SCHOOL BOARD TO AWARDS BID TO DRILL WELL ON

CHAMBER MEETING WITH MTA A RE-RUN OF FORMER SESSIONS

EAGLE RIVER: The meeting Monday night of the local Chamber of Commerce with representatives of the Matanuska Telephone Association was to all appearances a re-run of previous get togethers between the Chamber and MTA, with Chamber members complaining of poor service, dialing problems, outages and other related gripes and MTA blaming shipping difficulties, lack of qualified personnel, rapid growth of the area, RCA, FCC, the Anchorage Telephone exchange, the military exchanges, lack of sufficient funds etc. for their problems.

CBA LAND

OLD CHUGIAK: The Anchorage drilling firm of Jones and Young Drilling Company were the apparent low bidders and were awarded the contract to drill a well at the Chugiak Carnival grounds, the proposed site for the new Chugiak Elementary School.

The bid, not to exceed \$9,250 up to a depth not over 400 feet is to include casing and development.

A spokesman for the school board stated that while the bid is for a maximum of 400 feet they expect that the well should not have to be deeper than 100 to 150 feet.

Drilling is to commence immediately.

While the school board considers the proposed land exchange to be an accomplished fact, the Chugiak Benefit Association, administrators of the Carnival Ground prop-

chorage telephone exchange, the military exchanges, lack of sufficient funds etc. for their problems.

Attending the meeting were President of the MTA Board of Directors, Paul Huppert, Skip Coleman, Administrative Assistant to the Manager, Mr. Joe Moreland Transmission Facilities Superintendent and Ben Wattum Plant Superintendent. Also present in the dual role of MTA Board Member from the Greater Chugiak Area, and Secretary for the Chamber of Commerce was Robert Fleming.

MTA Manager, Max Clements was absent from the meeting because of a recent leg injury.

A perennial complaint of not being able to get through to Anchorage is being alleviated by the new micro-wave system recently installed in Eagle River. However, more trucks to Anchorage will not necessarily solve this problem until Anchorage gets more circuits, Moreland explained.

The delay in installing new phones was blamed on the summer construction season when work which can only be done when the ground is not frozen must be taken care of.

Coleman showed several growth charts which he had prepared which compared the growth of the system with the projected growth for several years.

Complaints of outages were blamed on incidents where contractors have cut through MTA's underground cables.

Huppert pointed out on the plus side that MTA has been able to hold the line on the cost of phone service, and that they have not had a rate increase even though costs have gone up. He warned that complaining to the Public Ut-

servicing will start at 8:00pm and continue until all the food has been sold.

He will have a variety of items consigned, including antiques, livestock, vehicles, house hold items, building materials etc.

Cline has conducted auctions in Arizona and Arkansas and is a member of the National Auctioneer's Association.

At present he is living in a mobile home at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds and will be there daily for anyone wishing to bring items to be sold at auction on consignment.

The lease with CBA calls for upgrading and making repairs to the Carnival Hall in lieu of payment of rent.

REAPPORTIONMENT TO STAND FOR THIS ELECTION

CHUGIAK: The much disputed re-apportionment plan proposed by the Alaska Supreme Court will hold, for this election at least.

This became apparent with the refusal of U.S. Supreme Court Justice Douglas to stay the decision of the State Court.

To residents of the Greater Chugiak Area this means that those living in the Old Chugiak, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Eklutna areas will be voting in the Mat-Su Legislative District, while the Eagle River and Fire Lake residents will vote with Anchorage Northeast.

This was designated as an "intermediate plan" and will be returned to the Governor's re-apportionment board to be reconsidered in accordance with the guidelines set by the State Supreme Court after the 1972 election.

Still pending is the Governor's appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. This appeal was based on the State Supreme Court's inclusion of the non-resident military population in determining the size of legislative districts.

