Johnson, Palmer foreman; Larry Taylor, Eagle River foreman; and Leon Kuhn, central office equipment foreman. All are long-time MTA employees.

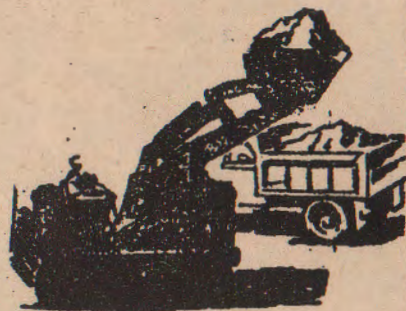
