CHAMBER TO SPONSOR MEET THE CANDIDATE NIGHT

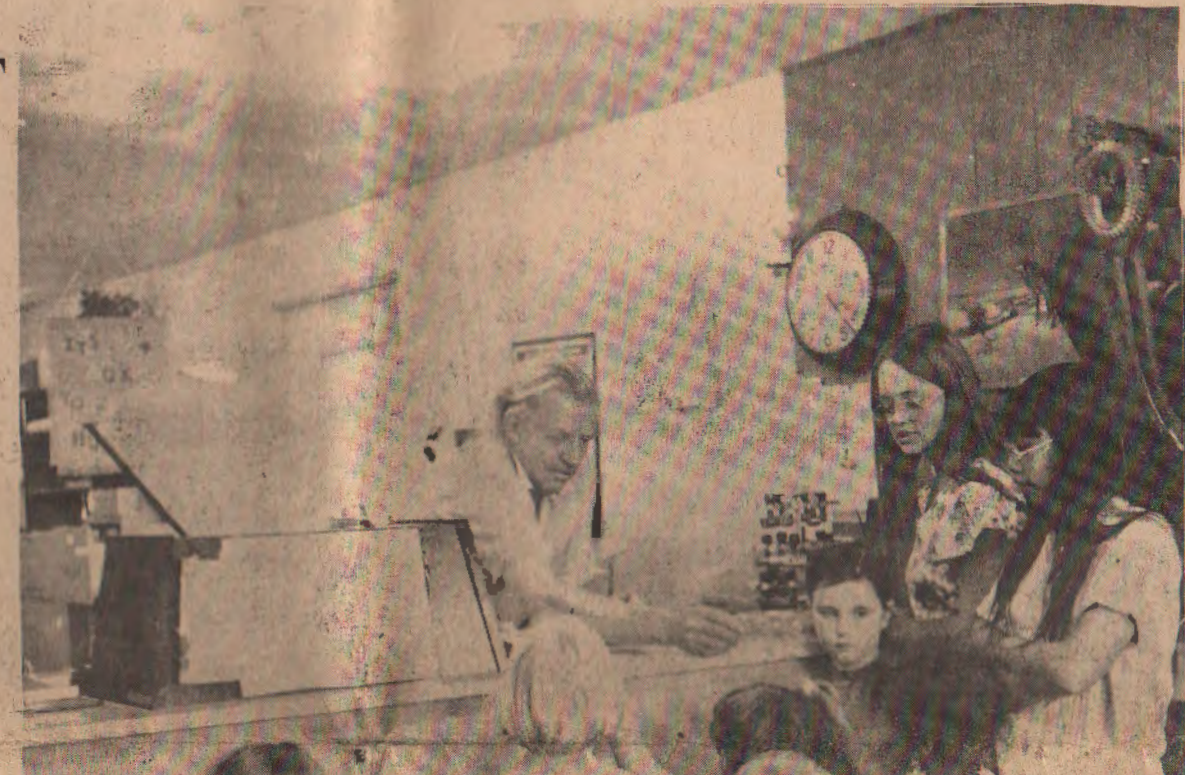

PALMER: The Board of Directors of the Matanuska Telephone Association voted not to honor a petition asking that the by-laws be changed to permit voting at an annual membership meeting by mail.

The petition had been presented by Gerald O'Conner, of Eagle River, and bore the signatures of a number of the local subscribers.

Voting by mail is permitted under state law, providing the by-laws of the cooperative allow it.

Max Clements, manager of MTA, explained the reason for the board's decision was based on the fact that the mailing to the membership on the Annual meeting had already been sent out, and it would have required a special mailing to bring this proposed change to the by laws to the attention of the membership.

The Board voted instead to appoint a committee to review

NO INCREASE IN TAXES SEEN IN BORO TAKE OVER OF FIRE CO.

EAGLE RIVER: No increase in the tax rate is foreseen following the take over of the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company by the Borough Fire Department, according to Borough Fire Chief Bagley.

Responsibility of providing fire protection and ambulance service for the area fell to the Borough Fire Department when the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company voted not to renew their contract with the Greater Anchorage Area Borough last week.

Chief Bagley said that the reason given for this was the lack of sufficient personnel and time to serve the area.

The first act of the Borough Fire Dept. will be to hire nine full time professional firemen to be stationed at Eagle River, with three men on duty at all times.

The remainder of the fire service will be performed by volunteers, who will now be classified as auxiliary firemen, and paid for the time they are on call whether for fire or ambulance service.

The rate of pay will be \$4.00 per hour for stand by and \$5.00 per hour while working.

Bagley said the 3 on duty firemen would live in a house trailer to be installed next to the present fire hall until the new fire station is completed.

Officers in charge of the Eagle River station will be designated Station Captain.

The take-over is scheduled to go into effect August 1st, Bagley said. The same phone number would be used to report fires as is presently in effect with the volunteer Fire Company. The only change is that all calls to this number

will also be routed through the Borough Dispatcher in Anchorage. Whenever a fire call is received in Eagle River, an engine company from the Muldoon Fire Hall will also be dispatched to the fire.

The use of two engine companies to answer fires is standard operating procedure in the Borough Fire Department Chief Bagley said.

Chief Bagley explained how the paid firemen could be hired without any increase in the mill rate. He said that the budget for the Fire Company had already provided for one full time paid fireman. Three firemen would be hired under P.E.P. (Public Employment Program) a federally funded program. Two of the firemen would be paid out of the Borough Fire Department funds.

The Board voted instead to appoint a committee to review the by-laws with the idea of clearing up a number of grey areas, one of which was the method of petitioning for a change of by-laws. As they are written the by laws neither permit or forbid petitioning for a change, according to Clements. For this reason, the board was not bound to honor the petition.

Clements said the by-law committee would recommend any changes they felt were needed, including possibly the voting by mail, and these would then be brought to the membership for their approval at next year's Annual Meeting, or possibly at a special meeting, which could be called if the membership felt the need of it.

Bagley encourages any volunteer firemen who are interested in applying for jobs as full time firemen to do so.

He said while all nine of the permanent positions in Eagle River are presently filled, there is always the possibility that there could be an opening tomorrow. He said that while persons employed under the PEP program must comply with standards set by that program, former firefighting experience would be an asset if all other qualifications are met.

The monthly wage for Borough firemen starts at \$931.00 per month and goes up to \$1,189.00 per month.

The borough expects to place a new ambulance in Eagle River, but feels that the present equipment is otherwise adequate.