Ed Willis, Borough Assem-

blyman from the Greater Chugiak Area, who has been heading up a group concerned with the splitting of the area said that his group will take whatever action is indicated by the decision of the U.S. Court. If they uphold the State in counting the military then the local group will continue to press for the alternate plan which they proposed when word of the reapportionment split first came to light.

This was to take the military population of Ft. Richardson, add it with the entire area from Eagle River through Eklutna and include all of this with the Mat-Su District. This, Willis said, would still meet with the one man one vote concept of the Supreme Court and give the Mat-Su District three legislative seats instead of the one which the present District is entitled to.

At the same time, Willis pointed out, it would keep intact the socio-economic area of this community.

Willis said this plan was brought to the attention of State Supreme Court Justice Robert Erwin at the time when the State Supreme Court

was still listening to appeals.

Justice Erwin promised to consider the plan, but instead it was ignored, Willis said.

This despite a statement made to the Anchorage press by one of the Supreme Court Justices that just such a plan would be a possible alternative.

Willis said it seemed as though they didn't want Mat-Su to benefit from the increased representation they would get by counting the military, but wanted to see it all go to the metropolitan Anchorage area.

Willis said that they would probably enlist the support of residents of Mat-Su to try to push this plan through if the State Supreme Court's verdict is upheld.

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While the school board considers the proposed land exchange to be an accomplished fact, the Chugiak Benefit Association, administrators of the Carnival Ground property, with whom the exchange is to be made have not yet made any official moves with the Bureau of Land Management toward asking approval of the swap.

Dale Briggs, President of CBA stated that until the question of whether an adequate water supply to operate a school can be obtained, neither CBA nor the school administration can be sure that the CBA land would be suitable for a school site. One of the principal reasons for moving the school is the lack of adequate water at the existing site.

Also, Briggs said, CBA is not sure what restriction the BLM would place on the utilization of the school buildings at the present school site which CBA would get in exchange for the Carnival Ground property. If the (CBA) should be prohibited from leasing any of the facilities to commercial establishments, then CBA would not be able to realize any return to enable them to maintain these buildings, and in that case might be forced to turn down the exchange concept.

Adding to the complications of the situation, a number of CBA members have circulated a petition protesting the land swap, and asking the BLM to rule against the exchange on the grounds that it violates the terms under which CBA was given title to the land. This was under a Federal grant and was to be used only for recreational purposes.

There has been an unconfirmed report of a second petition which states that CBA

FORMER CHUGIAK POSTMASTER SERVES ON STATE BOARD OF ED.

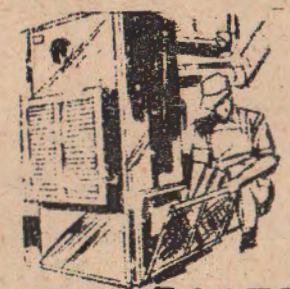

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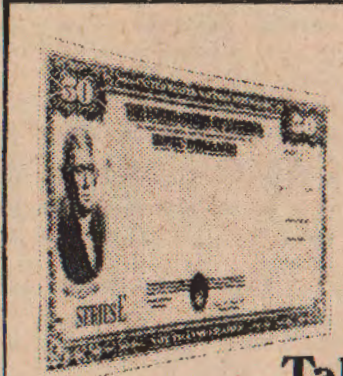

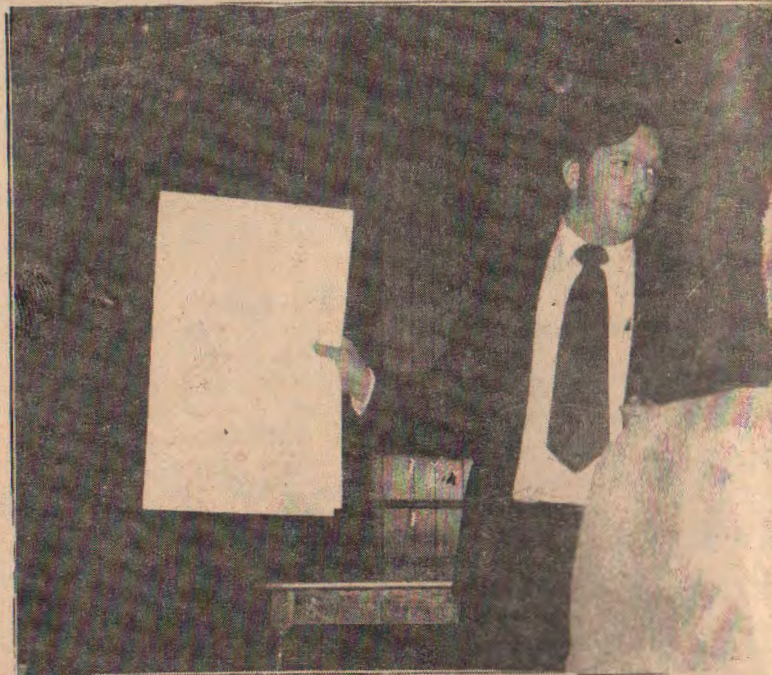

It is P.C. holding that if
MTA subscribers were im-
proved service, they should
be prepared to pay more for
it. A number of those at the
meeting immediately stated
that they would be willing to
pay a higher rate if it meant
better service. They said they
felt that lost business caused
by the inability to complete
phone calls would more than
compensate for any increase
in rates if the service was
improved.

Difficulty in obtaining ad-
equated financing for the an-
ticipated growth was quoted
by Huppert. He stated that
MTA was prepared to go to
the Telephone Bank which
charges 5% as compared with
the 2% charged by REA to meet
the 3.5 million dollar require-
ment that projected growth
of the system calls for.

The question of when calls
to the military bases would
no longer be toll calls was an-
swered the same as in the past
this was dependent on the
military to allow this, and at
present they were attempting
to put their phone systems out
to civilians on bid. When the
systems were bid out, then
MTA would negotiate with the
organization to whom the bid
was awarded. MTA is one of
the companies bidding for the
military contract, they said.

It was suggested that many
of the problems could be
solved if subscribers would
give MTA a detailed descrip-
tion of each trouble. Particu-
larly when a wrong number
is reached even though the
person has dialed correctly.

ASSEMBLY HAS EAGLE RIVER NIGHT

ANCHORAGE: Last Monday
was mostly "Eagle River
Night" for the Greater Anch-
orage Borough Assembly,
with three main items of busi-
ness concerning the sewers
in the Eagle River Area.

Approved by the Assembly
following a public hearing,
was proposed Assembly
Memorandum 72-276A, which
sets utility rates and rules in
the Eagle River system. A
monthly charge of \$7.00 for
operation and maintenance of
the system was set. This is
in follow up to a recent Pub-
lic Utilities Commission ruling.
This will be an interim
charge for approximately one
year. It was felt that as more
users come into the system
this will come down.

The second item was the
adoption of Ordinance 75-72
which establishes Service
Area 50 of the Greater Anch-
orage Area Borough. This is
the Administrative District
for the entire Eagle River
Valley. This for future ex-
pansion of trunks and laterals
as they are needed and will
not affect those who have not
petitioned to be in the Dis-
trict, according to local As-
semblyman Ed Willis.

An amendment to the ordi-
nance establishes that no one
can be charged an ad valorem
tax in the District.

Willis explained that the ad-
vantage of establishing a dis-
trict of this size is to enable
the Borough to plan for the fu-
ture and to put in at this time
lines which would be large
enough to take care of future
needs. This would eliminate

ROXANE NORTH IS CANDIDATE FOR SENATE

PALMER: A candidate to the
Senate from District D, which
now includes Old Chugiak
Peters Creek, Birchwood and
Eklutna, is Roxane Brooks
North of Palmer.

Mrs. North, who says that she
is running for office because
"the concept of 'government
of the people' has gone so far
from the 'by the people'
ideal".

"People are tired of politi-
cians telling them what is
good for them instead of ask-
ing what they want," she said.

Recently Mrs. North has
been involved with the forma-
tion and leadership of the
Matanuska Susitna Taxpayers
Association, started in protest
of what it feels is inequitable
taxation and spending im-
posed by the borough.

Mrs. North said the re-
sponse in this connection
from borough officials has
been that local government is
powerless because the prob-
lem comes from Juneau. "I
want to go to Juneau", she
said, "first to verify this,
and then to solve the prob-
lem".

Mrs. North is a four year
resident of the Palmer area,
and lives with her farmer-
carpenter husband, Cedric
North on Scott Road.

This district was petitioned
for by more people than any

She is a farmer, housewife,
horsewoman and motor-
musher. Mrs. North holds a
bachelor of science degree
and a teacher's certificate
from New York State.

She was twice general chair-
man of the Colony Days cel-
ebration and started the em-
ergency citizen's band radio
club in Palmer, now operating
as part of the national REACT
network.

She also worked toward a
teen center in the area some
time ago, and set up the flood
disaster station at Swanson
School in Palmer last August.

Mrs. North also writes a col-
umn in the Palmer Frontiers-
man on horses.

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Moreland described how the micro wave system from Eagle River to Anchorage is the first of its kind to be used in the United States. He said that when it is in complete operation it would bring 14 more circuits into operation. This would benefit subscribers in the Chugiak exchange by making the circuits available to them, and also benefit those in the Eagle River exchange by freeing up circuits now being used to carry Chugiak calls. He said that the circuits should be ready to cut in about 10 days. This would be an increase from 32 to 96 circuits.

Another improvement which was mentioned was that in the future phones would continue to operate even when there was a power outage. MTA has installed an auxiliary power generator which cuts in automatically when the power is off.

One problem which they promised to try to solve was the difficulty in reaching the information operator for directory assistance. They will attempt to get more information trunks to the Anchorage operator, and if this fails to relieve the problem, then they will look into hiring an information operator for the local system.

enough to take care of future needs. This would eliminate the need to put in pumping stations at a future date, and would enable them to utilize a gravity flow and the present lagoon treatment system.

The third item of local interest was the adoption of Ordinance 3472, which establishes and designates Trunk sewer improvement District 50.

This extends from the end of the present district to approximately Eagle River Loop along the Eagle River Road.

This district will be established later as the need arises, Willis said.

State Has Loaned Some \$2.7 Million To 1,550 Students

JUNEAU, Alaska
The State Department of Education has loaned a total of \$2.7 million to nearly 1,550 Alaskan students, Gov. William A. Egan's office says.

A spokesman said the loans, made to students having at least two years residency for enrollment in career or technical education programs, colleges and universities, constituted 90 per cent of the \$3 million authorization approved by the 1972 legislature.

So far, the spokesman said, 1,700 applications have been made.

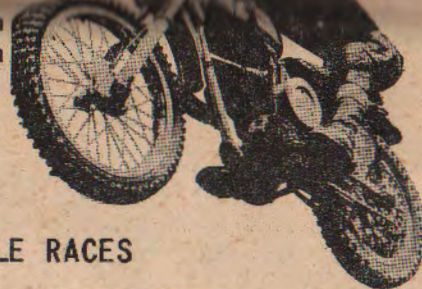

At a meeting Saturday in Fairbanks, the board voted 5-2 to postpone consideration of a tuition raise until next year. The hike had been suggested as a way of meeting a budget imbalance created by vetoes in the operating budget by Gov. William Egan.

The regents did establish a parking fee and increased the health fee at the Fairbanks campus.

The regents did not adjourn their meeting Saturday as expected, but recessed to some time in the next two weeks when university administrators will have completed a budget review and prepared a revised operating budget for approval by the regents.

The only guidance the regents gave the administration, in addition to deciding not to increase tuition, was a direction to maintain "excellence" while revising the budget.
